The startup group for Digital's new plant in Greenville, S.C., just relocated from Acton, Mass. For the next year they will be working in leased office space directly across from the Greenville construction site.

Eventually, the new plant will employ about 600 people and have the capacity to produce more printed wiring board than all of Digital's previous board shops (Maynard, San German and Phoenix) combined. It is Digital's first plant in the South and also our first standalone printed wiring board plant. Production should start about January or February 1982, building to full capacity by fiscal 1985. This plant, a part of the General Manufacturing Group, will primarily make high technology multilayer boards.

Since groundbreaking on June 6, the site has been levelled. Concrete footings are being poured and, by January the building will be enclosed. Then work will begin on the interior of the 200,000 sq. ft. facility.

Some of the people now relocating were hired specifically for Greenville, up to a year ago when the project started. Others transferred from other positions within Digital. Together they have been planning for staffing and training at the new facility. Fifteen have already relocated. Another six will be going this fall.

Credit union offers car loans

With over 9000 members and over \$8.5 million in assets--after just four months--the Digital Credit Union (DCU) is offering new and used car loans, motorcycle loans and loans secured by money on deposit ("secured share loans"). The car loans are at 12.5%, compared to an average of about 15% at other financial institutions in the Boston area.

To apply you must be a DCU member for at least 30 days and a Digital employee for at least 90 days. Downpayment -- 20% for new cars, 30% for used. Each member may borrow up to \$10,000 per vehicle for a total limit of \$20,000. Members who recently financed cars at 13-18% may apply for a DCU loan at a lower rate.

Five offices are now open-PK3, the Mill, Westminster, Merrimack and Marlboro, Additional offices will open this fall in Westfield, Phoenix, Salem and Colorado Springs. Credit union records are centralized on a PDP-11/70 so employees can make transactions from any location .

Once you become a DCU member, you can stay a member, regardless of whether you stay with the company, as long as you keep \$5 on deposit.

Digital buys Tempe board shop

Digital has purchased a 150,000 sq. ft. printed circuit board production facility in Tempe, Arizona from ITT Courier Terminal Systems, Inc. for an undisclosed sum. In addition, we have hired about 140 production and supervisory personnel who had been employed by Courier at that site. We will occupy the building immediately and begin to produce boards for our own use.

Making jobs easier to find

Looking for the opportunities for advancement within the company? Particularly critical positions that must be filled immediately are listed up front as "jobs of the week". More changes now in the works should further improve the usefulness and timeliness of the JOBS bulletin.



Ed Services offers new courses and seminars

How to manage distributed data processing

Managers often have to make decisions as to what computing resources to use to solve business problems. A three-day non-technical seminar "Management Control of the Distributed Computing Environment" will provide such managers with tools for evaluating whether distributed data processing (DDP) meets their needs. It also will suggest steps to insure that distributed data processing matches their business structures.

Areas to be covered include: organizational impact of DDP, features/benefits/opportunities matrix, office automation in the distributed environment, the DDP decision matrix, risk management of DDP, pitfall, cost occurrence vs. frequency of occurrence, and the changing roles of the data processing manager and staff.

Intro to networks

"Network Architectures and Applications" will review distributed data processing concepts and introduce data communications and networking fundamentals. Intro to digital logic

A new self-paced audio visual course "Introduction to Digital Logic" teaches the student to recognize the logic symbols used by the computer industry, to interpret and use logic diagrams, truth tables and timing diagrams; and to analyze the behavior of simple and complex logic circuits. To get full benefit from this course, the student should be able to add and subtract binary numbers and to convert from one number base to another and should have a general understanding of how a digital computer operates -- information conveyed by the Introduction to Minicomputers course.

An introduction to real-time computer systems, "Real-Time Applications" is intended for systems analysts and programmers or anyone wanting further insight into real-time systems in general and RSX-11 and RT-11 in

IQL for non-programmers

The Interactive Query Language (IQL) can manipulate data in DECsystem-10 or DECSYSTEM-20 computers. It can select and sort records by a variety of conditions, calculating new data items and producing titled and formatted reports.

A one day course for the non-programmer who needs to access and manipulate data, "IQL User" shows how to define and update IQL data dictionaries, create, store, retrieve and edit queries, browse through and update data, and produce reports suitable for inclusion in internal documents. As a prerequisite, students should be able to use a terminal to log onto a DECsystem-10 or DECSYSTEM-20 and execute commands necessary to run programs, type and print files and determine the files in their dictionary.

Computer ABCs






