# Computer pioneer joins Digital team

Maurice Wilkes has accepted a permanent full-time position as staff consultant in Corporate Research. Known as the father of microprogramming and the developer of the EDSAC (the first operational stored-program computer), he was the guest of honor who delivered the inaugural lecture at the opening of Digital's Computer Museum last fall.

A scientist and engineer of world reputation, Wilkes is one of the hand-

ful of men who originated the modern computer. He was personally responsible for construction of EDSAC 1, which was working in May 1949. Some of the concepts first proposed by him, such as microprogramming, have continued to grow in importance. Today virtually all computers manufactured in the world are designed using this technique.

For the last 35 years, he worked at (continued on page 5)


In this newly-created position, Larry will be responsible for the development and implementation of manage-

# Cast of thousands stands behind VAX

An estimated 2200 Digital employees posed behind a VAX computer Wednesday Sept. 4 on the lawn in front of Parker Street. Overhead, first in a helicopter, then leaning from the uplifted bucket of a "cherry picker" truck, freelance photographer Leon Kuzmanoff shot the photos that will soon appear in ads for Digital's Customer Services. Volunteers came from Maynard, Bedford, Sudbury, Tewksbury and as far away as Merrimack. A few employees in town on business from more distant sites (such as Puerto Rico and Geneva) also took part in the photo session.


As a thank you to everyone who participated, Customer Services will distribute reprints of the ad as soon as they are available, probably in about two months.

Using five motor-drive Nikon-F cameras, Leon shot over 450 pictures in 31 minutes. As Leon shot, his assistant reloaded the cameras and took photos of Leon in action. Meanwhile, Digital photographers and a videotape crew from Media Services documented the event from the rooftop and the ground.

easier to borrow an entire machine than to have half a machine built to order. So they got a VAX on one-day loan from Salem Systems Manufactur-

Thanks to elaborate preparations. everything ran smoothly. In two dry runs, they made calculations, checking the angle, depth and width of field of various lenses, determining how the area should be laid out and going over details of crowd control and security.

Leon was no stranger to helicopters and unusual photo assignments. Once he had to shoot tied horizontal on a platform hanging by four ropes from a helicopter. The client wanted a shot of an elaborate farming operation. By hanging over the edge of the platform and using a fisheye lens, Leon was able to get a shot that showed a full 360° horizon, with the farm in the middle.

# How to manage distributed data processing

Managers often have to make decisions as to what computing resources to use to solve business problems. A three-day non-technical seminar "Management Control of the Distributed Computing Environment" (Oct. 1-3 at Bedford) will provide such managers with tools for evaluating whether distributed data processing (DDP) meets their needs. It also will suggest steps to insure that distributed data processing matches their business structures.

Areas to be covered include: organizational impact of DDP, features/benefits/opportunities matrix, office automation in the distributed environment, the DDP decision matrix, risk management of DDP, pitfall, cost occurrence vs. frequency of occurrence, and the changing roles of the data processing manager and staff.

# Can computers create art?

To demonstrate the artistic potential of computer-generated graphics and artificial intelligence, the Digital Computer Museum is holding a lecture and demonstration by Harold Cohen on Tuesday, September 23 at 5 p.m.

Cohen, a professor at the University of California, San Diego, creates his works using a PDP-11/45, a Tektronix display terminal and a 'turtle' (small mobile robot) that draws from directions from a sonar navigation system. Cohen's program, which steers the turtle, can differentiate between figure and ground, open and closed forms, insideness and outsideness and other cognitive constants. The rules it rollows refer to what has been completed, with some randomizing to provide variety. Using these techniques, he created a nine foot by seventeen

foot mural which he is now transferring to one of the balcony walls at the Computer Museum.

To further show what can be done with computer-generated graphics, the Museum is now holding an exhibition of 45 works representative of the development of this art form over the last 20 years.

Horseshoe tournament to benefit United Way


