DECserver 500 introduced

Digital has introduced the DECserver 500, a network terminal server that allows users in large office environments to connect as many as 128 asynchronous terminals, printers, and personal computers to Digital's Ethernet local area network. The company also announced its new Single Port Ethernet Repeater, called DESPR, for users who require a low-cost, single line ThinWire Ethernet connection to the desktop.

The DECserver 500 provides all of the capabilities of the DECserver 200, and enables users to access any of the other computers and resources available on the network.

Like the DECserver 200, the DECserver 500 includes additional support for multiple sessions, load balancing, status and performance monitoring, and intraserver communications. For example, the DECserver 500 can support up to eight multiple sessions per user, allowing easy transitions from one application to another without repeating log-in procedures each time.

Digital also unveiled a ThinWire Single Port Repeater (DESPR) for users who require a low-cost, single line connection for ThinWire Ethernet to the desktop. Designed especially to work in small office environments, the DESPR repeater connects to a single, easy-to-install cable, and is compatible with all of Digital's ThinWire products. With the DESPR, up to 29 stations can be daisy-chained. It can be used for standalone networking, or can be connected to a standard Ethernet "backbone" cable.

The DESPR enhances Digital's LAN products by providing a typical work-group area with full 10 megabit per second Ethernet functionality. The unit can support any combination of personal computers and workstations (including Digital VAXstation systems and IBM personal computers), and can be rack-mounted or used as a table-top device. ■

Digital announces CMP agreement with Sales Technologies, Inc.

Digital has signed a Cooperative Marketing Program (CMP) agreement with Sales Technologies, Inc. (ST). Under the agreement, the two companies will work closely to market ST's networked sales force automation software and Digital's sales and marketing software solutions in the United States.

ST's networked sales force automation software allows salespeople to access corporate computer resources through laptop personal computers for more effective and productive selling. The software also automates routine administrative tasks common to most selling, and can help sales professionals offer better services to customers. ST's software is available in modules that include Territory Management, Electronic Mail, Reports Distribution, SpreadSheets/Expenses, Order Entry and Communications.

A VAX Network Controller is the communications hub and central database for a network of laptop personal computers that exchange information over public telephone lines. Common applications include call reports, call planning, account databases, order status inquiry, report distribution, and electronic messaging among PCs and users of Digital's ALL-IN-1 applications integration environment. Networked sales force automation modules can also be integrated with Digital's ALL-IN-1 System for Sales and Marketing, VAX/VTX videotex products, and a wide range of business application software for sales and marketing departments. ■

Digital, PRC Public Management Services sign marketing agreement

Digital and PRC Public Management Services have signed an agreement to cooperate in marketing PRC's public safety applications on Digital's VAX computer systems.

PRC specializes in computer-aided dispatching (CAD) systems for police, fire, and emergency medical services and has installed more than 55 CAD systems. PRC also provides records management systems for police, fire, jail, and court agencies.

The agreement was executed under Digital's Systems Cooperative Marketing Program (SCMP), which aligns leading application suppliers with Digital's marketing activities in selected markets. Digital and PRC will cooperate in sales and marketing efforts and will share technical expertise.

Headquartered in McLean, Va., PRC Public Management Services is a subsidiary of Planning Research Corp. and has specialized in computer systems for public safety and criminal justice since its founding in 1963. PRC has been an authorized distributor of Digital equipment for 14 years. Its software runs on the complete line of VAX computer systems. ■

EMC Corp., Digital agree to settle litigation

Digital and EMC Corp. of Hopkinton, Mass., have announced the settlement of the pending litigation between the two companies.

The two companies have been in litigation since 1985 in U.S. District Court in Boston. Digital's lawsuit alleged that one line of EMC's computer memory products infringes patents on Digital's SBI computer interconnection and control technology. EMC denied those allegations. EMC also filed a counterclaim alleging that Digital had violated federal anti-trust laws.

Although the details of the settlement were not disclosed, the companies jointly stated that:

- The pending litigation, including all claims of both parties, will be dismissed;
- EMC has been granted a license to utilize Digital's SBI interconnection and control technology; and
- Digital and EMC will confer in the future in an attempt to resolve potential issues between the companies.

beginning of their junior year. Approximately 250 young people are selected for the program. Students attending private schools are not eligible for the program.

New Hampshire

The St. Paul's Advanced Studies Program is a residential program held at St. Paul's Academy in Concord, N.H. Students are recommended by their high schools, but any New Hampshire high school junior who wishes to apply may do so by contacting the St. Paul's Advanced Studies Program admissions office at (603) 225-3341. Each applicant is interviewed individually and approximately 200 students are selected to attend.

Students for both programs are accepted on the basis of high school grades, the recommendations of principals, counselors and teachers, aptitude tests, and, in the case of St. Paul's, a personal interview.
