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






A. JACKSON HAINES, JR. 1944 - 1990 BOARD OF HEALTH 1971 - 1980





SPECIAL TOWN MEETING HELD OCTOBER 15, 1990

MAYNARD HIGH SCHOOL AUDITORIUM-OFF GREAT ROAD

Pursant to Town Warrant #627 the Special Town Meeting, October 15, 1990, was called to order by Moderator, Richard E. Gerroir, who declared that a quorum was present.

One hundred and seventy-two voters were in attendance.

- ARTICLE 1: VOTED: to transfer from Overlay Reserve \$125,000.00 and Free Cash \$15,440.00, to provide the sum of \$140,440.00 to balance the Fy-91 Town of Maynard Budget.
- ARTICLE 2: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Local Receipts \$170,000.00 and Free Cash \$56,000.00, the sum of \$226,000.00 for the following purposes:
 - 1. \$133,000.00 for the Police Salary Account
 - \$28,000.00 for the Fire Dept. Ambulance Account
 \$65,000.00 for the DPW Expense Account for Sludge Removal and disposal.
- ARTICLE 3: VOTED: that the Town transfer \$24,000.00 from the Sale of Real Estate Account to rully relocate and reconstruct a portion of Front Street.
- ARTICLE 4: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Town of Maynard FY-91 budget line item #217 Trash Collection the sum of \$5,998. to Board of Health Article 30 of the Annual Town Meeting of May 15, 1989 to provide sufficient funds for completion of the Hillside/Parker st. lateral sewer project under the direction of the Board of Health.
- ARTICLE 5: WITHDRAWN: Housing Authority to make application to the Executive Office of Communities and Development to to construct additional units.
- ARTICLE 6: WITHDRAWN: transfer care and custody of the Roosevelt School from the Board of Selectmen to the Maynard Housing Authority.
- ARTICLE 7: VOTED: that the Town accept the provision of Chapter 40, Section 39K, to provided for the establishment of an Enterprise fund for the Water and Sewer Division of the Public Works Department.

- ARTICLE 8: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Article #7, Dechlorination Construction, Special Town Meeting of September 30, 1987, the sum of \$7,268.08 in order to pay an unpaid D.P.W. Fy-90 bill for Sludge Disposal.
- ARTICLE 9: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Article #7 Dechlorination Construction, Special Town Meeting of September 30, 1987, the sum of \$10,000.00 and to transfer \$3,560.00 from Local Receipts to fund a Pilot Plant Study as required by the Department of Environmental Protection, Commonwealth of Massachusetts as the first step to determine if filtration will be required for White Pond Surface water supply under the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act and the rules and regulations enacted thereunder.
- ARTICLE 10: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Article #7, Dechlorination Construction, Special Town Meeting of September 30, 1987, the sum of \$10,000.00 ro replace unserviceable fire hydrants in various locations.
- ARTICLE 11: VOTED: that the Town transfer from Article #7, Dechlorination Construction, Special Town Meeting of September 30, 1987, the sum of \$2,000.00 to be used as supplemental engineering fees for the Water and Sewer Divisions.
- ARTICLE 12: VOTED: that the Town authorize the Maynard Fire Department, pursuant to Chapter 40, Section 4A of the Massachusetts General Laws, to purchase fire and medical supplies and equipment from the Massachusetts Fire District 14 Equipment Bid List, established in compliance with the Uniform Procurement Act, otherwise known as Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 30B.
- ARTICLE 13: VOTED: that the Town appropriate to the use of the Conservation Commission, all sums currently on deposit in the Wetlands Protection Fund, such funds to be used by the Conservation Commission in carrying out its duties under the Wetland Protection Act.
- ARTICLE 14: VOTED: that the Town transfer the sum of \$867.21 from FY-91 Veterans Benefits to FY-91 Veterans Expenses.
- ARTICLE 15: VOTED: that the Town accept the provision of Massachusetts
 General Laws Chapter 32, Section 22D providing for certain changes in the Town of Maynard retirement system.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF REGISTRARS OF VOTERS

To the Citizens of Maynard:

The Board of Registrars herewith submit their Annnual Report for the year ending December 31, 1990.

The Annual Listing of residents was conducted beginning January 1, 1990, as prescribed by law, Chapter 51, Section 4, of the General Laws. The Census was completed by the end of March. Street lists were available by the first of June.

The Board of Registrars held extra sessions of registration of voters, prior to the Annual Town Meeting, May 21. 1990, Special Town Meeting, May 22, 1990, Annual Town Election, May 7, 1990, Special Town Meeting, September 24, 1990, State Primary, September 18, 1990, State Election, November 6, 1990, and met before each election to certify names on nomination papers.

At the close of 1990, the number of registered voters is as follows:

The Board of Registrars would like to encourge residents of Maynard to register to vote. Your vote is important.

Voter Registration

In order to vote at town, state and national elections and to vote at town meetings, town residents must be registered voters. Voter registration is a simple and conveient process. However, there are some legal time constrainst that must be observed.

1. Normal Registration

Any voter who qualifies may register at the office of the Town Clerk during norman office hours.

Qualifications

An applicant for registration must be at least 18 years of age by the date of the election and a citizen of the United States.

3. Special Times of Registration prior to Election

Additional special times of registration prior to elections and town meetings are established by state statue. The state statue, also, sets registration deadlines (closing) for elections and town meetings. Times of registration are posted and put in local newspapers.

4. Registration procedures

Registration is a very simple process. One merely has to complete and sign an "Affidavit of Registration" which asks such questions as name, place of birth, date of birth.

Special papers (e.g. naturalization papers, birth certificates) are nor normally required when registering.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Meetings of the Finance Committee were convened 41 times during 1990 to consider budgetary issues concerning the Town of Maynard.

Annual Town Meeting

Recommendations on the fiscal year 1991 operating budget were made to voters on the occasion of the Annual Town Meeting of May 21, 1990. The committee had initially prepared a recommended budget which was 1.6% less than the prior fiscal year. The successful override of Proposition 2 1/2 in the spring election, however, provided an additional \$347,000 of anticipated funds for the support of the Maynard Public School system. The resulting budget recommendation surpassed the prior year budget by 4.3%

Multi-Town Session

On June 23, 1990 the Maynard Finance Committee hosted a joint session attended by members of finance committees from Acton, Chelmsford, Concord, Harvard, Stow and Wayland for the purpose of exchanging information on making fewer dollars go further. Massachusetts State Representative Cile Hicks also attended to discuss prospects for local aid.

Town Charter

Members of the committee met several times during the year with the Maynard Charter Commission to discuss the current budgetary process and to consider fiscal procedures the Town might adopt as part of a newly created charter.

Auditor's Management Report

With the cooperation of Mr. Harry Gannon, Town Accountant, the Finance Committee met with Mr. Thomas Scanlon, Certified Public Accountant, on July 17, 1990 to discuss the annual audit performed by his firm of the Town's financial statements, accounting controls and procedures. As a result of this meeting, recommendations to enhance the existing system of controls are being examined and discussed with the relevant town boards and departments.

Special Town Meeting

Among articles presented by various boards to realign budgets, on October 15, 1990 the Finance Committee supported an article for the Department of Public Works to establish an enterprise fund for the Water and Sewer Division.

Such a fund will improve the department's ability to plan for necessary replacement of aging lines and components to insure a safe, reliable system.

Reserve Fund

Throughout fiscal year 1990, the Finance Committee, as custodian of the Town's Reserve Fund, considered requests for transfers to meet unforseen expenses incurred by various departments conducting Town business. Such approved transfers are summarized below, by department.

FISCAL 1990 REPORT - BOARD OF ASSESSOR

The Maynard Assessing department, during fiscal year 1990, has made a concerted effort to track the changing real estate market. Due the fiscal restraints in the town and the assertive attitude of the personnel, the department is meeting the challenge by addressing the Department of Revenue's certification requirements in-house. Since the relisting and revaluation of the Commercial/Industrial properties is an extensive undertaking, this work has been contracted out to the firm of Dolan and Rossi Appraisal Company.

The goal of the Assessing department is to value each real and personal property in the town of Maynard equally and at "full and fair market" value. This process is, and always has been, most important to the Board of Assessors. We continually review all sales and calculate statistical parameters including the assessed

property values vs. the sale price.

Maynard, as in other Commonwealth towns, has noticed a declining market. However, by statistical analysis, we can monitor the equality of our values and the overall shifting of the real estate market. Through these practices we can stay abreast of shifts and factor our assessments as needed.

This continuing statistical analysis is good and important. Equally important is the taxpayers understanding of assessment dates and fiscal years. Fiscal year assessments are based upon the previous calendar year's market. Thus, the assessments stated on tax bill for fiscal year 1990 reflect the market in calendar year 1988, for an assessment date of January 1, 1989. These dates and practices are set forth in the general laws relating to municipal finance and taxation.

Question regarding assessment dates and/or other questions relating to the assessing practices may be directed to Assessor's

Office between the hours of 9am to 4pm daily.

During FY90, the Assistant Assessor visited past and present building permits, current sales, and began a door to door relisting of all properties. This process will be an ongoing practice within the town of Maynard. Along with this activity the Assessing office processed to following applications:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MAYNARD CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR 1990

During the calendar year 1990 the Conservation Commission held fourteen regular meetings and three special meetings. Ten public hearings and three continued hearings were held relative to applications under the Wetlands Protection Act.

Numerous site inspections were carried out throughout the year and several site plans were reviewed. The Commission was consulted on five Requests for Determination of the Act, six Notices of Intent were reviewed and two enforcement orders were issued.

Lack of maintenance for the detention basin and other problems at Vose Hill required a joint Commission and DEP site inspection which resulted in an enforcement order issued by the DEP in April.

Members of the Commission attended a Stow Selectmens' hearing in July regarding the proposed Air National Guard construction at the Sudbury Annex. The Commission submitted a letter of deposition to the Secretary of Environmental Affairs in August outlining concerns relative to this project and related issues.

The Open Space Plan, in final form, became available to the public in August. Copies may be acquired through the office of the Town Clerk at a cost of \$4 per copy.

The Commission acquired one parcel of land on Maybury Road in October. The Lewis Street site was surveyed and trees removed in preparation for future improvements.

Lois Tetreault joined the Commission in September. Carl Mansfield left the Commission in August and the board extends to him many thanks for his interest and assistance during his term.

We wish to thank those who aided the Commission throughout the year; most notably Eagle Scout Paul Maria who removed brush, laid trails and composed maps for the Summer Hill conservation land. Boy Scouts also assisted in the removal of debris at the sewer dike between Charles and Everett Streets and we wish to extend our gratitude for their efforts.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

Council meetings are held the first Monday of each month. The council sponsors the Drop-In Center, an exercise program and a podiatry clinic. The council office also takes fuel assistance applications for SMOC. A paralegal and the lawyer from the Senior Citizens Law Project are available in Maynard once a month. The council mails the COA Newsletter, THE QUARTERLY, to everyone in Maynard over the age of 60. Also, the council prepares the monthly newsletter for the Maynard Senior Citizens' Club. Digital prints both newsletters for the seniors. Council members worked at the can and bottle return area of the Recycling Center in October and the check from the redemption center was deposited in the Van Fund.

The Formula Grant of \$3,323.00 was used to support the Drop-In, the Friendly Visitor Program and the exercise instruction. It was also used for QUARTERLY postage.

Due to ill health, Anne Duclos resigned as Director of the Drop-In. Congratulations go out to Anne for 14 years of leadership and service. Joan LeVangie is the new Director at the Drop-In, which continues to be a popular meeting spot for seniors once a week. The fall project was the crocheting of toy hammocks for patients at New England Pediatric Care in Billerica. Blood pressure clinics are held at 10:00 AM on the second Tuesdays.

Some statistics include: phone calls - 4,220; office visits - 599; podiatry visits - 138; exercise visits - 210; transportation trips - 9,500 (handicapped - 509); and flu shots - 316.

The minibus traveled 16,780 miles during the year. The driver is Sam Seel and the office staff consists of Carol Barney and Vieno DeRosby.

Marion Battye resigned as Coordinator of the Friendly Visitor Program. We thank her for a job well done and we know many volunteers and seniors have benefited greatly from the program.

Our thanks to the Selectmen, Town Boards and Committees, the Senior Citizens' Club and the Elks for their support.

Once again our office would like to remind the residents and dog owners that there is an enforceable Leash Law in the Town of Maynard, between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M.; 7 days a week all dogs are to be restrained.

FIRE DEPARTMENT TOWN REPORT

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

During calendar year 1990 your fire department responded to 1,081 calls. This is an 11.7% decrease in the number of calls compared to 1989. This decrease can be attributed to several factors. Some of these factors are; stronger and more effective Public Fire Education and Fire Prevention Programs, goal oriented plans review and strict code enforcement, having Town Meeting accept Massachusetts General Laws which require fire detection and fire suppression systems, creating a Fire Alarm System By-Law which established a schedule of fines for anyone who does not maintain their fire alarm systems which otherwise cause false alarms and system malfunctions.

During the calendar year the number of serious fires has been kept to a minimum. However, there were two tragic drownings. One was on January 28th in a canoeing accident on the Assabet River and the other on June 8th in a residential swimming pool accident.

Even though we had no fatal fires this year, everyone must remain alert to this possibility. Smoke detectors are still the most important device in providing an early warning so that the occupants of a building can escape before being trapped or overcome by smoke and deadly gases. Smoke detectors must be maintained and tested regularly. For battery operated smoke detectors the International Fire Service promotes a yearly campaign which recommends that in the Spring and Fall seasons when you change your clock, you change the batteries in your smoke detectors.

The Emergency Medical Services in the department had another busy year. This included the addition of a new advanced technique in early defibrillation. All department Emergency Medical Technicians were trained and certified by Emerson Hospital Paramedics and the Emergency Department's Medical Director in the operation of our new semi-automatic defibrillator which is used on all cardiac arrest victims. This \$7,000.00 First Medic defibrillator, donated to the department by the Digital Equipment Corporation, is the latest tool, certified for ambulance EMT use, in the battle against sudden death caused by heart disfunction. Medical research has shown that most people who suffer heart

attacks, will most likely go into ventricular fibrillation and collapse within the first two hours of chest pain symptoms. If we are called quickly, and arrive within the first eight minutes of collapse, we will have the opportunity to defibrillate the heart back into normal operation.

Shortly after placing the new defibrillator in service this summer, we were called to a local business for a man collapsed and not breathing. Our ambulance crew was able to reach the patient in less than two minutes. His heart had stopped pumping and it was in ventricular fibrillation. Our new defibrillator was used immediately and his heart was converted to normal pulsing instantly. The patient awoke and began to speak to our EMT's. This success story gave us great satisfaction in the fact that the training and technology applied has increased our ability to save lives.

Your Fire Chief was appointed under Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 48, Section 42, which requires the Fire Chief to annually report the condition of the fire department, including the apparatus, equipment and facilities.

As we constantly report, the facilities for the Police and Fire Departments are totally inadequate. Each year gets worse as more space is needed for storage of records, equipment and other materials. This lack of proper facilities has a substantially negative impact on our ability to provide the best level of services that is required.

Concerning apparatus, each piece of apparatus will be commented separately.

Engine 1 is twelve years old and slowly rusting away. If funds are not made available soon to repair the rust damage, it will require replacement at a substantially greater cost.

Engine 2 is now eighteen years old and quickly rusting into uselessness. To keep equipment from falling out of some compartments, we continue to poprivet pieces of sheet metal onto the sides and bottoms of these compartments. In 1991 I will be requesting funds to replace this vehicle.

Engine 3 is now twenty two years old and still in decent condition because small amounts of money have been used to keep it so. This vehicle will continue to serve us well as a third Engine if it is not forced into excessive use because of the poor condition of Engine 2.

Engine 4 is a 1988 GMC Brush Fire Vehicle and used by the Captains for inspections and investigations. It is in excellent shape and will be good for several years to come.

Ladder 1 was purchased in 1985 and continues to be in perfect condition and serving us well. It will give us many years of dependable service.

The Ambulance is a 1989 Ford Wheeled Coach and is in excellent condition. This vehicle meets all our needs and was paid for with the money collected by the Ambulance Billing Program.

Concerning the fire department, there are 5 personnel on duty at all times. There is One Dispatcher and One Captain and Three Firefighters to respond to fires, medical emergencies and other type The on-duty personnel perform many other functions including cleaning and maintaining the Fire Station, firefighting training, medical training, hazardous materials training, cleaning and maintaining the apparatus and equipment, fire inspections, smoke detector inspections, teaching public education and CPR classes, pre-fire planning of large buildings, hose testing, pump testing, assisting in maintaining more than 400 fire hydrants, plans review of new construction and new sub-divisions, fire alarm work and other related duties. To provide dependable Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services we must continue to have a minimum of 5 personnel on duty. this MINIMUM MANNING is reduced in any way, because funding for the fire department is reduced, it will have a drastic effect on what we can provide for Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services. It will affect our Fire Insurance Rating, thus raising everyone's insurance premiums. The Insurance Service Office considers the number of personnel on duty to respond to fires as one of the most critical factors when establishing a Fire Insurance Rating. This rating determines everyone's fire insurance premiums.

We have continued our Public Fire Education Programs in our schools and community. Firefighters go into the schools with our mascot "Sparky" to teach the children about fire safety. Handouts are passed out so that they bring home information on home fire safety.

Ofter, parents stop me on the street and discuss a fire safety problem that they may have at home that they discovered from the information brought home by their child. This tells me that the program is helpful.

We continue our fire prevention inspections of business and industry. Potential hazards are pointed out to the property owner and followed up on to make sure that corrections are made. Every fire prevented has the potential of saving the Town the substantial amount of money that would be needed for extinguishment.

We continuously study all the programs under the responsibility of the fire department. We constantly update many of these programs, including Fire Training, Emergency Medical Care, Fire Prevention, Fire Suppression, Hazardous Materials Training, Water Supply and Care and Maintenance of Apparatus and Equipment. All these activities are maintained by the Fire Department budget.

I have attended many meeting this year with Chiefs from our surrounding towns looking at the possibility of a regionalized communications center. An article will be presented at Town Meeting to keep this option open.

For those interested in statistics, the number and type of calls responded to by this department are listed separately.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Administrative Assistant, Police Department, Department of Public Works, the Building, Health and Wire Inspectors, other Town Officials, Town Employees and citizens of the Town of Maynard who have assisted the Maynard Fire Department over the past year for their cooperation and support.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1990

TO THE CITIZENS OF MAYNARD:

The Board of Health hereby reports to the citizens of Maynard a summary of its activities for Calendar year 1990, ending December 31, 1990. The following major areas were handled by our Board:

- 1) The lateral sewer project involving residences on both Hillside and Parker Streets was put out to bid, contracts were awarded and the project was completed by Nov. 1990. This is a project that has been in planning and funding stages for the past several years. This project has resulted in our Board ending a source of pollution for the Assabet River.
- 2) A new area of involvement by our Board consists of us working with the School Department to help alleviate air quality problems at the Green Meadow School. With help and advice from the State Department of Public Health we were able to help pinpoint sources of problems with the Air Exchange System. We purchased a Draeger Air Sampling pump and testing tubes and are now monitoring air quality at the Green Meadow School during the school year. Due to changes in filters and extra attention to the Air Exchange System, good test results have been obtained.
- 3) As in recent years a great deal of time has been taken up with our involvement as Manager of the Town wide Solid Waste Program. The following areas and issues were handled:
- a) <u>Composting</u> we are now into our 3rd year of composting leaves. We instituted a Spring collection conducted on May 2, 1990. This collection along with 2 collections in the Fall on Oct. 27th and Nov. 10th were staffed by volunteer help consisting of:

In addition, the vehicles were donated by Byrne Excavating and Chiodo Construction.

A town wide collection was conducted by our curbside contractor, Vining Disposal on Dec. 1; but without the help of our volunteers the program would have been much more costly.

- b) New Curbside Contractor Thanks to help from the Maynard Police Department and in cooperation with the City of Marlboro, our previous contractor was determined to have violated his contract with the Town. His contract was terminated and a contract favorable to the Town of Maynard was negotiated and signed in April of 1990 with Vining Disposal Co. of Medford, Ma. Much time was spent on this aspect and an elaborate check-in system is in place and continues to be implemented.
- c) New Regulations With increased concern toward eliminating tonnage from our monthly tipping bill, the Board adopted a regulation that requires homeowners purchase a decal from the Board of Health and affix it to metal appliances or other heavy objects. Contact the Board of Health office for the details. We do have an ongoing metal collection dumpster in place at our Recycling Center at the DPW Garage area.
- d) Recycling we are now entering our third year of recycling in Maynard. We continue to provide a manned Recycling Center on the First and Third Saturdays of each month from 9 A.M. 12 Noon. The site is located at the rear of the DPW Garage area at the end of Winter Street. In total 25 Collection events were held in 1990, one of which was a Hazardous Waste Collection Day. The following items were collected in the quantities indicated:

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Newspaper 160 tons - Net savings - $3,000 Glass 27 tons - Net savings - $2,000 Tin & Metal 15 tons - Net savings - $750 Office Paper 2 tons - Net savings - $250 Leaves 200 tons - Net savings - $4,600 Christmas Trees - 1050 trees Net savings - \frac{5}{700} Total Net savings - $11,400
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The Hazardous items eliminated from the Waste System are:

- 6/8/90 Hazardous Waste Collection Day- 12 55 gallon drums of hazardous materials and 8 pounds of reactive chemicals.
- 6/16/90 Automotive Day 72 car batteries 507 passenger tires 10 truck tires.

You are reminded to return your used motor oil to the store you purchased it from or to deal with vendors who advertise that they take used motor oil.

Midway through 1990 we experienced problems with the plastics we were collecting for grinding and disposal. Since the Fall of 1990 we no longer collect any form of plastic at the Recycling Center.

The Board of Health continues to do planning in this area. We are actively pursuing the idea of instituting a mandatory Curbside Recycling program. Our Board has applied to the State for a grant for monies to be used to purchase the Curbside "Blue Boxes" that would be needed for this program.

- 4) Our Board was active in the area of Health promotion as it continued or instituted the following programs:
- a) We conducted our Third Health Fair on Saturday April, 7, 1990. Due to bad weather and a small attendance, we have re-evaluated this service and will not put the Health Fair on in 1991.
- b) A mandatory No Smoking Policy was instituted for all public buildings throughout the town.
- c) Our 20 year old Massage regulations were updated according to the therapeutic advances in this field.
- d) We participated in the 24th Annual Christmas Parade and our float was awarded the Philip Bohunicky Trophy.
- 5) Our restaurant program was audited by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. Based on some very good suggestions from their office, we have implemented the following changes:
- a) A more comprehensive plan review process for proposed Food Establishments has been adopted.
- b) A fee surcharge system that gives a monetary incentive for Food program managers to avoid repeated follow-up inspection was also adopted.

REPORT OF THE HOUSING AUTHORITY

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Herewith is the Report of the Maynard Housing Authority for the year ending December 31, 1990

At this time the Authority's three Elderly and Handicapped Developments are fully occupied, Powdermill Circle (fifty-six units), Concord Street Circle (fifty-six units) and Summerhill Glen (Thirty units). In 1990, there were twelve new tenants in Powdermill Circle, nine new tenants in Concord Street Circle and four new tenants in Summerhill Glen.

The HUD Low-Rent Family Development, Dawn Grove (thirty-two units), is also fully occupied at this time, there were seven new tenants that moved into this Development in 1990.

The Authority also subsidizes sixteen scattered site units funded under the State's 707 Rental Assistance Program.

The Mod. Rehab. Project at #1 and #3 Florida Court and #9 Florida Road are completely leased up. A total of 18 units were renovated and brought up to required code standards.

Discussion was held with the Board of Selectmen about possible acquisition of the now vacant Roosevelt School by the Authority for multi purpose usage. Possible considerations were Elderly Congregate, Elderly Daycare and DMH Programs. Due to the State fiscal situation the Authority has been unable to secure any funding for the site but will continue to seek a source so that we may obtain this useful site. We were pleased to see the cooperative spirit return between boards.

The financial health of the state and town are precarious and the prognosis for the future is not good. The effects of a level funded budget and ever increasing demand for services and library materials continued at an intense speed. From an administrative perspective, these financial constraints and increased library use, monopolized the energies of the staff to the exclusion of other library activities.

Just enough to keep the doors open but not enough resources and time to do any extensive programming, planning or undertake maintenance projects. Overcrowded quarters makes working conditions stressful and limits the use of the library collection, because it becomes more difficult to find the desired book.

However, the library continued to serve the community as a source of information, education and entertainment. The sharp increase in circulation, Story Time registrations and the use of the library building and its resources indicated the library's usefulness to the community.

Throughout the year the Children's/Circulation Librarian offered Story Time for preschoolers on Thursday mornings. These programs required registration for each session to limit overcrowding and to make sure everyone had a chance to attend. Community School continued their weekly visits to the library, usually sending two groups in succession weather permitting.

During the spring and before the schools let out for the summer, a school visit blitz was organized. The Children's librarian talked about books and the public library with the children in 8 Kindergarten classes, 7 First Grades, 6 Second grades, 7 Third grades, 4 Fourth grades, 4 Fifth grades. Eight of the classes came to the public library, while the Children's librarian visited the others in the schools. In each class she talked about how to get a library card, explained the procedures and responsibilities in checking out books, discussed the summer reading programs in the public library. She also introduced a dozen or so books that fit their age and interests. In the younger classes stories were read and in the older classes books were discussed and excerpts read -enough

to peak their interest. Response to these efforts were gratifying and throughout the summer these students used the public library on a regular basis.

During the summer months the library sponsored a Summer Reading Program called: Undercover Investigator - a mystery theme popular with the children. In addition to books, each registrant received a packet containing bookmarks, reading folders, an ID card, a small magnifying lens and footprint stickers. Over 160 children signed up and they enjoyed participating in the program.

All through the year a number of special exhibits were featured in the glass display cases as well as a variety of book displays throughout the library. Mr.Brad Thompson mounted a display showing the history of the vacuum tube, which elicited many nostalgic comments of our older patrons.

Another very popular exhibit was a baseball display showing many Maynard baseball memorabilia that belonged to the Maynard Historical Society. Mr. Ralph Sheridan was most gracious in sharing many historical photographs as were several of our staff members who brought in special items from home.

Again we were the fortunate recipient of Nancy Bailey's talents who designed and dressed the large display case for these special exhibits.

The School Age Child Care (SACC) program set a schedule early in the summer when their different groups would come to the library. This schedule was maintained throughout the summer and they were also able to participate in special activities going on in the library. In August drama classes for children entering first and second grades were offered by Nancy Bailey as a summer activity.

The Friends of the Library held their annual Book Sale in Memorial Park in September. In addition to the Book Sale, the Friends also organized the Bottle and Newspaper Collection and an Annual Holiday Giving Program (Wishlist'90) in December. The proceeds of these events were used to purchase passes to the Boston Museum of Science, The New England Aquarium, the Museum of Fine Arts and the Massachusetts Audubon Society (Drumlin Farm).

As in previous years the Maynard Public Library was one of the places in town that provided the Massachusetts and Federal Income Tax forms for the average householder as well as many tax publications and preparation aids.

The Maynard Learning Center continued to use the library's space and services for their students during the time the library is closed. Participants in the Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language programs met in the library and used the library's resources for projects and homework. The librarian also provided instruction in methods of the using the library. The greatly increased enrollment in these programs filled the library to capacity during the hours of instruction.

We, the Maynard Board of Library Trustees, hereby submit to you our 1990 annual report.

After the annual town election of May 1990, Mr. Willis F. Bean was re-elected to a three year term.

A June board meeting resulted in the election of Philip W.Bohunicky Board Chairman, Willis Bean Secretary, and William Cullen Third Member.

The decision of you Board of Trustees was unanimous in deciding to honor the request of the Board of Selectman made through the Finance Committee to maintain level funding for the year. It was felt that if sound fiscal and managerial practices were applied that the facilities could remain constant and services expanded for the fiscal year.

The Board accepted the recommendation of the head librarian to fill the vacancy of the circulation librarian with a children's librarian in order to expand children's programs. This decision yielded a very positive response by our library patrons.

Programs for the elderly were maintained, bookmobile and book loans at elderly housing locations reflected an increase in usage.

The basic and standard library services such as reference research, and the normal circulation of periodicals and books all reflected marked increases.

Computers at some point in time will play a more critical role in library services. A study was made to test the way our citizens feel about it's implementation and the results seemed to indicate that a slow but steady direction should be taken.

The Planning Board met on a regular basis on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month. We also held two special meetings.

A definitive subdivision plan was approved for Garden Way. A preliminary subdivision plan was approved for Espie Ave. Extension. Approval of the definitive subdivision plan for Vose Hill was rescinded, and the Board worked closely with Town Counsel, the Department of Public Works, and residents to reinstate road work at the site. The subdivision of Olde Marlborough Road Estates entered into foreclosure and was taken over by Hayes Development Corp., at which time it was renamed Autumn Woods. Members of the Board also continued discussions with the people involved with the plans of Thompson Farm, Russell Heights, Hilltop Lane and Sanford Estates.

Site Plan Approval was given to Mobil Oil Corp. for its Great Road and Main St. location, as well as to Ray & Sons at 183 Main St. Site Plans were determined not to be necessary for locations at 60, 129, 159 and 183 Main St., and the Bagel Stop at Assabet Village Marketplace. Site Plan application for 13 Brown Street was denied.

Subdivision Control Law Approval Not Required (ANR) was approved for 93 Acton St., 15 High St., 15-17 Glendale St., and Burns Court; and the ANR application of Lot 1, Summer Hill Glen was denied.

The Board presented warrant articles at the Annual Town Meeting with reference to \$3,000 to update the site plan rules for the Town and \$1,000 to computerize the Town by-laws. In deference to the Town's financial status, these were withdrawn. An article to expand the Sign By-Law was proposed and was withdrawn after discussion.

We wish to thank and encourage the citizens of the Town who have attended our meetings and hearings. The input from these citizens is recognized and greatly appreciated. We offer a special thank you to the Town officials who have lent their assistance, particularly Walter Sokolowski, Superintendent of Public Works; Richard Roggeveen, Building Inspector; Walter Carbone, Chairman of the Conservation Commission; Joseph P. J. Vrabel, Town Counsel; and Barry Bachrach, office of the Town Counsel.

REPORT OF THE POLICE CHIEF

TO: THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Submitted herewith is the Annual Report of the Maynard Police Department for the year 1990

The beginning of 1990 continued as in the past with a less than adequate budget. Looking at a major shortage in January of well over \$100,000.00 and the possible layoff of at least ten officers, the Town put a freeze on the filling of three (3) positions to help reduce the deficit. This along with the cooperation of the Union in changing to a temporary 5 & 2 work schedule for the Department due to losing the positions provided the best possible coverage for both the Town and the Officers at this reduced level of manning. This coverage was by no means adequate (3 men on a shift) for the type of activity that goes on in Maynard requiring police response. There also was additional response from other Town Departments to help fund the remaining Police Department deficit of \$64,250.00. These Departments put off purchases or had small amounts of money left over in their budgets which they turned over to us at a Special Town Meeting allowing us to get to July 1st. Without this cooperation from everyone the Town could have been in a major crisis if more than half of the department (ten to twelve positions) had been laid off.

The past July we started with another severely reduced budget, but were given a most needed financial boost when we got \$133,000.00 in October (Special Town Meeting) to cover our salary short fall. Although our outlook for FY91 looks better than last year it would not take much to create a shortage of funds putting us back into a crisis.

As in the past the need for new police facilities to replace the present deplorable ones must be a continusing priority, as is the removal of the Department from Civil Service to provide for better hiring procedure.

The Department completed a change of service weapons going from the S & W .357 revolver to the Glock 9 mm. semi-automatic which will reduce department liability, increase shooter efficiency and even more importantly enhance officer safety.

We have continued our efforts in investigating drug offenses, again with a lot of success even with limited resources. Being a member of the Central Middlesex Drug Task Force is very beneficial in these tough economic times and has helped Maynard as well as other area cities and towns in it. Our efforts in solving other crimes (B & E's, larcenies, etc.) has also been increased the past year due to the dedication of various officers in investigating and solving these cases.

Our community service program continues to benefit the community achieving 8925 hours of work being donated to the Town. The court as part of sentencing assesses a certain amount of hours work a person must do for a community. We have used these people in various department projects saving the Town money.

Traffic enforcement was a priority again the past year as requests for enforcement continued to rise. Our efforts in enforcing traffic regulations can be seen by the increase in citations issued. The study into a truck exclusion for Summer Street and its approval which took over a year was completed in November. It involves both Maynard and Stow's sections and we are awaiting signs being erected in both Towns to implement the detour.

We had three new officers join the Department this past year to fill existing positions. Officers Lisa Davis, Gregory Balzotti, and Michael Rochon all with previous police training and experience (saving the Town about \$60,000.00). Sergeant Patrick S. Currin retired after twenty (20) years of dedicated service to the Town. We also had two officers resign.

The operation of a police department depends on three important ingredients; good manpower, reliable equipment, and strong support of the community, to do the job and in getting the first two. The Police Department owes the community that gives them that support the best protection and police response possible for their law enforcement needs and to provide good police officers. In Maynard we have always tried to get and keep good police officers. These police officers in accepting this employment implicitly agree that they will not engage in conduct which calls into question their ability and fitness to perform their official responsibilities and those that don't, cannot and will not remain.

In the area of calls for service and police assistance the department received over 6887 calls for police response or assistance compared to 6149 for 1989. We served 704 arrest warrants, capias, 209A's, and summons for other departments as well as our own.

The Parking Section processed over 7,017 tickets, 3,717 hearings, fines and registry letters and 158 summons.

Accidents reported this year totaled 322 compared to 362 for 1989. Thirty accidents involved personal injury (52 in 1989), 11 involved pedestrians (2 in 1989), 13 were hit and run (19 in 1989). We had no fatalities in 1990, 1989 or 1988 (1 in 1987).

In conclusion I would like to thank and commend the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Fire Department, Department of Public

Works, the Auxiliary Police, other Town Employees and Officials, the Maynard Rod & Gun Club for use of its ranges, the citizens of the Town and all others that have assisted the Police Department over the past year for their cooperation and valuable support.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSIONERS TO THE CITIZENS OF MAYNARD

Herewith is presented the Annual Report of the Board of Public Works for the year ending December 31, 1990.

The Board of Public Works conducted 17 regular meetings and 2 special meetings during the year 1990. The Board members attended various public hearings and meetings conducted by other boards and committees and reported on matters affecting the Department of Public Works.

The year 1990 saw the retirement of Mr. Nicholas P. Kavalchuck, Sr., Foreman, Glenwood Cemetery, after thirty-seven plus years of service to the Town. The Board thanked Mr. Kavalchuck for his many years of service and wished him well in his retirement years. Mr. John Vincent, Cemetery Division, is currently serving as Acting Foreman, of Glenwood Cemetery.

The Special Town Meeting in October, as authorized under Massachusetts General Laws, enacted the establishment of a system of Enterprise Fund Accounting for the water and sewer divisions and including the wastewater treatment plant. With careful and planned implementation in 1991, the townspeople may be assured of much needed improvements and maintenance of the system through rate structuring. The Town of Maynard is fortunate to have a water and sewer system of the magnitude that it is. However, a careful and guided approach to the well being of the system must be foremost.

The Town of Acton is presently conducting with our consulting engineers, a study and planned request for a portion of the Town of Acton to tie into our wastewater treatment plant. Numerous meetings and technical sessions have taken place. A proposal in the from of an article for Town Meeting, 1991, will give Maynard residents facts and information to consider allowing such a tie-in. It must be stated that the townspeople will have the final say with their vote.

Our road program continues with the completion of Parker Street south in FY'91. Also, lower Parker Street, Powder Mill Road, and upper Main Street are targeted for improvements in the near future. Also, the secondary system will see improvements.

Every available dollar of State funds will be sought to continue the program.

A tree nursery was established on Town owned land which will provide shade trees for the future. The Board thanks the Boy Scouts of America, Troop 130, for efforts to bring this project to completion. The department assisted with heavy equipment as needed. Trees, townwide, require much time and labor to maintain. We strive to tend to the needs as the budget allows.

The re-development and cleaning of Well #2 off Old Marlboro Road was completed with excellent results. Our plans call for further groundwater exploration and development to provide ample sources of water for the future.

The Department of Public Works assisted other departments, boards, and committees again, as in the past, throughout the year. We share the thoughts and concerns of the various boards and committees in future planning, environmental concerns and the disposition of the problems we face.

In closing, we wish to thank all Town officials, boards and committees, and the Superintendent of Public Works, for their cooperation during the year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF PUBLIC WORKS

Herewith is submitted the Annual Report of the Superintendent of Public Works for the calendar year ending December 31, 1990 which includes the divisions of Highway, Water, Sewer, Cemetery, Parks, Trees, and Administrative.

HIGHWAY DIVISION

Approximately one mile of Parker Street was resurfaced this year, under the Chapter 90 Program. Final work remains to be completed in the spring of 1991. Also, 2400 ft. of Summer Hill Road was paved, resulting in a great improvement.

The infra-red pavement maintenance program was again used this year with good results. Roads receiving this type of work were Summer Street, Concord Street, Brown Street, Acton Street, Powdermill Road, Parker Street, Walnut Street, and Main Street. This method allows for repairs of cross-trenches, water and sewer trenches, utility patching, etc. bringing the roadways into a much better condition.

Surface treatment, sand-seal program, will continue in 1991. We continue to work closely with the Gas Company officials who are replacing older gas mains in areas we plan to sand-seal. Their cooperation has been excellent.

Castings Adjusted

Sidewalks

Sidewalk repairs were made on Main Street, Summer Street, Concord Street, Thomas Street, Acton Street, Parker Street, Great Road, and Beacon Street. The sidewalk on the east side of Powdermill Road will be completed in 1991. Utility poles and hydrant relocations remain. Also, additional sidewalk work on Parker Street is also planned.

Drainage

A program to clean drain lines had been re-established in 1989. We continue to clean by mechanical means as many lines as possible each year beginning with the older ones. Progress has been very

Drainage . .continued

good. Drainage studies are underway in the Summer Street, Howard Road area, where surcharges have inconvenienced residents in that area.

Drainage work was completed on Beacon Street, Thomas Street, and Summer Hill Road this year solving long-standing problems in those areas.

We plan to provide additional drainage work on Assabet Street in 1991. Funds are limited on these projects, resulting in some needed projects being deferred. Motorist and pedestrian safety is considered in this type of work.

Catch Basins

All catch basins were cleaned during the year in the roadways, parking lots and schools.

Catch basins were rebuilt on Parker Street, Old Marlboro Road, Howard Road, Reo Road, Florida Road, Walnut Street, Durant Avenue, Waltham Street, Thomas Street, Rice Road, George Road, Dix Road, Sunset Road, Main Street and Beacon Street.

Regular Maintenance

There were some 150 small asphalt paving jobs done during the year using approximately 250 tons of Type I - mix. These jobs consisted of the repair of trenches, driveway aprons, berms, run-off swales that were previously prepared during the year.

The streets were swept of winter sand and debris. The streets in the downtown area were swept twice weekly, weather permitting. The sidewalks were also swept. Many hours were spent on litter control. Trash barrels were placed in the regular areas downtown and in the parks, and emptied twice weekly. Grass was mowed as necessary in all parks, also roadsides and around fences and guardrails. Also, poison ivy control was necessary in areas affected at parks and fields, roadsides, etc.

The Highway Division cooperated with other divisions in pooling men and equipment to accomplish needed tasks of the department.

Vehicles-Equipment Replacement

This program continues although funding has been reduced due to budget cuts. We will continue to replace older vehicles and equipment on a priority basis with available funding.

Street Lighting

All Street Lighting will be eventually changed over to high pressure sodium because of the reduced costs.

A survey, completed in late 1990, will reduce the number of street lights due to budget contraints. This reduction will be done in a manner that is consistent with public safety. This work continues. Energy cost increases have all but eliminated the savings realized, due to the situation in the Mid-East.

Snow & Ice

The costs associated with snow & ice control continue to rise. All streets were plowed and sanded as needed. Snow was removed as necessary from downtown areas, churches, funeral homes and parking lots. Sand barrels for public use were placed throughout the town, on hills and main intersections. Due to high replacement costs, older snow removal equipment is being rebuilt in an effort to hold down costs. This department has consistently provided a level of snow services that meets the needs of public safety, motorists and pedestrians, while striving to work within the snow & ice budget. We continue that policy.

PARKS DIVISION

The Memorial Park was maintained throughout the year and received regular mowing of grass, trimming of shrubs, fertilizing, etc. All trash and debris were removed on a regular basis. Flowers were planted in the park around the monument for Memorial Day.

The John A. Crowe Park was moved regularly, litter and debris picked up, fertilized, and bare spots seeded.

The park at the intersection of Acton, Haynes and Concord Street was maintained throughout the year and received regular mowing of grass, fertilizing, seeding of bare spots and planting of trees. In addition, the parks at the intersection of Main Street and Railroad Street were maintained. Also, the Will Dodd Community Center and Coolidge Playground. As you can see, much time and labor is required to keep our parks and fields in good condition. There is a great demand for playing fields. Due to staffing limits, the above work is handled by the Highway Division.

The department assisted the Boy Scouts in establishing a tree nursery this year. This worthwhile effort will reap benefits in the coming years.

The public shade tree requests for planting continually exceed the amount we may purchase.

Various shade trees throughout the Town were trimmed and hazardous limbs were removed. The broken and fallen limbs were removed and cleaned up. The over hanging brush was cut from along the roadsides and at the intersections that obstructed the view of motorists.

Dutch Elm

Most of the Elm trees were observed townwide for infection of the Dutch Elm disease. There were five (5) trees removed that were either completely infected or dead.

Weed and Poison Ivy Control

The control of weeds and poison ivy is limited due to the lack of equipment and chemicals. The amounts that were treated at various locations around town was limited to town land only.

Insect Pest Control

Due to lack of funds the insect pest control is very limited. The department removed some 12 wasp-hornet nests last fall, that overhung the public ways. This work has to be done at nightfall. It is hoped that more of this beneficial work can resume in the future.

We have been limiting the spraying of other insects such as aphids, to the trees and shrubs on town owned land; cemetery, parks, municipal buildings.

During 1990 much work was accomplished that now shows a distinct enhancement of the Glenwood Cemetery grounds. In closing, Mr. Nicholas Kavalchuck, Sr., cemetery foreman, retired at the end of this year 1990, after thirty-seven plus years of dedicated service to the town. We received many compliments over the years as to the appearance, operation, and overall condition of the cemetery. His manner in dealing with many people over the years will be missed. We hope to carry on Nick's fine example for many years to come.

Mr. John Vincent, who has worked under Mr. Kavalchuck, was chosen acting foreman, cemetery division.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

During the year the department met and assisted many of the Town Departments, Boards and Committees. We have continually helped in any area that we could provide assistance.

The department assisted the Police Department with installation of traffic signs, and meter posts throughout the year. We are applying for a grant through the Governor's Highway Safety Program, for signs and hardware. This will help control costs.

We also provided assistance where possible to the local churches, schools, and several non-profit organizations. This work was limited and was used as a fill in type of work as time and schedules permitted.

We have set goals to continue to improve levels of service and efficiency.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Commissioners, Public Works Employees, and all Departments, Boards and Committees who have cooperated and assisted during the year.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMISSION

The Maynard Recreation Commission hereby submits the following report for 1990.

SPRING TUMBLING PROGRAM

The Recreation Commission sponsored an eight week (eight session) Instructional Tumbling Program. This program was for girls and boys in pre-school, kindergarten, grades one, two and three. It was held Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons at the Fowler Middle School Gymnasium. The children exercised in order to improve their flexibility as well as learn the proper techniques to tumbling and floor exercise. The program was partially subsidized by a \$24.00 registration fee. The last class session was an "OPEN HOUSE" wherein parents attended to view the young tumblers.

SPRING INDOOR GYMNASTICS PROGRAM

The Recreation Commission sponsored an eight week gymnastics program for girls in grades four to eight. The program was held at the Fowler Middle School Gymnasium, on Summer Street, from late March to May. Classes were held Wednesday and Thursday from 2:45 PM to 4:45 PM. The girls learned various skills on the different types of gymnastics apparatus. Each class session begins with a vigorous exercise session to help to improve flexibility. The gymnastics program is an instructional program to help teach girls the proper

methods of doing gymnastics. The girls are divided into smaller groups at each piece of gymnastics equipment for a greater learning situation. This gymnastics program was partially subsidized by a registration fee of \$24.00 that each girl paid for this program. The last class session was an "OPEN HOUSE" wherein parents attended to view the performance of the gymnasts.

SUMMER PLAYGROUND PROGRAM

The past summer a six-week playground program was offered at two locations, Green Meadow Playground and Crowe Park.

Children in Kindergarten to grade four went to the Green Meadow Playground. Crowe Park was used for children in grades five to nine. The children who attended the playgrounds were involved in all types of games and sports as well as arts and crafts. Field trips were held and trophies were awarded to all children who won tournaments. All children who attended the playgrounds this summer enjoyed themselves and had alot of fun keeping busy on hot summer days.

All the playground staff members were local high school students or graduates who had an opportunity to work on a playground in order to earn some money to help further their education. Both the children and the recreational staff enjoyed their summer at the playgrounds. Each child paid a \$24.00 registration fee.

SUMMER RECREATION DANCE, DRAMA AND MUSIC PROGRAM

The Maynard Recreation Commission sponsored a pre-school dance, drama and music program. Boys and girls ages four and five participated in the program. The program was held for six weeks in the Green Meadow School Cafeteria. Classes were held three times per week. One session per week was dance instruction, one session per week was drama and the third session was singing camp-type songs. At the end of each class session children were given a snack and a drink. At the end of the program parents were invited to watch the children display their newly learned talents. All children who participated in the program paid three dollars registration fee, per session. This new program proved to be very popular and many parents have requested it to continue in the future.

MAYNARD RECREATION SWIMMING PROGRAM

The Maynard Recreation Commission, again, sponsored a Summer Swimming Program in 1990. It was a three week regular swim program held during the months of July and August at the Stow Town Beach in Stow, MA. Children in Kindergarten to ninth grade participated in the program. A total number of eight classes; Advanced Beginner, Intermediate, Swimmer and Basic Rescue. The individual classes were kept small so that the children

were able to obtain more instruction time. The children who were in Advanced Life Saving were constantly given written as well as required practical tests. These Advanced Life Saving students had to view nine rescue films that were part of the course that the American Red Cross required. American Red Cross patches were awarded to all those children who passed Advanced Life Saving and Basic Rescue. The swimming director and water safety instructors taught all the children the proper methods of performing artifical respiration on practice mannequins. All children were taught how to use rescue equipment to save someone who may be in trouble or drowning.

The swimming staff consisted of the swimming director, four water safety instructors, four high school swimming aides and four volunteer aides and a waterfront beach guard.

Each child that participated in the swimming program had to pay a \$30.00 registration fee. Some one hundred and forty children took part in the program.

The Advanced Life Saving Course registration fee was \$36.00.

The last day of the program was Parents Day. Parents were invited and youngsters demonstrated their skills and achievements. The Advance Life Saving students and the Basic Rescue students conducted real life search and rescue type missions for the parents to view.

Swimming, races, diving competition and relays were

held during the last half of the classes. All the children who participated in the program this year were presented patches, ribbons and certificates for all their efforts.

TINY TOT SWIM PROGRAM

This year a one week Tiny Tot Learn to Swim Week was held. Some forty pre-school children took advantage of the opportunity to learn to swim. One parent was required to ride the bus and be present at the swim area with their child. This Tiny Tot Swim Week proved to be very valuable and if possible will be offered again next summer.

WINTER LEARN TO SKI PROGRAM

This winter the Recreation Commission, again, sponsored a Learn to Ski Program for Maynard children in grades three to eight. The program was held Saturday mornings at the Nashoba Valley Ski Area in Westford, MA. Each Saturday the children received a one hour lesson plus two and one half hours of free skiing. The program runs for six weeks from January to mid-February. Buses were used to transport children to and from Nashoba Valley Ski Area. One hundred and seventy children participated in this program. Interest in skiing seems to grow every year. Each child paid directly to Nashoba Valley, \$75.00 for the lessons and skiing and \$40.00 if they had to rent equipment. Each child paid a \$24.00 fee for bus transportation.

The Recreation Department offers the program, but the majority of the costs are paid by the children in the ski program.

The Recreation Commission wishes to thank Mr. Joseph F. Kulevich (EMT), Recreation Director and all his staff for a job well done

We wish to thank the Maynard School Committee, all the school custodians, the Public Works Department, Superintendent Walter Sokolowski, Police Chief Arner Tibbitts, the Police Department, the Crosswalk Guards, Fire Chief Cassidy and the fire department.

A special thank you to the bus mothers and ski chaperones who helped make the 1990 Maynard Recreation Swimming and Skiing Programs a huge success.

Also a special thank you to the Stow Selectmen and the Stow Recreation Commission for allowing us to use the Stow Town Beach for our swimming program.

January

Selectmen meet with School Committee to decide future use of the former Coolidge School. Carolyn Stock and Peter Christianson are reappointed to Arts Lottery Committee. Stewart Campbell is reappointed to Council on Aging. T.C. Lando's is allowed to stay open on Sundays. Town Fathers Forum held, cutback in State Aid discussed.

February

33-35 Main St. reapplies for rooming house license. After much discussion, Board denies 1990 license due to concerns over safety. Selectmen declare February 10, 1990 Joseph Magno Day. Selectmen discuss new Uniform Procurement Act which takes effect May 1 and appoint Administrative Assistant as Chief Procurement Officer. Rod and Gun Club meet with Board to discuss Country and Western Night.

March

School Committee meets with Selectmen to request an override question be placed on the Spring ballot. Selectmen meet with the Board of Assessors to set minimum residential factor and tax rate. REPORT OF

THE ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS

The Zoning Board of Appeals heard 20 cases in 1990. In 13 of these cases, 15 requests for dimensional variances were granted and two denied. In the case of one request for dimensional variance, the Board found that the structure was in compliance with the zoning bylaws. Two decisions to grant dimensional variances were for multi-family dwellings.

Seven Special Permits were granted, six for home occupations and one for a company parking lot. A number of the Special Permits were renewals for uses where the Board found there had been no adverse effect on the neighborhood.

At the beginning of the year, the Board lacked two regular members and one alternate member. In mid-year, another member resigned because he was moving out of town. During the summer, appointments were made so that there was a full complement of regular members and one alternate member. The increase in membership eliminated the risk of delaying hearings for lack of a voting quorum. There is still an opening for one alternate member.

The Board meetings are usually scheduled for the first Monday of the month, unless no applications have been received. Anyone interested in serving on the Board is encouraged to call the Selectmen's office for more information.

MAYNARD CHARTER COMMISSION

1990 REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF MAYNARD:

"WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF MAYNARD, MASSACHUSETTS, IN ORDER TO REAFFIRM OUR INDIVIDUAL SOVEREIGNTY WITH RESPECT TO THE CONDUCT OF OUR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND TO TAKE THE FULLEST ADVANTAGES INHERENT IN THE HOME RULE AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS, DO HEREBY ADOPT THE FOLLOWING HOME RULE CHARTER FOR THIS TOWN."

With this as our Preamble, the Maynard Charter Commission presented its Final Report to the Board of Selectmen on October 30, 1990, with the unanimous approval of all nine members of the Charter Commission.

HISTORY:

The Town of Maynard was incorporated as a Town in 1871. An Act of the State Legislature allowed us to break away from the towns of Sudbury and Stow to form a new town government to serve the particular needs of the citizens of what was then known as "Assabet Village".

The first town meeting was held on April 27, 1871, at Riverside Hall. The warrant and the results of this first town meeting represent the first "Charter" for the new Town of Maynard:

TOWN OF MAYNARD

TOWN WARRANT NO.1

I, Joseph W. Reed, one of the Justices of Peace within and for the County of Middlesex, do issue the following warrant:

"In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby required to notify and warn Inhabitants of the Town of Maynard, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at Riverside Hall in said Town on Thursday, the twenty-seventh day of April current at one of the clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles to wit:

First, to choose a Moderator to preside at the said meeting.

Second, to choose all such town officials for the year ensuing, as towns are by law authorized and required to choose at their annual meeting."

MAYNARD, 27 April, 1871

The Town of Maynard has operated with this as it's "CHARTER" for the past 119 years...

Ninety five years after the initial Charter, in 1965, the Town of Maynard recognized the need for improvement in its governmental system, and established a Government Study Committee by a vote of town meeting. This Committee recommended a five member Board of Selectmen, the elimination of the Board of Public Works, and the creation of a Town Manager form of government. Another Government Study Committee, established in 1975, was instrumental in the creation of the secret ballot system for Town Meeting, the position of Administrative Assistant and the contract basis for use of Town Counsel.

In 1989, Maynard voted to accept Chapter 43B of the Mass. General Laws (The Home Rule Amendment) and elected nine of its citizens to serve as a Charter Commission to write a new government for the Town of Maynard.

The present Charter Commission extends its thanks to the previous Committees for their hard work and foresight. Many of the concerns, findings and recommendations of these Committees are still valid in 1990 and are included in our final document.

THE HOME RULE AMENDMENT

In accepting the Home Rule Amendment, Maynard has given itself the broad powers and rights to create its own form of government without the approval of the State Legislature, based on our own locally identified needs, problems and opportunities. Prior to 1966, when the Home Rule Amendment was passed, Special Acts of the Legislature were required to change town governments. Without the Home Rule Amendment, most of the improvements recommended in our proposed Charter would require petitions to the State Legislature to authorize Special Acts. With the Home Rule Amendment, through our proposed Charter, the citizens of Maynard have taken the RIGHT to govern ourselves, on our terms.

PROCESS

The Charter Commission was elected in May, 1989. Under the provisions of the Home Rule Amendment, a preliminary draft Charter was presented to the voters by publication on August 30, 1990 and two public hearings were held thereafter to receive input. The final Charter was delivered to the Board of Selectmen on October 30, 1990. The Board of Selectmen is required to place the question of acceptance of the Charter before the voters of Maynard on the May, 1991 Town Election ballot. In addition, the Board of Selectmen must distribute a copy of the full text of the Charter to each residence in the Town at least 14 days before the election. These are all non-negotiable events established by State Law.

The voters of Maynard will see the following question on the May, 1991 Town Election ballot:

SHALL THIS TOWN APPROVE THE NEW CHARTER YES _____ RECOMMENDED BY THE CHARTER COMMISSION, NO _____ SUMMARIZED BELOW?

OPEN TOWN MEETING RETAINED

The Charter retains the open town meeting. It formalizes the town meeting as the legislative branch of town government.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen is retained as the key elected Board of the town, but is enlarged to five (5) members. The Board will be expected to exercise a policy-making role and assume leadership responsibilities in many areas. It will have considerable powers of appointment, the power of investigation, and it remains as the licensing authority for the Town.

OTHER ELECTED BOARDS

Other elected Boards and Officers under this Charter will be a Moderator, a School Committee, a Board of Library Trustees and a Housing Authority.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

The most significant change in the proposed Charter is the establishment of the position of Town Administrator, to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen. The Town Administrator position eliminates the existing position of the Administrative Assistant to the Selectmen.

The Administrator will be a professional, especially fitted by education and experience to strengthen the executive branch. He or she will have the powers necessary to carry out the responsibilities and duties of the office. Included in these responsibilities and duties are personnel, budgeting, and purchasing. This person will be the Town's chief administrator, expected to provide day to day management and coordination of the Town's business.

RECALL PROVISION

The Charter establishes a procedure for the recall of elected officials.

OTHER CHANGES

The Charter proposes an improved budget process and capital improvements program. It eliminates the Board of Public Works, investing the responsibilities of this Board in the Board of Selectmen. It also establishes a special committee to prepare a Code of Ethics applicable to all elected and appointed town officials and town employees.

COMMENTARY

The proposed Charter creates three branches of government for the Town of Maynard:

- A. LEGISLATIVE BRANCH- This is the basis of our Town Government and will continue to be served via the Open Town Meeting format, open to all registered voters. We have documented for the first time many previously informal town meeting procedures. In addition, we have provided for the formal appointment of a Deputy Moderator, and have added a requirement that the Chairperson of each Board and Department Head attend all sessions of Town Meeting.
- B. EXECUTIVE BRANCH- The Board of Selectmen is the Chief Executive Office of the Town of Maynard, responsible for policy making directives and guidelines, and not involved in the day to day administration of the Town. This returns the Board of Selectmen to it's historically intended role of "selected-men", which dates back to the creation of our Town.
- C. ADMINISTRATIVE BRANCH- The position of Town Administrator is established as the chief administrative officer of the Town. Maynard is a 13 million dollar Corporation and the establishment of the position of a full-time administrator is long overdue.

One of the primary goals of the Charter Commission is to streamline town government. At present, there are 13 town offices which report directly to the voters, with no required or implied obligation to either cooperate or interact with any other office. The result of this autonomy has been best described as a "hodge-podge" of conflicting priorities that frustrate both the office holders and the voters.

To reduce this confusion and frustration, the Charter Commission has improved the organizational reporting structure of the Town by reducing the number of elected offices.

By State Law, Maynard MUST continue to elect a Board of Selectmen, a School Committee and a Moderator. With the exception of the Board of Library Trustees and the Housing Authority, which are semi-autonomous, the Maynard Charter moves all other previously elected offices to appointed status. In our research, it became apparent that these offices were either regulatory and/or administrative and not political. It is our opinion that these positions should be filled on the basis of professional qualifications.

CONCLUSION

The Maynard Charter Commission has completed its work after over 3000 hours of research and development and more than 40 public meetings. The Commission will go out of existence in June of 1991 in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 43B. It is our firm belief that we have served the voters well and have conducted the most thorough and complete investigation that is possible. It is our hope that our many hours of work on this historic document will be accepted by the voters of the Town of Maynard. We thank the various Boards, Committees, Town Officials and Citizens who have participated in the formidable process of writing our Charter.

We believe that we have created the finest Charter in the Commonwealth and we are very proud of our work. The motto of the Town of Maynard," PROGRESS WITH STABILITY", is represented in every word of our proposed Charter.

CHAIRMAN'S NOTE

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the Charter Commission for their support and dedication to the Town of Maynard during the past 18 months. Although we have had many lively discussions on various issues, we have remained focused on the common goal of writing a sound and functional document that will serve the needs of the Town of Maynard for many years to come.

I am very proud of the results of our work and very thankful for the opportunity to work with such a fine group of dedicated Maynardians.



Report of the Interim Superintendent of Schools

Since my role has been that of Interim Superintendent of Schools, my report will be limited to school matters which began in July.

Naturally, with the resignation of Dr. Ahearn, the major goal of the School Committee was to search for a Superintendent who will meet the needs of the Town of Maynard.

My role was to provide an opportunity for the Staff and the Administration to move forward while the search for the Superintendent was in progress. It was interesting to note that during my tenure as Superintendent, the issues that emerged enabled me to serve as an ombudsman for the Staff, the Administration, and the School Committee.

What were some of those issues? The first among them was the invitation to the Federally funded Chapter I Project to establish a Computer Technology Center in the Coolidge Administration Building. The Chapter I Board began its residency in August. The expertise of the custodial staff enabled the Central Office to exercise a smooth transition.

During the process of preparing for the opening day of school, staff appointments were made, transportation issues were being resolved, Community Education Programs were being examined, a Maynard Education Association grievance was resolved, curriculum proposals were discussed, a calendar of events was prepared, budgetary matters were reviewed, Administrative meetings were held, and School Committee meetings were planned.

The question of air quality at the Green Meadow School emerged as an issue as the school year began. A thorough examination of the univents and the flow of air were made. A re-examination of the air quality was conducted in late December, the results of which were released in January.

During my stay in Maynard, I had the opportunity to attend meetings comprised of personnel from the public schools and the Digital Equipment Company. DEC has offered the Schools the opportunity to utilize its services and expertise in computer technology as a demonstration of support to the school system. The schools are taking advantage of the opportunity.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the School Committee for their direction and dedication. Their decisions have always been in the interest of the young people. I also wish to give recognition to the Administrators and the Staff for their cooperation and suggestions. Acknowledgments are also extended to Mary Connearney of Mary's Catering Service for providing a complimentary breakfast to the Staff and Administration on opening day; to Mr. Sokolowski, of the DPW; and to Mr. Gianotis for their support and assistance.

Finally, I would be remiss if no mention were made of the dedication of Mrs. LoChiatto as well as Mrs. DeGrappo and Mrs. Gormley of the Central Office. I am grateful to them for their knowledge and support, without which, it would have been most difficult for me to offer educational leadership to the community and to the staff.

Following are the reports of the Administrators who will highlight the features of the curricula that are currently in their respective schools.

I hereby submit the Annual Report for the year 1990.
Personnel

We lost a valued member of our staff, Mrs. Ann Lemire, first grade teacher, who passed away in December after a long illness. Ann served Maynard for over 14 years with dignity and dedication as a teacher, colleague and friend. She will be sorely missed by us all.

Due to resignations and leave of absences, we hired the following new staff: Nancy Daigle, 1st grade - long term sub, Candace Ewing, 2nd grade, Christopher Mahoney, 3/4-grade - long term sub, Katherine O'Meara, 2nd grade - long term sub, and Douglas Swain, 2nd grade. All of these teachers were hired after reviewing over 80 resumes and personal interviews by principals and staff were held on 18 of the candidates. The teachers hired were highly trained and recommended, and have proven to be excellent.

The continuing staff of veteran teachers have been invaluable in their willingness to help the new staff members. They also are all attending "in-house" workshops and "out of the district" courses and workshops, thus keeping themselves up-to-date. It is a real pleasure to work with a staff who exhibit such dedication and professionalism.

Enrollment

Our enrollment continues to increase. In October of each year, we file a State Report that is our official attendance for the year. In 1988 - 540 students, 1989 - 616 students, 1990 - 641 students. We are projecting 679 students for 1991. We are projecting a maximum K-4 enrollment of 730-750 students for October 1993.

Kindergarten

We continue to screen all in-coming kindergarten

children. Sign up for screening will be the week of April 8th through 12, 1991. The actual screening will take place on May 7th and 8th, 1991. A child must be five years old by October 1st of the year in which they will be attending. We will need to see a birth certificate at the time of registration.

Facilities

We are in our third full year of using our new facility and are now really using it to its full potential. The Computer Lab is used by the whole school. The Library/Media Center, the Art Room, The Music Room, the two station Gymnasium, have really expanded our ability to support the classroom teachers and expand both the cultural and learning experiences of our students.

The Green Meadow Parents Group is organizing a subcommittee to provide upkeep for our parents built playground facility. If you are interested in participating, please contact the Green Meadow Parents Group.

Curriculum

We continue to expland and refine our existing curriculum. Thanks to the efforts of Don Holm, Assistant Principal, we have received several Federal and State Grants to support staff development projects here at Green Meadow.

- In Language Arts we are into our 3rd year of "Process Writing" - both Social Studies and Science are to become more "Hands-On" and process oriented; - In Mathematics, two of our teachers, Judy Johnson and Sue Meade were part of a pilot project that helped the Heath Company write a new Math Curriculum. Ellen Holway and Marianne Keohan were part of a Globe Newspaper sponsored project to teach children about the stock market. (we had two fourth grade teams finish in the top ten competing against Jr. and Senior high teams.) We are beginning to incorporate the new recommendations of the

National Council of Math Teachers. Basically they make the math curriculum more practical and "problem solving" oriented. We continue programs such as "Making Friends, Making Choices", A Governors Alliance Against Drugs Program.

In a truly modern elementary school, the entire school, becomes a "community of learners", students, teachers and administrators, all learning and working together.

No curriculum should ever be finished; it should always be evolving and changing. Please be patient with us, any learning process is painful and must include the freedom to make mistakes and not repeat them, but you must give us the freedom to explore and to grow.

Special Program and Field Trips

Each grade goes on at least one field trip a year, except for Kindergarten. (for them, the Audubon Ark comes to the Green Meadow School and does educational presentations in their classrooms) - Sample field trips - Plimouth Plantation, Aquarium, Worcester and Boston Science Museums, Sturbridge Village. We are coordinating field trips so that children don't go to the same place two years in a row.

We are beginning to have special trips coordinated by the Art and Music teacher's to appropriate music and drama performances or visits to Art Museums.

The Parent's Group has been instrumental in this expansion of opportunities - they fund the bus costs for one trip per year. With the increasing escalation of transportation costs and admission costs, the parents group help is what has kept treat trips a viable opportunity for our students. A neartfelt thanks to them from students, staff and administrators.

"In House Programs"

Through some grant money but mostly parent group funding we continue to offer several "In House" Programs -

- Commonwealth Gas, Safety and Education Grade 2
- Officer Phil Safety Programs all grades
- Dolly and Debby Drug Education, Red Cross all grades
- Audubon Ark all grades
- Son Zhu, Cultural Education (Chinese) 4th grade
- Claire Walker Leslie, Naturalist, Artist, Author and Educator, ran a two day workshop for our children about nature journaling.
- Manitook School Cultural Education (American Indians) kindergarten and other grades.

Green Meadow Parents Group

An extremely active and dedicated group of parents who really affect what the Green Meadow School has become. They raise between \$10,000 and \$12,000 each year. We send a needs assessment survey home to all parents and using that information develop a budget to allocate the raised funds.

They ran a Holiday Shoppe for all children where the children can purchase gifts for their families; they run Book Fairs, an extremely successful Winter Carnival and a variety of other fund raisers. In these times of tight monies, without their financial help, there would be very few field trips or "in-house" enrichment programs.

Through this group, funnels a large group of volunteers, who help in many ways - room mothers, field trip chaperones, classroom aides and helpers, book publishers and typists; they also act as back up help for our school nurse and secretaries. It is hard to list all they do for us. Some days it seems like some of our more dedicated volunteers live here. This Parent Group and the active volunteer group have become a very key factor in the effectiveness of the Green Meadow School.

Other Helpers

We would like to thank both the Police and Fire Dept. for their safety presentations. We would like to thank the

Maynard D.P.W. for their help with snow removal and clean up after bad winter storms. We would like to thank the Senior Citizens who save labels and help in other ways. Summary

The Green Meadow School continues to be a very exciting and stimulating place to be teaching and working in.

The SACC Program that provides School Age Child Care for our parents. The After School Programs that provide special learning opportunities for children. The six Brownie Groups that meet each week at our school. The Green Meadow School expands constantly to become a true community resource as well as an educational center.

Like all town departments, we could use more funds. We need to expand our custodial staff and basic maintenance funds and capabilities. As our enrollment goes up, we should be adding staff. As book series get old, we need to replace them. We have been steadily losing ground in several areas, mostly in maintenance and upkeep; if we do not find some new monies, the education of the children will affected.

We would like to commend parents and staff for their willingness to work and to improvise. We are holding our own and still continue to offer what we consider to be a good educational program for the elementary school students.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL FOWLER MIDDLE SCHOOL

"QUALITY EDUCATION FOR PRE AND EARLY ADOLESCENTS"

Dear Mr. Vellante,

I hereby submit the Fowler Middle School Principal's Annual Report. The restructuring of Fowler is complete. During the past three years, we have transitioned from a subject department junior high school organization to an interdisciplinary teacher team structure of a middle school. The outstanding progress the professional staff has made during the past three years of restructuring now provides parents and their youngsters with a middle school organization that better meets students developmental needs, educational services to them, and an improved environment for learning. We continue to follow the course established in our Mission Statement and most recent findings about middle level education.

On May 31, 1990, the Maynard School Committee voted to change the name of the school. Effective July 1, 1990, we became <u>Fowler Middle School</u>.

Guyer Weston Fowler was a prominent Maynard businessman and servant of the community. He was one of the first commanders of the Frank J. DeMars Post, American Legion and he also held many town offices which included Board of Health, Assessors, and Cemetery Commissioner. He was a member of the Board of Managers of the Middlesex County National Bank and was Director of the former Maynard Trust Company. He served eight years as President of the Assabet Institution for Savings. He was also very active in Boy Scout work and many other youth related programs.

Mr. Fowler was one that radiated cheer and friendship everywhere and his interest in the well-being of his fellow man knew no bounds and his acts of generosity were known far and wide. He always displayed a keen interest in the youth of the town who were desirous of furthering their education and assisted many in sercuring their college education. He was a true citizen who was always ready to lend a helping hand and through his lifetime gave freely of his time and energies with only one thought in mind, that of making his home town a better place in which to live.

A middle level school is an educational setting where early adolescent students age ten to fourteen are enrolled in a program that meets the developmental needs and interests of this special group. Middle schools are an outgrowth of the American Junior High School. The move from a junior high school approach to a middle school program is one from subject oriented schooling to child centered learning backed by research on the developmental stages of early adolescence.

The junior high school student or middle schooler needs a learning environment tailored to meet their distinct characteristics, as do students in high school. Fowler is growing and evolving into a middle school. This means we are focusing our attention on a balanced curriculum based on students' developmental needs, giving greater consideration to student guidance and providing more avenues for parent and teacher communication. We are also mindful of the development of the 'whole child' using programs based on different learning styles, emphasis on basic skills mastery, critical thinking, and building good study skills.

- * Individual grade teaming of teachers with interdisciplinary units most ideally meets the educational and developmental needs of this unique age group. (Carnegie Report)
- * Provides a focused core curriculum that will be consistently implemented.
- * Improves communication between teachers of the same grade to coordinate assignments and homework.
- \star Establishes for each grade, uniform student assessment and evaluation.
- * Improves home-school partnership providing weekly opportunities for parents to meet with grade level teachers.
- * Improves the advising and counseling of students with more consistent communication of learning expectations.
- * Better guidance of student learning and social development through consistent grade level teacher monitoring.

The Fowler Middle School community is devoted to encouraging individual academic excellence for early adolescent students through learning experiences specifically designed to build a sound academic foundation, self esteem, friendships, and athletic, as well as, artistic skills. Fowler bridges the gap between the elementary classroom and the specialized subject programming of the high school.

Tomatoes From Space - Some students in the 6th and 7th grade planted gardens to experiment with tomato seeds from space. During the spring, students grew and monitored space exposed seeds searching for differences caused by long-term exposure to the vacuum of space. For nearly six years the seeds were exposed to the harsh environment of space. The space exposed experiment was one of fifty-seven projects housed on a recently recovered satellite. The 12.5 million tomato seeds were rescued by the crew of the space shuttle, Columbia.

Electronic Bookshelf Reading Program - Congratulations to Nrs. Carr's 5th Grade Class. (1989-90) They are the first class to accumulate 1,000 points in our E.B.S. Program. The students have read and passed tests on 512 books with point totals of 1, 2, or 3 in difficulty. Congratulations!

A Class Act - Congratulations to Mr. Cincotta! Last spring seventh grader, Megan Duffy, wrote Chet Curtis of WCVB-TV, Channel 5, and told him about her "awesome" math teacher. He came out to Maynard and spent two hours at Fowler meeting and filming Mr. Cincotta. The next day, Mr. Cincotta was on the 6:00 o'clock news in their special feature, A Class Act. Mr. Cincotta's professional career spans twenty-two years in Maynard as a math teacher in grades 6, 7, and 8, Student Council Advisor and Coach.

Thank You Elks! On behalf of the students and staff I would like to thank the Maynard Lodge of Elks for their contributions to the students of Fowler. Their generous support has provided summer camp scholarships for students, new American flags for some classrooms, and a \$500.00 donation to help support an interscholastic basketball program.

Interscholastic Rasketball - The 1989-90 boys and girls 7/8 grade basketball program was eliminated because of budget cuts. Tom Whalen, a concerned citizen, spearheaded an effort to obtain necessary funds (\$2,500.00) to run a program. His efforts and the efforts of others, produced a \$500.00 donation from the Elks, \$1,000.00 donation from the Maynard Roosters Club, \$500.00 donation from the Maynard Soccer Roosters along with start up money to support the program until parents can organize a fund raiser activity. Also, students who made the team were charged a users fee and admission was collected at home games. Recause of Mr. Whalen's efforts the 1990-91 program is funded.

I hereby submit the Annual Report for the year 1990.

Efforts continue to better prepare our students for the year 2000. The expanded use of state and federal grants has provided an increase in staff training and curriculum development programs. Sight and Sound, a pilot interdisciplinary fine arts appreciation course, is one exceptional example of how Maynard High School has benefited from these funds. This elective course is team taught and utilizes a variety of effective instructional techniques.

As a result of receiving a Dwight D. Eisenhower Grant, the math department is currently investigating the National Council of Teachers of Math's (NCTM) new curriculum and instructional standards. The significant changes being suggested nationally will impact our present mathematics program. The math department has just completed two inservice workshops as part of the orientation process.

Our writing program has expanded to now include both the Digital computer lab and the Macintosh computer lab. Joint interdisciplanary writing projects are increasing between the different departments. Currently, the social studies and English departments are collaborating on student research writing assignments.

We are close to completing the connection with the of University of Lowell Institutional Network. This will give us access to the many benefits of distance learning. Plans include utilizing the University's secondary and post secondary programs as well as possibly connecting classrooms with other area high schools.

We are pleased to report that communication with parents has improved. The Parent Networking Group has been an invaluable source of support to students and staff. This group continues to work with faculty to improve our school programs.

Plans have been made for the November 1992 accreditation evaluation. We begin our self-study in the spring of 1991 in preparation for this evaluation which occurs every ten years.


