Digital to market scientific word processing software

Digital announced an agreement with Microsystems Engineering Corporation (MEC), of Hoffman Estates, Ill., whereby Digital will market and distribute MEC's MASS-11 scientific word processing software package for its VAX superminicomputers. Designed to be compatible with Digital's DECmate and WPS-200 series of word processors, MASS-11 enables as many as 48 concurrent users on VAX-11/780 computers to perform word processing operations.

In addition to the conventional word processing features, MASS-11 includes a special editor for scientific equation notation, and enables users to intermix scientific and English characters in both text- and equation-editing nodes. The word processing ckage, which runs under the VMS operating system, can be linked to Digital's

stand-alone word processing systems for document interchange.

Input to MASS-11 using the WPS-200/-DECmate editor interface is done through a VT100 family video terminal using a word processing keyboard layout. A special scientific-character set in read-only memory (ROM) can be installed to enable the terminal to display, enter and receive scientific characters. For hard-copy printout, a scientific-character ROM option has been developed for Digital's LETTER-PRINTER 100 high-resolution matrix printer.

MASS-11 will be marketed through Digital's External Application Software (EAS) Library. It is priced at \$10,000 and is scheduled to be available this summer, as will both VT100 terminal and LETTER-PRINTER 100 ROM options.

The compatibility to Digital's WPS-200 and DECmate word processors enables MASS-11 users to integrate administrative and scientific report preparation and other documentation required in a scientific or technical environment. The advanced word processing package works in conjunction with Digital's All-in-1 office automation software. This enables MASS-11 to work with Digital's Polygrafix software to provide total integration of text and graphics.

In addition to scientific notation, other advanced features of MASS-11 include supporting documents of any length, full-screen editing (as opposed to bottom line only), automatic draft copy double-spacing without disturbing different rulers for the final document, and operation of up to 25 printers simultaneously.

First fiber optics installation, a success

While optical communication has been used in telecommunication for several years, its use in local computer communication is a recent accomplishment for Digital. Digital's most recent entry into the fiber-optics market consists of an optical data communication link, up to 300 meters long, between a VAX computer and the recently developed VAXstation 100 graphics subsystems.

After months of designs, specs and working with manufacturers, the VAXstation team was able to test the reliability of the fiber with the first installation of VAXstation fiber-optics cable technology. On April 30 in Marlboro (MRO3), a datacommunication crew installed twenty-four 300 meter fiber-optics cables from the Workstation Program computers on the third floor to offices on the first floor.

Bob Holt, principal design engineer of fiber optics for the VAXstation 100, explained that laying the cables was the culmination of a long-term development effort with fiber-optics cable manufacturers to

et what they considered a difficult spec.

"It's exciting to see a product grow from an idea to something you can feel and touch. It's a feeling of accomplishment for the whole team. We have shown that fiber optics has a viable place in the datacommunication field and we have done it 'first

in the industry' with a high volume product."

"It was a learning experience for us as well as a learning experience for Workstation staff," said Datacommunication supervisor in Marlboro Doug Vickery. Datacommunication technician Winnie Joyner, having taken a CSSE fiber optics course, was able to apply his knowledge to Digital's first

Patrick Courtin heads new Engineering group

Direct dialing comes to Westminster and Augusta

Beginning June 27, Westminster will have Direct Inward Dialing (DID) added to their phone system. On July 11, Augusta, Maine will also change over to Direct Inward Dialing.

With DID, external callers will be able to reach the person they're calling directly rather than going through a central operator. The change to DID will effect some internal dialing patterns.

Westminster

In Westminster, extension numbers beginning with "2" will become "3" on June 27 when the cutover to DID is complete. For example, if an employee's extension is now DTN 241-2804, it will become DTN 241-3804 or (617) 874-3804.

The directory number in Westminster will also change due to DID. To access the operator in Westminster dial DTN 241-3111 or (617) 874-3111.


All of the changes to the Westminster phone system will be corrected in time for the July issue of the Digital Telephone Director.

Augusta, Maine

Direct Inward Dialing will be available at the Augusta facility on July 11. The main listed number and all extensions will be changed at that time. The new main number will be (207) 623-6511. The new fourdigit extensions will be listed in the July issue of the Digital Telephone Directory.

To reach an employee directly from a non-DTN phone, dial (207) 623-and the four-digit extension. All DTN calls must be dialed 271-and the four-digit extension. Internal operator's assistance will remain the same, DTN 271-2211.

General Doriot receives honorary degree

General Georges Doriot, a member of Digital's Board of Directors, received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Boston University on May 15.

Between 1926 and 1966, General Doriot taught industrial management at Harvard Business School to more than 6,700 students

He served as a brigadier general in the United States Army from 1941 to 1947 as chief of the Army's Military Planning Divi-

sion, in charge of research and development. His achievements included the development of tents, jungle uniforms and special clothing for extreme weather, along with K-rations and the dehydration of food. He also initiated research on the armored vest.

General Doriot later became chairman and director of the American Research and Development Corporation (AR&D), which was formed in 1946 to continue the innovative momentum that business had generated during World War II. It was the first public venture capital-investment company in the United States.

AR&D's initial capital was \$3 million, and by 1972, when sold to Textron, its assets were worth \$400 million.

Under General Doriot, AR&D invested in more than 150 companies, among them Digital, which began with an initial investment of \$61,000 in 1957.

General Doriot is also a director of Sun Life Assurance Co. of Canada, the Boston Company and the National Shawmut Bank of Boston.

He is president of the French Library in oston and trustee and vice-president of the Franklin Foundation. He is counseiller of the Institut Europeen d'Administration des Affaires in Paris and has received the United States Distinguished Service Medal and the Legion d'Honneur from France.

Record equipment donation supports new Science and Engineering Center

With a record-breaking equipment donation of \$1.6 million to Boston University Center for the Sciences and Engineering, Digital is helping the school on its way to being in the forefront of science disciplines.

Opening in September 1983, the first stages of the planned \$49 million complex will contain new facilities for biology, chemistry, physics and engineering. In total expansion and renovation, the sciences and engineering will have three times the area currently occupied.

Digital's contribution is the largest onetime gift the company has ever made to an educational institution, and also is the largest equipment gift that BU has ever received. The equipment Digital donated to the University includes two VAX 11/780 systems for research in the new department of computer science and in the College of Engineering, and a DEC 20/60 computer for artificial intelligence research.

Ken Olsen, president, said in presenting the gift to BU President John Silber that "education has always been a special priority for Digital. We are pleased to be able to support Boston University's development of its engineering and computer science resources."

In accepting the gift, John Silber thanked Digital for its generosity and promised it would be "amply justified by the research and instruction that the gift will help to make possible."

Six marketing groups help target customer audiences

Group. Bill Long, Technical Group, is in charge of the Laboratory Products, Educational Systems and Medical Systems Groups. Ward MacKenzie, OEM Group. continues in charge of OEM, Chips and Boards. Joel Schwartz is in charge of marketing computers and terminal through distributors and re-sellers. (This market does not include Digital's Business Centers or DEC Dealers.) Joel also is responsible for marketing personal computers and terminals. Peter Smith heads a newly formed Computer Integrated Manufacturing (CIM) Group, which includes the Engineering Systems and Manufacturing, Distribution and Control Groups.

Even if the chain letter itself is not mailed, as long as the payment of the prize is sent through the U.S. mail, the entire scheme is illegal."



Digital announces 10 megabyte mini-Winchester

A new, 5.25-inch, ten-megabyte Winchester-technology disk is now available for Digital's small business and personal computer systems. Called the RD51, the new disk is the second member of Digital's line of 5:25-inch Winchester-technology storage products. It interfaces with the Professional 350 personal computer and the MI-CRO/PDP-11 low-cost computer for Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) and high-volume end users.

Developed for use in both office and industrial environments, the RD51 mounts in the computers' system packages. The RD51 has nearly ten times the storage capacity of average 5.25-inch floppy diskette sub-systems. The characteristics of the medium are 345 tracks per inch with a density of 9,074 bits/inch. It has a peak data transfer rate of 5 Mbits/second.

The disk drive is available at \$1,695. Pricing as complete sub-systems with controllers is dependent on the system packaging. As an example, for the MICRO/-PDP-11, the disk with controller is \$2,985. Shipments are scheduled to begin this month.

installation. He crawled in the third floor ceiling to pull the fiber-optics cables from the Workstation Data Center to the hole leading to the first floor. "I felt like I was making history," Winnie said.

On the first floor, Ted Wojcik, Workstation engineer, had his VAXstation connected via the fiber-optic link to an 11/780 on the opposite side of the third floor. "I was able to check out firmware for the VAXstation demos right away," he said.

How fiber optics work

The basic fiber-optics communications link is a flexible light pipe, with a transmitter at one end, a receiver at the other and an optical cable in-between. The cable consists of an extremely thin glass fiber inside a protective sheath. Overall diameter of higher frequency cables, such as those using graded-index glass fibers, is approximately a millionth of a meter.

When an electrical signal is applied to the transmitter, the transmitter emits pulses of light which are directed down the optical fiber. A waveguiding effect occurs because the fiber has a higher refractive index than the cladding. As a result, the light waves bounce back and forth between the fiber and its cladding, all the way down the cable to the receiver end. At the receiver, the pulses of light are converted back to an electrical signal for subsequent processing.

Because light is the transmission medium, fiber optics offers numerous advantages over conventional copper-wire electrical transmission line including being impervious to electromagnetic and electrostatic interference; being very effective in data security; and having lighter weight and greater strength.
