Sales gears internal recruitment plans

You have been successful in your job at Digital. You know the products, the technologies or the markets. Your skills are needed! Why not consider getting involved directly with Digital's customers and join Digital's Field operations.

U.S. Area Sales is soliciting internal candidates for sales career opportunities available all over the U.S. An extension of the existing Field Sales Development Program, which has been in existence for five years, it will be offered to an increased number of internal candidates.

The U.S. Area represents 21 percent of Digital's employee population with 3,000 in Sales, 6,850 in Field Service and 1,600 in Software Services. The balance includes educational and administrative functions.

ey are now running a series of Field Career Days at all Digital facilities to introduce employees to career opportunities in sales, field service, software services and presale-software support.

These fields offer technical, administrative and manufacturing personnel translatable applications for their present skill sets in specific markets served by the Field Sales organization. These opportunities should be contemplated as an extension of employees' existing careers at Digital, a chance to build on their present expertise.

Mike Rogosin, manager of the Field Sales Development Program, said, "The intention of this new approach to internal placement is to augment the flow of qualified people into the field force in the years to come. Employees can start planning now for their career transition."

Field Sales Development is gearing their efforts and modifying their training and recruiting programs to meet the needs of internal candidates with little or no sales experience. Employees enjoying the business and technical side of their present work may welcome the experiences of customer contact and selling Digital products. In turn, Digital will be able to offer customers the special knowledge ers, manufacturers and engineers have offer about our products.

The minimum criteria for applying for the program are a bachelor's degree or two years computer industry experience for each uncompleted college year. The college level computer science courses must

Teleconferencing closes the gap

How can you travel at 186,000 miles per second, but never leave Maynard? Try teleconferencing.

Digital has now in full operation teleconferencing between Maynard and Merrimack. The two-way, full motion, color video communication system is available to all groups in the company.

The process is similar to that of a television studio. Each conference room is equipped with automatic cameras and television monitors. A camera transmits the speaker's image and words to the monitor in the other conference room. When the speaker is finished, his or her picture stays on the monitor while people at the other end respond.

A black and white preview screen assisting in the set up of a visual presentation, a color monitor showing what is being transmitted, and an incoming monitor displaying the prominent speaker or presentation, all help make the meeting a communication success.

Everything is automatic. Room coordinators help familiarize users with the facility and with any of the special options such as video-taping or planning visual presentations. The equipment is so simple that just a few minutes of instruction is all a user needs to run the equipment without any help.

The conference table at each location can seat six participants, but the room holds up to 20 people. Recessed tablemounted speakers and ceiling speakers for people standing in the rear are totally voice activated through a microprocessor. The system can be locked into the main speaker as not to disrupt the presentation with too much camera movement.

The room has full graphics capabilities for transmitting transparencies, reports, graphs, video tapes, physical objects, easel presentation and drawings on the white board. The entire meeting can be video taped.

What elements can cancel or postpone a meeting? The weather, the transportation,

lack of time or space? What about last minute meetings? Meetings can often be set up for the same day.

How Digital uses video conferencing

Many repeat users book the rooms for entire mornings using a revolving door format to their meetings. So people can walk in and out to join in the specific parts of the meeting relevant to their work, which could not happen in a traditional set-up with transportation and time as crucial factors.

Teleconferencing has been found to work best for routine meeting and information sharing. It is a good management tool. Support staff are able to attend, and managers can spend more time in the office, not on the road between New Hampshire and Massachusetts.

Teleconferencing is a very adaptable medium, and groups find newer ways of using it each day. It has been used in product reviews, critiquing engineering schematics, as a marketing tool, for question and answer sessions and in problem solving for customers in Massachusetts with product groups in New Hampshire and vice versa. Demonstrations are available. There is no bumping and no charge with a first-come, first-served schedule basis.

Time change for sale of stock

Effective May 3, 1982, Investor Services is changing the time that sell requests must be received by their office for selling stock held on the Statement of Ownership. Sell requests must be received by 12 noon Eastern Standard Time (EST) in order for the stock to be sold the following business morning. Sell requests received after noon EST will be treated as having arrived the following business day and will be sold two business mornings later.

Employee Communication to distribute survey this month

about one week, the Corporate Employee Communication will distribute a questionnaire to help identify strengths and weaknesses in the way employees get information about Digital's plans, policies and decisions. They need employee opinions in order to help improve this type of communication and, to reinforce the need for employee feedback, have named the questionnaire "Expressway."

Every employee can't be asked to fill out the questionnaire because of the expense and the time commitments which would be required. Therefore, about 4,000 people in the U.S. will receive questionnaires based on a formula which sorts the Personnel Master File by employees last names and randomly selects every ninth name. Only permanent full-time employees who have been with Digital for at least one month will

be included in the sample.

"All responses will be confidential," says Anne Kreidler, manager of the department. She adds, "We won't ask employees to put their names on the surveys. Some questions about each employee's background and position will be asked, however, so we can determine if different parts of Digital have different opinions of employee communication."

Expressway will be distributed in the interoffice mail within the next two weeks. Surveys for Terminal Manufacturing employees chosen in the sampling will be mailed into their homes. All responses must be mailed interoffice in the supplied, preaddressed envelope.

Results will be made available after the information has been analyzed.

Larry Portner to head Corporate Planning

External hiring restricted

The Operations Committee has restricted all external hiring. The hiring restrictions were established in response to current economic conditions and in an effort to provide employees, who are available for reassignment, every opportunity for placement within the company. External employment offers made prior to the restrictions will be honored.

"The hiring restrictions will help us to make the best use of our talented work force," Vice President of Personnel, Shel Davis said. "As our business changes, so do the needs of various parts of the company. We want to make sure groups that are now growing take advantage of the potential and experience of employees who are or will be available for reassignment. We also feel external hiring constraints provide an excellent opportunity for the internal growth of our employees."

Internal transfers are not affected by the restrictions. The restrictions affect external hiring for all full time, part time and summer positions. To protect the company's long-term interests, the college hire program will continue. "We view the college hire program as a prime source of talent for the future and an essential part of our long-term strategy," Shel said.

Digital's Employment people will focus their efforts on the placement of internal candidates. "Even before the hiring restrictions," said Chuck Poe, U.S. Employment manager, "qualified internal candidates were given pricrity consideration over external applicants. The restrictions help reinforce our employment policy." U.S. Employment is currently looking at other ways to aid in the placement of internal candidates including a resource center where both employees who might be available for reassignment and employment people could find job listings and emplayee listings. "Once we have pinpointed our needs, we will put plans in place to meet those needs." Chuck said.

Summer registration for B.U. announced

Blue mail procedures are updated

Blue Mail has always been considered the fasted mode of interoffice mail. The procedure allows the sender and receiver to participate in the transportation process avoiding several mailroom steps.

But it is only effective when the sender advises the addressee of the time of arrival so they may collect it at the destination mailroom.

Under the old procedure, mailrooms at facilities without a routine shuttle service would call Blue Mail receivers. But in reality, only 31 percent of Blue Mail processed is collected by the addressee. So, mailrooms will no longer notify addressees when Blue Mail is received.

Also, to save administrative steps, the Blue Mail form will be changed to only one part, and mailrooms will no longer maintain file copies.

Blue Mail is the fastest mode of interplant mail if it is used correctly. It can save six steps in the process.
