United Way Campaign goal for 1984 is \$1.3 million

The 1984 United Way Campaign will get underway on September 17 and continue until October 12. Rose Ann Giordano, vice president of Large Systems and this year's United Way key executive says, "Digital's two major goals for this campaign are to educate our employees about what their support of the United Way means and to meet our aggressive goals of \$1.3 million."

The United Way is primarily a fund raising organization which allocates 90 cents of every dollar raised to a wide spectrum of community services such as the Boy and Girl Scouts, YMCA, Visiting Nurses, American Red Cross and Hospice.

Rose Ann says, "Digital has identified the United Way as an effective vehicle to channel support to a large variety of social service agencies in communities throughit the country. The United Way was

Temporary labor contracts streamlined

To streamline the contracting of temporary labor services, personnel and purchasing have selected between 15 and 20 vendors to serve Digital at the same rate of pay for the same job classifications.

With the goal of contractual consistency in mind, Digital's John Shire, Administrative Supply Base manager, Corporate Purchasing, worked for 18 months with Phil Sardella, U.S. Employment manager, "doing preliminary work to get to the

point where we had a set of terms and conditions which would meet Digital's goals as well as the vendor's needs."

Prior to this project, personnel groups at each Digital location in Eastern Massachusetts and Southern New Hampshire were doing their own contracting for temporary abor, where as many as 1000 people a day were needed. "There were 45 Digital facilities dealing with 50 vendors causing a disparity in pricing. By making the pricing consistent, a cost savings was affected," John says.

Navajos use Rainbows for word processing in their native Athabascan language

Navajo students at the Rock Point Community School in Arizona will be doing word processing in their native Athabascan language, Navajo, when school begins next fall due to a cooperative effort with Digital.

At Digital's Phoenix and Albuquerque manufacturing plants, several employees became interested in the project and designed a character font for the Athabascan language family. In addition, Corporate Contributions donated three Rainbow 100 personal computers and a LA100 printer to the Rock Point Community School. This equipment will be used as part of the applied literacy and computer education curriculum to be initiated in the fall.

Nílch'i naalkidí bee ak'e'elchíhí

--The above is the Navajo word for "computer" (literally "images that go through the air") written using a new character font on the Rainbow.

Bruce Anderson, Terminals Manufacturing Group manager, played an active role getting this project going. "What started as a normal manufacturing project aimed at affirmative action and community relations, has opened potential for computing in native American tribal organizations in addition to native American educational institutions."


At the Albuquerque, New Mexico plant, Digital demonstrated the equipment to educators from the Navajo tribe and representatives from the American Indian Science and Engineering Society. "It was received with great enthusiasm when they saw how computers can make an impact on the Navajo community by increasing communication capabilities," Bruce says.

There are approximately 200,000 Navajos in the southwestern United States. The Apaches, whose language is also a member of the Athabascan language family, have expressed interest in the availability of Athabascan for Apache word processing. Bruce says other requests from American Indians have been received from Oklahoma, South Dakota and Alaska.

Digital recognizes students in ACT-SO competition

Digital recently helped support the Afrocademic, Cultural, Technological and ientific Olympics (ACT-SO) national competition for students in grades 9 through 12 held last month in Kansas City, Missouri.

Five hundred students from 176 cities competed in 21 different categories under four disciplines: humanities, performing arts, sciences and visual arts. Contributing to ACT-SO for the second year, Digital pre-

sented computers to the gold medal winners in energy, math, physics and electronics, and humanities. The gold medal winner in chemistry was also last year's awardee; his equipment will be upgraded. At the Regional Massachusetts level, four Digital groups gave \$3,000 to assist in sending the science winners to the national competition. In addition to equipment donated by companies, winners received gold, silver and bronze medals along with monetary awards of up to \$1,000 for first place winners.

ACT-SO was introduced in 1977 by Vernon Jarrett, Chicago Sun-Times columnist to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) to provide a way for black youths to be recognized for excellence in academic and cultural pursuits via maximum support of their communities.

In this year's competition, Sonya White, daughter of Ralph White, Digital manager with the Storage Systems East Test group, competed in the instrumental music division at the ACT-SO national convention. Although she did not win at the competition in Kansas City, Sonya placed first for playing her violin at the New England Conference of ACT-SO held in June. Sonya was selected as one of the 300 auditioning young violinists attending the Boston University Tanglewood Youth Institute this summer.

A number of vendors in this geographical area were solicited to submit requests for quotes on some 40 job classifications in the secretary/clerical, light industrial and technical job areas.

Corporate purchasing, along with personnel representatives from the major temporary labor user locations, participated in this negotiation process. A manageable number of vendors were put under con-

tract agreements with direct labor costs and markups set at a consistent and competitive level for this area. The agencies selected became part of the Qualified Vendor List (QVL) and their services can now be utilized at any Digital location.

"Purchasing handles the contracts and personnel deals with the temporary workforce in their day-to-day operations," John explains.
