Digital reports third quarter results

Digital continues to maintain its leadership position as a supplier of computers in spite of a difficult economic environment around the world. Total operating revenues for the third quarter of FY82 were \$999,260,000, up 18 percent from the \$843,385,000 reported for the same period last year. Net income was \$107,529,000, up from \$100,232,000 for the same period last year. Earnings per share for the quarter were \$1.94 versus \$1.89 last year.

"Although operating revenues are up, Digital continues to feel the pressures of the wordwide business downturn, which have resulted in reduced customer demand from many of the markets we serve,"

says Win Hindle, vice president, Corporate Operations. He notes that the company had anticipated a slowing in business for some time and had, earlier in the year, placed greater emphasis on expense control. These controls have had a favorable impact on earnings to date this fiscal year.

"Our financial results have remained good partly because we have reduced our expense spending and improved our asset management. But because a number of our customers have been delaying purchases, our order rate has slowed. We therefore expect to continue to watch expenses carefully for the next several quarters," explains Win.

"Despite the poor economic environment, these are exciting times at Digital," he adds. "People are working together closely, and productivity gains are helping us to price our new computers more competitively. This should open new applications and new markets for our products. For example, the new smaller VAX-11/730, we just announced, is significantly lower priced than the VAX-11/750. It is expected to be a market leader. If we all continue to focus our best efforts in the same direction, the future should be very bright."

Digital expands VAX family

With the first worldwide introduction held in Europe of a major new product, Digital last week announced the VAX-11/730 at the Hanover Fair in Germany. In the U.S., the product will be shown next month at the DECUS symposium in Atlanta.

The VAX-11/730 represents an entry level addition to the VAX family of 32-bit, virtual memory computers. With a small size, single cabinet, and systems prices beginning under \$50,000, the VAX-11/730 is designed to bring full functionality to new applications, new customers, and new levels of distribution within large and small companies.

Lou Philippon, product manager, said the new VAX-11/730 is a full-fledged VAX family member that brings VMS software operating system resources even closer to the user. "It's a user-friendly system with nearly unlimited program space," said Lucien. "Complete systems can be configured in one 42-inch-high, 22-inch-wide cabinet. The small size permits easy installation in a great variety of office and laboratory environments. The low price will encourage its use in special-purpose, OEM-developed systems, as a standalone lepartmental system for commercial appli-

cations, and for workstation support in

technical design."

With VAX/VMS Version 3.0., the third major enhancement of the operating system since its introduction in 1977, customers can use the new system to distribute VAX power even further within their organization. The VAX/VMS creates a common software environment spanning the full range of VAX systems, from the new small VAX-11/730, to the midrange VAX-11/750 up through the high level VAX-11/780 and /782.

The new system delivers 30 percent of the performance of the large VAX-11/780 at 20 percent of its CPU (central processor unit) price, and will support simultaneous operation of up to 24 interactive terminals.

The VAX-11/730 contains high-density (64K-bit) memory chips and features a maximum memory complement of five megabytes. A new, intelligent, direct-memory-access (DMA) communication controller, contained in a single-circuit module, provides both multiline asynchronous and synchronous communication, plus an interface for a line printer or other special purpose device.

A minimum VAX-11/730 system includes the CPU with one megabyte of memory, DMF32 communications controller, two 10-megabyte cartridge-type RL02 disk units, LA120 DECwriter III console terminal, VMS operating system with full support, warranty and installations. The minimum system price is \$48,900.

"We believe the VAX-11/730 is a wellqualified addition to the VAX family and will be welcomed as a powerful new computing resource by both new and current customers," concluded Lou.

Shuttle schedule extended

The current shuttle schedule, dated December 28, 1981 to March 26, 1982, has been extended to April 23, 1982.

ESG reports on showcase

By providing customers valuable applications software information and training through the third party vendors, the Showcase also provided ESG with an opportunity to reinforce its commitment to engineering productivity and performance.


Ed Services Development and Publishing wins awards
