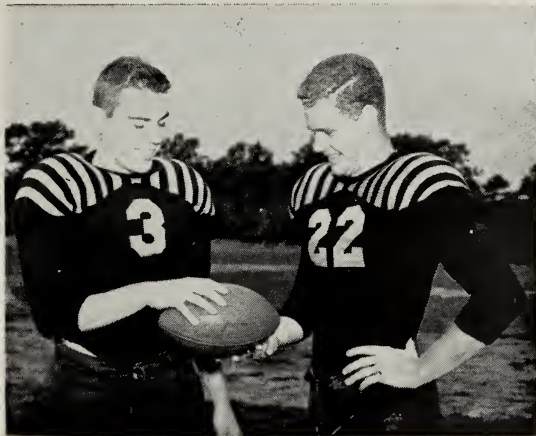

Carol Kopp decided she was very interested in The National Guard.

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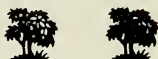
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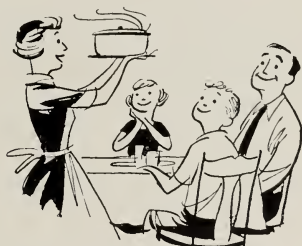
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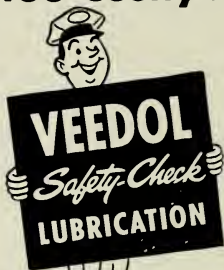
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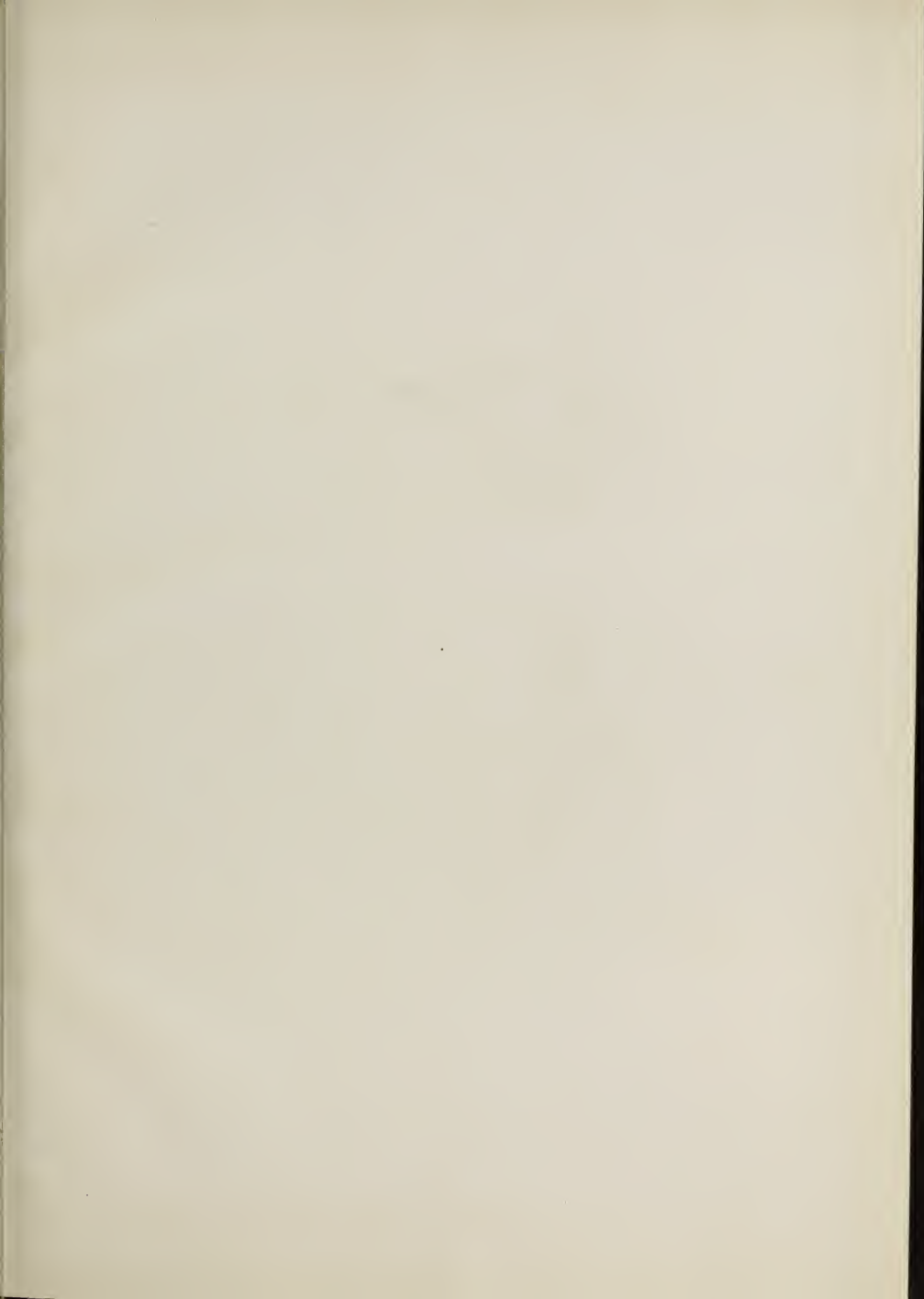
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
