

## Plan for a healthy and happy holiday

As the holidays approach, the Greater Maynard Area Employee Assistance Program would like to offer some suggestions to help employees enjoy the season more

According to John Hamrock, EAP counselor, experiences and emotions of recent years can help you plan for this season. "If you are prone to holiday blues, schedule time with friends. If you've experienced loss through death, divorce or separation, plan activities that are a healthy distraction from what is often the pain of abandonment, rejection or loneliness."

John, who runs seminars on holiday depression, points out that what we drink and eat and how much can also affect our

moods. "Alcohol, refined sugar and flour are known depressants. Knowing your limit can help prevent ups and downs in moods," John advises.

Highway safety is another area to keep in mind during the holidays. John, who specializes in alcohol counseling, believes highway safety is everyone's responsibility. "It is the responsibility of hosts and hostesses as well as bartenders. Negotiations with an intoxicated guest about to drive are fruitless. Alcohol impairs judgment and coordination while heightening the driver's grandiosity and power. Negotiations about car keys with a drunk person is interpreted as a challenge that he or she can drive safely," John explains.

He suggests if you're going to a party, anticipate how you will get home before you leave. Consider the alternative if you or your driver is apt to indulge. A good rule of thumb is to be aware that your body can only process 12 ounces of beer, one ounce of whiskey or 3 ounces of wine per

"Hospitality that pours with a heavy hand — the image of a generous host," John says, "conflicts with the responsibility of friends not letting friends drive drunk.'

John suggests serving non-alcoholic drinks as an alternative. Since foods slows down the rate of alcohol absorption in the blood, snacks should be available. "Last call for alcohol an hour before guests leave your house will give their bodies a chance to catch up. Coffee will prevent some

guests from being sleepy when driving, but it will only make someone drunk wide awake. Only time with no alcohol will bring sobriety," he says.

The Greater Maynard Area EAP has recipes for zingy non-alcoholic drinks and a list of holiday meeting for those with alcohol problems. ## Digital announces worksheet calculator for VAX systems

Digital has announced VAX-11 DECalc, a new, interactive worksheet calculator for VAX computer systems. The new software package allows professional, administrative and clerical personnel with little prior computer experience to construct, use and store accounting worksheets for a wide variety of financial and business applications. VAX-11 DECalc runs on VT100 series and VT100-compatible video display terminals

VAX-11 DECalc software helps increase productivity in manual tasks normally accomplished with a calculator and a typed or handwritten worksheet. Typical applications include budgeting, forecasting, depreciation scheduling, manpower and salary planning, stock and bond portfolio management, cost analyses and engineering design calculations.

The VAX-11 DECalc software package is accessed at \$4,000 and is scheduled for delivery this month.

VAX-11 DECalc contains extensive formatting, mathematical and ease-of-use features. The user creates a worksheet by moving a marker to the desired location on the screen, then entering a value, formula or text. The program can replicate individual locations, rows, columns and sections to expedite worksheet construction.

The user can insert, delete and move rows or columns, and blank or clear sections of the sheet. Both new and retrieved data on the displayed sheet can be edited until the desired format is achieved. As data in each box is edited, the program automatically modifies dependent values.

DECalc software performs basic and extended scientific and mathematical functions with 12-digit accuracy. Extensive, online "HELP" facilities are available for assistance with all functions.

The new package handles worksheets up to 63 data columns wide and 254 rows long. A split-screen capability enables viewing two separate sections simultaneously. The user can store and retrieve templates for repetitive applications, and can store and retrieve completed worksheets from both private and common files. An encryption facility is accessible to ensure the security of confidential data.

## Salary reviews to start again in April

The Operations Committee has announced that salary action will be reinstated starting next April. Salary action deferrals are just one of the many expense control measures that Digital has instituted. In addition, discretionary spending has been limited throughout the company. This includes cutting unnecessary travel, deferring or eliminating optional programs and hiring only in direct revenue generating positions.

"We are making many administrative changes to help improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the company," said Win Hindle, vice president, Corporate Operations. "These actions, plus the reduction of discretionary spending and the salary delays, will help strengthen Digital's long-term competitive position.

"We expect some positive revenue impact from our new products starting Q3. In particular, the new personal computer will be on a rapid production ramp. By Q4 we expect a solid impact on revenue.

"Employee cooperation with the salary delay action has been superb and we appreciate their support and sense of commitment to the company's future," he emphasized.

## Educational Services cited by Presidential Task Force

Digital recently received national recognition for its role in helping the Oxford, Mass. school system develop a computer training program. On October 25, Education Services was awarded a presidential commendation at a ceremony hosted by the Federal Regional Council of New England.

The award exemplifies Reagan Administration's efforts to promote and encourage partnerships between the public and private sectors. In December 1981, the 44 member, bipartisan Presidential Task Force on Private Sector Initiative was formed to pursue this goal.

The purpose of the federal program is to combine the strength and ingenuity of business with the power of government to further the progress of American communities. The partnership is seen as an innovative, competitive process for exploring community needs and matching them with a company's capabilities.

The award-winning project was first initiated four years ago when Digital provided Oxford with a grant to purchase a PDP-11. During the partnership, which has

come to serve as a model for similar projects, Ed. Services helped the school system with curriculum development, equipment acquisition, staff training, internships and job experience.

The merger of industry's technology with a school's human resources results in an alliance which benefit both partners. Del Lippert, corporate manager of Educational Services, points out that it is in training and retraining that schools and industry must work together.

"Demographic predictions forecast that by the turn of the century, practically half of the workforce will be over 40 years old, making retraining a top priority.

"Because retraining is destined to become crucial to industry," says Del, "industry will rely on computer-aided and multi-media learning packages. As industry adopts more and more package training, school could be producing and marketing them. Although industry is not able to provide all of the funding it can surely help schools to generate revenue."

# Three training groups consolidate and reorganize

Corporate Employee Development and Office Education are now part of Digital Management Education (DME) and Office Automation. The consolidations were made to increase productivity and quality and to serve a greater number of employees at a lower cost.

DME and Office Automation will offer programs to employees and managers within all functions of the company. Their programs will include courses for business management, skills improvement, management training and office automation. They will be designed for a variety of audiences, including function specific, cross organization and generic groups.

The strategy of DME and Office Automation is to offer programs which increase productivity and efficiency. The combined course offerings for January to June 1983 reflect the blending of similar courses to reduce redundancy, the redesign of some courses and deletion of others. Additionally, a major design effort will result in several new offerings. The new course calendar, which will be available in January, replaces individual course listings from U.S. Area Management Development, Employee Development and many offerings from Office Education. Calendars will be posted in Personnel departments and distributed throughout the company. The groups now have a single automated system to simplify registration.

DME and Office Automation will continue to work with client and employee development groups within Digital. Employees are encouraged to notify DME and OA of critical areas as programs are refined and developed.
