Amid all the cries for films, overhead projectors, tape recorders and the like, Mr. Magno's men fill every request with efficiency and dispatch.






## LIBRARY AIDES AND OFFICE GIRLS








#### NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY



There are great hopes and expectations for the coming 1975 season.





The Tiger basketball team came into its own this year and Maynard High School will be the scene of some exciting basketball action in the years to come.


