Apple, Digital outline their joint development program

Apple Computer, Inc. and Digital outlined the joint development program and architecture for integrating their respective networking environments at a recent developers conference. The two companies defined a framework for connecting Apple Macintosh personal computers with Digital VAX/VMS systems.

Apple and Digital told developers that they would place highest priorities on meeting the most common user needs—file services, print services, database access, network management and network terminal services. End-user products and developer toolkits for creating new capabilities will begin to appear in the summer of 1989.

The companies also announced a program for servicing Apple Macintosh personal computers and related products through Digital's Field Service organization in selected geographical locations in the U.S.

The joint developers conference represents the first of several steps in fulfilling the commitment made in January 1988 to provide a jointly developed framework for integrating Macintosh personal computers and AppleTalk networks with VAX systems and DECnet/OSI enterprise networks.

The program, presented by over 30 engineers from both companies, outlined a variety of architectures, products, and

development tools. It is the first forum providing implementation plans and schedules for the key capabilities, specifications and development tools.

By having a consistent technical framework, developers will be able to plan, implement, and deliver a new generation of distributed applications and network intelligent productivity applications using the Macintosh as a versatile front-end for VAX-based applications.

The benefits of this seamlessly integrated environment include the consistent Macintosh user interface, AppleTalk network transparency and services, VAX/VMS computing power, and enterprise-wide DECnet/OSI networking capability. In addition, the joint development program will provide tools to add new capabilities to existing software products and conversion utilities for migration to the new generation of products, thereby protecting customers' investments in third-party hardware and software products.

"The joint development program we have outlined ensures that developers have a consistent product platform for integration of DECnet/OSI networks and AppleTalk networks, based on international standards," said Bill Strecker, vice president, Product Strategy and Architecture. "The program will bring the benefits of our respective architectures to the broadest spectrum of VAX and Macintosh users at the earliest possible date."

"The forward-looking architectures of AppleTalk and DECnet complement each other," said Jean-Louis Gasse, Apple's senior vice president for Research, Development, and Product Marketing. "The program and architectures announced today will give third parties the tools to develop a whole new generation of cooperative applications for the Macintosh and VAX environments."

SAVE plan enrollment period begins

A new SAVE 401(k) plan enrollment period has begun. Employees will receive an enrollment kit through interoffice mail by Aug. 31. The enrollment deadline is Sept. 15. New and existing members of the plan can use this period to evaluate their contribution percentage and fund allocation options.

The enrollment kit includes:

- A six-page brochure which provides an overview of the plan; plan features such as tax advantages, investment choices and loan capabilities; and questions and answers which address specifics such as allowable contributions and withdrawals.
- A specific example of the tax advantage and growth potential of an 8% contribution on a \$30,000 annual salary.
- A fund performance prospectus on funds B, C, and D as well as fund A's (Guaranteed Income Fund) performance in the brochure text.
- An enrollment card.

New Federal regulations adopted on availability of funds, check collection

The Federal Reserve Board has adopted a new rule called Regulation CC, which takes effect Sept. 1, 1988. The new regulation was adopted to implement the Expedited Funds Availability Act recently passed by Congress. It can affect check cashing, check clearing and the way checks are endorsed.

Under the new rule, banks must release funds which are direct deposited within 24 hours of receipt. As such, the new rule should not affect those employees who are paid through direct deposit. However, it may affect some employees who receive payroll checks.

Under Regulation CC, financial institutions that offer checking accounts, NOW accounts and sharedraft accounts must disclose how long they intend to hold checks before making the funds available. The law permits a maximum hold of seven (7) days for non-local checks. In addition, each financial institution must disclose its check cashing policies.

Employees should contact the financial institution they regularly use about its new disclosure policies.

Designs on Digital

Art student Sean O'Mara wins Digital Design Bursary

An Irish student who won Digital's first-ever Design Bursary competition is winding up his stay in the U.S.

Sean O'Mara, a 20-year-old graphic design student, has been working this summer on design projects as a member of a design team in Digital's Corporate Design Group in the Mill. His scholarship includes return air fare to Ireland, housing, transportation, and salary. The competition was sponsored by the European Design Group in Galway, Ireland.

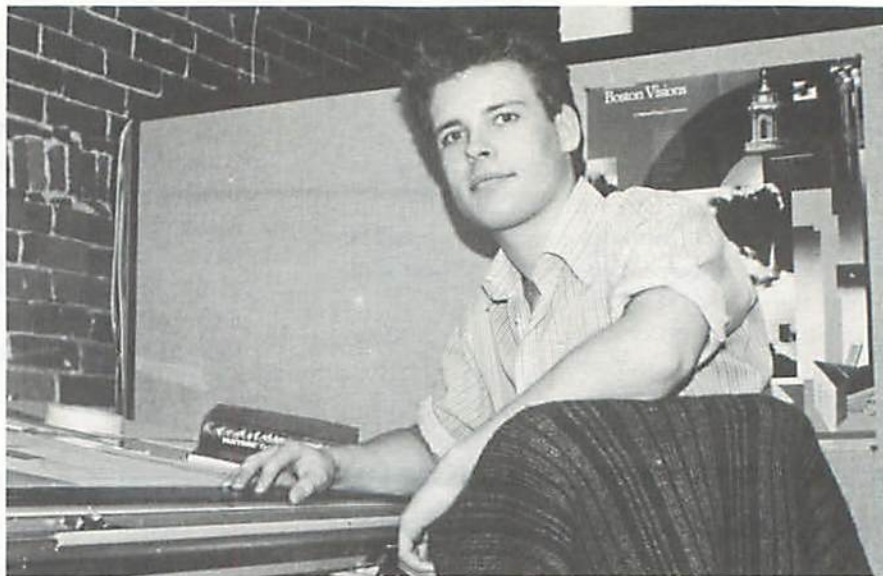
The competition's purpose is to identify and encourage graphic design talent among Irish students. It was open to pre-graduation year graphic design students at art schools throughout the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland.

Students were given a design brief, or problem, to work on and submit to a panel of judges: Tony O'Hanlon, senior design with the European Design Group; Ernst Wijnekus, print technologist at Digital's Mervue, Ireland, facility; Mike Freeman, senior industrial design, European Design Group, Reading; Terry Kelly, chief executive of the Irish Crafts Council; and Andrej Wejchert, a Dublin architect. Students were judged on their skill, imagination, unity of thought, clarity, wit, appropriateness, and an individual approach to designing a travel bag.

"The brief was, 'If you could choose a mode of transportation to get to the United States, what would you choose?'" recalls Sean, a student at the Dun Laoghaire (pronounced Dun Leary) School of Art and Design in Dublin. "A lot of the designs submitted were abstract — walking along the meridian lines, for example. So I went with something really normal. I designed a raft and sailed it across the Atlantic."

Sean also designed a brochure and a travel kit. Made "to hang on your belt," the kit was reassembled from an old life jacket and included maps, a compass and a passport. His offbeat, humorous approach to the design brief won both the judges' attention and the bursary.

This is Sean's first trip to the United States. So far, everything has gone smoothly. "When I landed in Boston, though, it was raining. I thought for a minute that the judges had changed their minds and I'd been sent back to Ireland.

"You always hear how great it is in the States," he continues. "It's got an almost mystical quality. There's this feeling that you can make your fortune, that if you work hard, you'll get somewhere."

That "mystical quality" has lured thousands of young Irish across the Atlantic. "A lot of the good young designers have left to come to the U.S. because there's so much more money to be made here," Sean explains. "But the money situation is starting to improve and things are starting to pick up again. Still, young people need incentives to stay in Ireland."

Sean claims he hasn't experienced much culture shock. He thinks the transition from Ireland to America has been a little smoother for him because he's sharing a house with two American employees, Troy Litten and George Avalos, who are also graphic design students. But he has noticed some differences. "We speak English, but it's not the same English," he says. "Words that mean one thing in Ireland mean something totally different here. It's a different idiom altogether."

His fellow employees are "very friendly," Sean says, "and the standard of work is very high. At school, I'd never have had the chance to use the kind of equipment I'm using here. Working with computers, especially those with color graphics, is a whole new, different side of design for me. Everything is approached in a different way," he says.

His own work was first influenced by the etchings of the 15th-century German artist Albrecht Durer ("unmatched quality for that time"), and is now influenced by the Bauhaus and constructivist schools of art. "That's a very clean, very graphic kind of design," he says. "You see it a lot today. It's trendy."

"This (the U.S.) is a terrific place to collect things," he adds, gesturing toward the Campbell's soup can labels pinned to the cluttered bulletin board in his cubicle. "I love collecting junk — soft drink cans, throwaway stuff. You never know what will be interesting or valuable some day."

It could be a design by Sean O'Mara. ●
