# Board of Directors for Europe formed

In keeping with the goal of one company with one strategy and one message, a Board of Directors has been formed for Digital Europe. This group of senior managers will play a major advisory role for Europe and the corporation, helping to promote better integration between them.

This Board will hold its meetings in Europe. "It will help make sure that we have mutual understanding of values and cultural differences, enabling the company as a whole to become more aware of and sensitive to the issues and concerns of Europe," explains Ken Olsen, president. "The Board will provide feedback, advice and perspective to the European organization from a corate, non-functional perspective, reviewihe overall strategic direction of Europe

and of individual European countries.

"The success and rapid growth of Europe make this dialogue particularly important. We want to achieve better understanding of strategic issues that are unique to individual countries so we can provide support at the corporate level. The Board will also give formal visibility to the successes, issues, and problems of European country organizations and functions. In general, it should help give the company a more international focus, developing the international understanding and perspective of senior corporate managers."

Jean-Claude Peterschmitt will assume the responsibility of chairman of the Board for Europe. He will continue to focus his attention on Digital's European presence, on issues related to new opportunities with other companies, customers, and governments, and on our relationships with the European community. Pier-Carlo Falotti will assume the responsibility of president of Digital Europe. All reporting relationships to European and corporate management shall remain unchanged.

# Digital approves smoking policy


Digital has approved a policy which addresses smoking by employees. The policy specifies that since smoking is an individual choice, Digital expects employees to treat each other with mutual respect in regard to situations where conflict of interests arise surrounding smoking issues.

The policy reminds employees who smoke in Digital facilities to consider others who may be medically affected or annoyed by smoke. If conflicts occur as the result of difference of opinion surrounding smoking, employees are to work together to mutually solve the problem and look to their managers for leadership in finding acceptable solutions in accordance with the policy.

Smoking will be allowed in work areas identified as smoking areas by the host/facility manager, and in undesignated areas only if all parties agree smoking will take place. Smoking will not be permitted in enclosed locations such as conference rooms and classrooms unless all parties agree. In addition, smoking and non-smoking areas within Digital facilities will be identified in



# Employee recognized for ski jumping career by athletic Deaf Hall of Fame

Herb Holbrook, stockkeeper at the Shrewsbury plant, was inducted into the American Athletic Association Deaf Hall of Fame in Chicago on March 29 in recognition of his ski jumping career.

Deaf since the age of six, when he fell on ice and hit his head, Herb, 54, is an ardent ski enthusiast. Brought up in Brattleboro, Vermont, Herb said that "when I was nine years old, my friends encouraged me to ski

and they kept pushing me down the hill."

He was 16 when he took his first ski jump. "Since I couldn't hear, I would concentrate on the position of my skis which is good since I would hit the ground going about 50 miles an hour," Herb explained.

During his ski jumping career which he stopped 15 years ago, Herb was the only deaf jumper among hearing competitors in the U.S. Eastern Amateur Ski Association. Herb began the sport on the old jump behind the Austine School in Brattleboro, where he graduated in 1948. He then became a member of Brattleboro Outing Club and competed in all classes of ski jumping.

After working his way through Class C and Class B, Herb stayed in Class A for ten years before moving into the Veterans Class at age of 32. He did so without any ski coaching.

Herb has earned nearly 70 trophies and plaques including the North American Veteran's Ski Jumping Title and he won Southern New England Titles three times. Among one of his best jumps was at the U.S. Nationals where he came in ninth place out of 79 Class B jumpers at Salisbury, Conn., in

1952. His longest jumps were 202 feet at Berlin, N.H. and 201 feet at Laconia, N.H. He also competed in three World Winter Games for the Deaf as a member of the U.S. Deaf Ski Team in Berchtesgaden, W. Germany, Lake Placid, New York and Meribel, France, all as a cross country ski racer. No jumping events were held at the games since there were only two jumpers. In addition, Herb received an award of merit by the U.S. Deaf Skiers Association for outstanding

service to the sport of skiing.

When Herb first joined Digital, he worked as a keypunch operator for four years. He has spent the last three years working in the stockroom in the Shrewsbury facility where manufacturing is done for the Storage System products. During his two years as a stockkeeper, Herb worked with Doug Cam, bell, Material planner, who went to school to learn finger spelling in order for Herb and he to work together effectively.
