Boston plant opens

You probably saw it on the six o'clock news - Monday, July 14: Digital formally opened its new manufacturing facility in Boston's Crosstown Industrial Park, near Boston City Hospital. Governor Edward King, Boston's Mayor Kevin White and about 250 others, including community leaders and representatives of the press, showed up to mark the occasion.

Digital normally keeps a low profile, avoiding rather than seeking publicity. As President Ken Olsen said, the company's usual approach would have been to start quietly with a small operation, perhaps in an out-of-theway corner of the city. "But," he explained, "we were asked to erect a new building right in the center of this high unemployment area to be an example to other companies and to help develop pride in the city. We hope that our being here will be an inspiration for others to come into the city."

In their speeches, both Governor King and Mayor White emphasized the value of Digital's investment to the community - providing jobs in the inner city where they are most needed.

According to Plant Manager Leroy Saylor, Digital's Boston workforce has already reached 110 and could reach 300 by the end of 1981. He indicated that Digital has already begun to plan future expansion on the seven-and-a-half-acre intown site that would double production space there within three years and could expand the workforce to 500 within five years.

The new 60,000 sq. ft. building houses high-volume production of the VT100 video display terminal. The plant is part of the Terminals Manufacturing Group which also has facilities in Albuquerque, Phoenix and Westfield.

Although the Boston opening drew lots of media attention, this was not the first time that Digital has opened a manufacturing facility in an urban community. About eight years ago, the company very quietly started a plant in Springfield, Mass. That plant now employs over 700 in what had been a high unemployment area.

Outings return to Canobie Lake

What's Canobie Lake Park? Ask a kid on a merry-go-round with ice cream on his face. Ask any of the 56,000 employees and guests who went to last year's family outings there.

This year the company has scheduled ten dates between Sept. 7 and Oct. 11 at the Salem, N.H. amusement park. That is two more dates than last year to accomodate the growing employee population.

As before, attendees will receive unlimited free food and free rides on all the amusements. The park will be open - exclusively for Digital employees and their guests - from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Food will be available 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Married employees may bring their spouses and dependent children. Unmarried employees may bring one guest each.

Second building for Merrimack

The town of Merrimack has approved construction of a second building on Digital's 1000-acre Merrimack site. Date of occupancy of the two-floor, 330,000 sq. ft. building has not been set. Before Digital makes the final decision to build, design plans must be approved and contracts let.

The new facility, to be located at the southwest corner of the current structure, opposite the helipad, will be similar in appearance to the first building, though about half the size. Maximum capacity is estimated at 1200 employees. Tenants for the new building have not yet been determined, but they are expected to comprise an expansion of groups in the first Merrimack Digital building.

Alice Drake exhibits her photography

Alice Drake is an accomplished juggler. . .not of batons but of priorities.

In addition to her full time position as a senior product promotion specialist at Parker Street, Alice has juggled two major activities for the last three-and-a-half years. Her recent graduation from Wellesley College and her current photography exhibit at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Cambridge, attest to her ability to set priorities and meet her goals.

Ever since she bought her first camera at age 18, Alice has pursued multiple goals. "If you're goaloriented," she has learned, "you're more likely to get there."

"When you're doing three things at once," Alice admits, "the stress becomes incredible. The smartest thing is not to go from an overloaded schedule to nothing, but to decrease your load to a comfortable level. That's where I am now. I certainly wouldn't want a vacuum".

There is certainly no vacuum in Alice's professional life. Last winter, she produced the *Microcomputer Interfaces Handbook*, and she's just revised the *Microcomputer Processor Handbook*.

Completing her bachelor's degree at Wellesley College, however, gives Alice the additional time she wants for photography. Her current focus is the selection of places to exhibit her photography after the Hyatt Regency exhibit ends on August 1. She explains that her experience with Digital's corporate marketing group helps with this decision. "I understand what's involved in choosing an appropriate audience," she claims.

Alice already is choosing photographs to enter in the Boston Globe's annual photo contest and to submit for consideration for the Sierra Club calendar. In addition, she is preparing a proposal for a book of photographs based on light and color in New England.

"Four years ago at the MIT Coop, I saw Clyde Smith's book of photographs, New England. I was so impressed that I even called the editor and talked with her about my work. That book -- and the Sierra Club books -- have been sources of major inspiration for me," explains Alice.

Her exhibit at the Hyatt Regency is entitled *Quiet Seasons* and features landscapes, character portraits,

close-ups of subjects in nature, and graphic abstractions. Alice has worked toward a professional level of photography for several years. However, it always took third place on her priority list -- behind her Digital career and the completion of her studies at Wellesley.

Recently, Alice took her portfolio of photographs to several publishing houses. Their responses were encouraging. "Publishers and editors have always encouraged me," Alice says. She explains the hardest part for her was to accept that they were just people and there was no reason to be afraid to approach them.

"I've had many models to follow," she continues, "but it's persistence, more than anything else, that develops whatever in yourself you want to develop."

Who benefits from Digital's benefits?

The surveys were mailed to worksites. All individual responses will be kept confidential. A summary of results will be published sometime this fall.

New ticket policy established

To give employees at all facilities in New England an equal opportunity to obtain tickets for sports and entertainment events in eastern Massachusetts, Corporate Employee Activities is initiating a new distribution system on a trial basis.

For these events, no money or tickets will change hands at any Digital site. Employees will use order forms that initially will be printed in Digital This Week and in plant newletters. Forms can also be obtained from local Employee Activity coordinators.

To order tickets, fill out a form (one form for each event), and send it together with a check for the total amount due, and a self-addressed stamped envelope with your home address to: DEC Recreation Association, PO Box 310, Maynard, MA 01754. Tickets will not be sent by interoffice mail, and telephone orders will not be accepted.

Employee Activities helps employees purchase tickets to selected popular events. In some cases (for instance, certain Red Sox games), tickets would otherwise be difficult to obtain. In other cases, Employee Activities is able to give employees a significant discount by handling a large number of tickets on a consignment basis.

"To provide this service, we typically have to pay for all tickets sold and return all unsold tickets to the vendor at least two to three weeks prior to the event," explains Alice Bucca, corporate manager of Employee Activities. "Having a single central address should speed up the ordering process, enabling us to provide better service. More importantly, it will give employees at all facilities a more equal opportunity when tickets to a popular event are in short supply."
