


Dear Reader,

The History of Maynard

O SEARCH FOR THE BEGINNINGS OF Maynard is in a way like digging into quick-sand. Let us start at the beginning, one thinks, only to realize the beginning is elusive indeed.

Did Maynard begin in 1638, when it was first settled under the name of Sudbury? Or was it in 1871, when it first became its own town?

Or should one go even farther back and trace the roots of its distinct character to England or Ireland? Or perhaps to Finland, Italy, Poland and Russia, for all these nations and events are a part of Maynard's history. And still, the event that truly set Maynard apart from its neighbors has yet to be mentioned.

For the history of Maynard has its proper beginnings in the early 1700's, with the construction of the town's first mills. The first mills were saw and grist mills, common to most towns in the area. They were the predecessors of the Assabet mills, which soon became the very heart of the town, the source of its prosperity (and of its misery), the buyer of its labor and the nourishment for its growth.


If not for the mills, Maynard would not have had its lively business district along Main Street, nor its particular blend of races and cultures. For it was the mills that attracted all these things to the little community originally known as the Assabet Village.

Thus it was only fitting that the town be named after Amory Maynard, founder of the Assabet Mills, which still stand today as the home of Digital Equipment Corporation.

#### THE EARLY MILLS

The Maynard Historical Society records two early saw and grist mills dating back at least to the beginning of the 18th Century. They were known as the Puffer Mill and Asa Smith's Mill and were located on Taylor Brook and Mill Street, respectively. These mills were the first to harness the power of the Assabet for manufacturing.

According to the History of Maynard, assembled by the Historical Society, the Puffer Mill ran so slowly that its workers would "start the machinery and then go to other work or gossip, and when the saw had run its course it would stop itself."

But the mills did not remain so sluggish for long. A new type of mill was built in 1820 for the production of paper. This mill was upgraded with new machinery and later sold to Boston entrepreneur William Parker.

Parker joined his mill with several others in Stow and Sudbury in 1831. Together they became part of the Fourdrinier Paper Company, which supplied the Boston Journal, then among New England's largest newspapers.

The mill ran for over 60 years until 1882, when its wheels turned for the last time. It was purchased by William Maynard, second son of Amory Maynard, and sold again in 1893 to the Assabet Manufacturing Company.

Neither of the latter owners put the mill to use and it was burned to the ground in 1894.

Powder mills also sprang up along the Assabet River in both Maynard and Acton. These, however, often proved more of a menace than a contribution to the town, as the powder exploded on many occasions, sometimes damaging the mills and killing the laborers inside.

Maynard historians recorded that in 1895 several mills exploded, causing the death of five men. Another explosion, in 1915, "was felt for 50 miles, with extensive damage to store windows in Maynard and as far as Waltham and Lowell."

With a sigh of relief, the town bid the powder mills farewell in 1940, after another round of explosions.

For all their volatility, however, the powder mills continued and expanded upon a local tradition of ties between the town and the world around it, for the mills not only acted as a magnet for American and foreign entrepreneurs, but also shipped their products as far away as Russia, the sole purchaser of their output during the First World War.

#### THE ASSABET MILLS

At the very center of the town, and of its history as well, lie the Assabet Mills, the first of which was built by Amory Maynard in 1846. Together with his partner William H. Knight, he built a dam across the Assabet and dug a canal, channeling a portion of the river into what is now called Mill Pond. In the years between then and the close of the Second World War, more than 20 buildings would arise around the man-made reservoir to draw power from its diverted waters.

On May 19, 1846, Amory Maynard began a series of land purchases which eventually placed in his hands all of the mills and water rights in the Assabet Village. This included 109 acres of prime real estate in the center of the village.

Maynard diverted the flow of the river by damming it and digging a canal into what is now Mill Pond in the center of town. This task completed, he began the installation of the water wheels and the construction of the buildings around them.



The first of the Assabet Mills was a modest structure, 50 feet by 100 feet, at the intersection of what is now Main and Walnut Street. Maynard chose carpet yarns as the initial product.

For ten years, the mills turned a profit until a business panic caused them to falter in 1857. The Civil War, however, brought them back to life. In 1862 they were incorporated into the Assabet Manufacturing Company, with Amory Maynard as Agent, and flourished by supplying the Union Army with clothing and blankets of wool.

Fueled by the new markets, the American Woolen Company began to expand its potential. The small wooden buildings were replaced by brick factories. It was also during this period that the 207-foot chimney was erected and the tower clock installed by Amory's son Lorenzo. The clock was donated in memory of Amory Maynard, who died in 1890.

## CHANGE COMES TO THE ASSABET VILLAGE

Here, it is perhaps appropriate to pause and observe the changes that beset the town in the four short decades since Amory Maynard set his plans in motion.

Before 1847 there was no Main Street nor Nason Street, which are presently lined with shops and cafes in Maynard's vibrant business district. By 1849, however, both streets were constructed, along with a wooden bridge where Main Street crossed the Assabet.

By 1865 Glendale Street, Taylor Road, Sudbury Street and Walnut Street were laid out in response to the growing needs (and growing population) of the town.

Roads at that time were of dirt, paved with gravel. Their maintenance consisted of a horse-drawn cart sprinkling oil to keep the dust down. In 1849, work began on a railroad that carried its first passenger into town in 1850.

Houses in Maynard were not only influenced by the utilitarian atmosphere created by the mills, but in fact built by the American Woolen Company to house mill workers.

Often constructed in haste, these buildings were designed to house the rapidly increasing population of the town. All the same, a traveler through the town today will be impressed by the character that many of its homes do indeed possess.

The first drugstore opened in 1865. Soon thereafter a general store, a barbershop, a billiard room, a post office and a printing shop appeared. For a doctor, however, one still had to go into Stow or to the Acton Center. One doctor per location.

The most significant of the changes, however, occurred in April 1871, when Maynard became incorporated as its own town into the Commonwealth.

In January of that year, residents of the Assabet Village submitted a petition to the state legislature declaring that because of the remote location of the village within the towns of Sudbury and Stow, which shared the village at that time:

"they are subject to great and injurious inconveniences in exercising their legal rights as voters and citizens; that they are deprived of their fair share of Educational Advantages and street improvements according to their taxation; that these evils are oppressive and can only be remedied by incorporating your petitioners into a distinct municipality..."

The request was granted, despite protests from both Sudbury and Stow over the loss of citizens, land and resources. Maynard had about 1,500 residents at that time.

#### Maynard Enters The Twentieth Century

Expansions begun by the American Woolen Company at the turn of the century more than doubled the size of the previous mill complex. The largest of

the new buildings, known as Building No. 5, was over 600 feet long, 100 feet wide and five stories tall. Upon its construction it was the largest woolen mill in the world.

The American Woolen Company switched from gas to electric power at this time and began generating electricity for the entire town as well as several neighboring towns.

The word was spread far and wide: Maynard was

booming!

Signs went up in the mills, telling workers to send for their relatives abroad. Agents were even sent out to find recruits.

As much of Europe at that time suffered under miserable economic and political conditions, word spread quickly that work was to be had in the factories of Maynard. As was expected, immigrants flooded the town, more than satisfying the mills' hunger for cheap labor. By 1905, the population was twice as large as it was only ten years before.

New tenements were built to house them, including the one on Main Street which is now the town's Post Office. New water and sewage pipes were laid out to accommodate the housing additions. New businesses appeared, hoping to reap a portion of the town's newfound prosperity.

Both the mills and local shops teemed with life once again, drawing people from far and wide. With the growth of the downtown business area, Maynard became the shopping center for the neighboring towns of Acton, Stow, Sudbury and others. People had money to spend and Maynard was the place to spend it.

"We had the railroad running through here and all the electric cars running from West Acton to here and also from Concord to Hudson," Maynard Historian Ralph Sheridan said. From the neighboring towns, "they all came in on Friday night. The women would do the shopping and the men would go into the bar rooms. Then they'd get together on the last cars back home, loaded with bundles and groceries. There was a store for almost everything in those days," he explained.

As in the past, however, these upbeat times also proved short-lived. Before long the engines of prosperity began once again to sputter.

In the late twenties the textile market was in







decline and the ripples spread from Mill Pond throughout the town. Any recovery was precluded by the Great Depression of the 1930's.

The American Woolen Company began selling off its assets to keep afloat. For those living in Maynard who had put a little money aside, this meant they could purchase their living quarters from the company, but cheap! Roy Helander, a Maynard resident

and son of Finnish immigrants, recalled the day the houses went up for sale.

"I remember my mother taking me down there," Helander said. "Many of the people living there were able to buy a house for \$800 or \$1,000, depending on what it was like. The deal was that they worked and it was taken out of their salaries, whatever amount they had agreed to."

The woolen company experienced a brief resurgence of prosperity during the Second World War. At that time the demand for blankets, uniforms and overcoats for the American troops kept the mills running around the clock.

But by 1950 the American Woolen Company was in trouble again and ceased wool production for what was to be the very last time. The people of Maynard organized themselves to purchase the remaining property of their former employer. The company, however, claimed it was considering reopening the mills and declined the offer.

Its intransigence continued for three years until it finally sold the mill complex for \$200,000 to a group of Worcester businessmen who had formed Maynard Industries, Inc.

With this purchase, Maynard history turned a corner. The days of a one-industry town had passed, for the mills became the home of 20 firms by the time of Maynard's centennial in 1971. Even as one of them, Digital Equipment Corporation, expanded to take over the entire mill complex, local shopowners were declaring their independence.



To be sure, Digital remains today the largest employer for the residents of Maynard and the other neighboring towns. But local business leaders say mills are no longer the life's blood of the town as they were in the past.

"Digital plays the largest part," explained Irwin Gomberg, past President of Maynard's Chamber of Commerce, "but the population of Maynard has gone up significantly. We have more of a population

to draw on now."

If Digital was not providing a market for local labor, Gomberg said, most area establishments would be able to survive. "I've been here when there was nobody in the mills," he said. Even then, many businessmen, including the Paper Store and Village Jewelers, which Gomberg now owns, were able to survive.

"It's certainly proof that businesses can make it

through," said Gomberg.

For Digital Equipment Corporation, the mills have provided a pleasant and practical atmosphere for the headquarters of its multinational corporation.

DEC, which became the sole owner of the mill complex in 1974, began renovating and refurnishing the buildings to make optimum use of the existing structures. The spaciousness of the mills, which facilitated rearrangements of equipment, was a plus for a company with such changing needs.

The company replaced existing sashes and relied when possible on cool breezes through the large windows to keep employees cool in the summer. In addition, the size of the windows kept the offices brightly illuminated in the daytime, reducing the

need for overhead lights.

Despite extensive renovations to the interior, DEC has left the facades of the complex untouched for the most part. Today the mills still stand in the center of town, at once a living record of Maynard's heritage and a source of optimism for a prosperous future.



#### N THE COUNTIES WHERE THEY WERE

born, they were peasants or farmers, for the most part desperate and destitute. To abandon ones homeland for a foreign place, it must be understood, is for the average man and woman an


act of desperation.

But it is also an act of faith and determination, both of which were an essential character trait for those who chose to stay in Maynard. Most arrived in Boston Harbor, unable to understand English. There, immigration officials pinned a number on their lapels stating which train to take from Boston and when it departed.

For those who settled in Maynard at the turn of the century and beyond, the former life of outdoor farming was gone, replaced by twelve-hour days inside the walls of a factory. Most had neither formal education nor the means to get ahead in the New

World.

For them, succeeding meant simply holding their ground, leaving the good life to future generations. Simply put, they left their homes because, as hard



as life might have been for the newcomer in America, it was worse where they came from.

It was different for the first waves of newcomers, the English and Scots. For them, Maynard was a place to clear the land and set up a farm. Englishmen and Scots arrived throughout the 17th and 18th centuries. They blended easily, having a common language and many common customs. Land was plentiful, although the wilderness had its own dangers, including that of Indian attacks.

Before English control over the area was firmly and finally established, many on both sides lost their lives when the smoldering tensions between settler

and Indian ignited into violence.

The most notorious of these conflicts involved an Indian Chief known as King Phillip. During a rampage in 1676 that lasted several days, Phillip succeeded in slaughtering what was nearly the entire population of Maynard, then a part of Sudbury.

Immediately thereafter, the Indians were forcibly subdued by British soldiers, and the area slowly repopulated itself. Now the hardships for the immigrant were of a different nature.

At the turn of the century, the mills experienced a surge of orders for their woolen products.

Finding themselves suddenly in the midst of a labor shortage, they began "advertising for help," said Town Historian Ralph Sheridan, "telling all the foreign nationalities to send over and get their cousins and brothers and sisters to come over" to work in the mills.

The first ethnic group to respond to the call in significant numbers was the Finns. For many families in Finland at that time, the farms on which they were born were simply too small to support all the children. Added to this predicament was widespread oppression against minorities in the Russian Empire, of which Finland was a part.

Between 1890 and the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, the Finns came to Maynard in such large numbers that they nearly doubled the population of the town. With them they brought a fiery spirit of independence and something of a radical streak, which they inherited from the turmoil they left



behind them in Russia.

Decades after the first Finn arrived, they were to play an active role in the labor movement of the 1920's and 1930's. To the town, the Finns also contributed their native customs, sports, music and theatre.

"They eventually got mixed into town affairs," Sheridan explained. "But the earlier ones kept pretty much to themselves. They organized clubs, and every Finn could play a wind instrument of some kind so they had two or three bands going."

They set up several ethnic societies, the first of which, dating back to 1895, was the Alku Temperance Society. Several years later, the Finns established the Finnish Mission Evangelical Church.

In step with their independent nature, the Finns established a worker's society in 1903 to unite the mill workers as a bargaining unit. This society also sponsored sports, plays, wrestling, gymnastics, dances and lessons in socialism.

The Finns also set up a cooperative store in response to prices in town stores which they considered unreasonably high. The store proved quite a success and lasted until the early 1970's, when competition from the supermarkets forced it to close.

Every so often, Maynard Finns got together with Finnish people from as far away as Boston and matched their athletic clubs against one another. For less competitive recreation, however, they also built two parks, one beside Vose's Pond in Maynard and another in West Concord. There young and old alike gathered in the summer months to swim, picnic or take part in other forms of outdoor recreation.

Shortly after the Finns, Scandinavian peoples began to arrive in Maynard, including the Danes, Swedes and to a lesser extent the Norwegians. The Danes and Swedes both set up Brotherhood Societies in 1904 and 1913 respectively.

Italians followed at about the same time, adding "a lot of vivacity and spice to the Maynard scene," the town history chronicle states. They too established ethnic social groups, including the Italian Citizens' Club, the Order of the Sons of Italy, the Italian Social Club and the Saint Anthony's Society. Some of these clubs still exist today, although they are no longer as active as they were when populated with native and first-generation Italians.

The Russian influx into Maynard began just before the turn of the century. The first trace of them was the holding of Orthodox services at Maynard's Union Congregational Church. In 1916 construction began on St. Mary's Russian Church, which still stands today on Prospect St., although the name has been changed to the Holy Annunciation Russian Orthodox Greek Catholic Church.

These groups were later joined by Lithuanian and Jewish immigrants, who also added their special flavor of life to the potpourri that Maynard had become.


The large majority of these foreign nationals became mill workers. Simply put, "you had to work and there was no place else around," Sheridan said. The working conditions under which they labored in the mills are today a testimony to the strength and

determination necessary to begin anew in a foreign land.

For those who came first to the mills, however, the conditions were not so trying as in later years. To be sure, the days were long and the pay low, but according to Finnish-American Roy Helander, "companies in the beginning were very careful about not having the employees hurt themselves on the machinery."

Helander's father, John, came to Maynard from Finland in 1905 and worked in the mills until his retirement.

"I always thought they stepped into a sweat shop when they got off the boat," Helander said. "But my father said it wasn't true, that it was a nice place to work in the beginning."

In later years, however, the conditions worsened significantly. Ralph Sheridan, who worked in the mills for several years, recalled the "terrible noise" created by the looms, of which 100 or more were often crammed into a single room. For those workers who stayed at such jobs for any length of time, loss of hearing was an almost certain result.

But an even greater danger was posed by exposed gears and drive belts on which a careless worker could easily get caught.

For Maynard's women, conditions were no picnic either. Resident and mill-worker Margaret Larson, born in Maynard in 1897, recalled in a 1987 interview what it was like to be a young woman in Maynard at the beginning of the century.

"There weren't many kids who went to high school in those days," she explained. She herself began working in the mills at the age of 14. For \$4.40 per week, she toiled in the drawing room, preparing yarn to be woven.

Four days before her 16th birthday, labor laws were passed that prohibited children under 16 from working. As a result, she got a four day vacation (without pay, one may assume!).

Married at age 18, Larson was put out of work again because of a company policy forbidding married women to work except in times of exceptional demand.

She remembered the endless cycles of feast or famine that beset the town. "Sometimes you'd just get back on your feet," she said, "and it would go slack again and you'd be back out."

In general, workers' wages ranged from \$3.60 to \$7.00 per week, depending on age, gender and experience. For women and children, this amounted to around 4½° per hour; for men, 12½° per hour. The average income in Maynard in the first decades of the century was \$476.

But the workers did not take this exploitation sitting down. The History of Maynard states that "with the cyclical nature of the textile industry on top of the periodic recessions and depressions of the American economy, the natural result was that labor turmoil would take place."

According to this chronicle, workers began organizing as early as 1902. Skilled workers were the first to take the initiative, followed by other laborers in town.



"The spinners struck in January 1902 for extra pay for overtime, causing the entire mill with 1,000 employees to close," the book states. "A year later they struck again, complaining that \$10.44 per week was not enough. They were given \$12.00."

Most of the strikes, however, were not so successful. The American Woolen Company employed shrewd tactics of using one ethnic group as "strike-busters" against the next. This policy was facilitated by the fact that, because few of them could speak English at first, communication between the groups was often impossible. Thus striking Finns were replaced by Poles, who were replaced by the next ethnic group to arrive.

In addition, two different unions, the Amalgamated Textile Workers and the United Textile Workers, sought to represent the rank and file. The end result, however, was that labor efforts were divided between these two often-conflicting fronts.

A death blow was dealt to the crumbling union movement in Maynard by none other than Franklin Delano Roosevelt and his New Deal. After Roosevelt introduced these new and radical measures, workers began to look to the Federal government for the protection of their rights.

At the same time, Maynard's ethnic groups were finding that their differences were not so significant. In the end, the relationship between the groups became, rather than one of conflict, one of blending.

"This country being the great melting pot," Sheridan said, "naturally they melted here too. They mixed up through intermarriage so that there are a lot of families now that are half-Finnish and half-

Irish or half-Polish and so on and so forth. It's a general mix-up."

In most cases, the melting process began with the first generation born in America.

First-generation Finnish American Roy Helander recalled that he began to make ties outside the Finnish community during his first days at school. Among the children, he said, "nobody spoke any English until they went to school. But naturally, once you got there, you met kids from other town and you suddenly found out you were different. Those school teachers must have had a terrible time to be faced with 30 kids, half of them speaking different languages completely."

Each generation became another step removed from the language and culture of its heritage. By the second generation, few children could speak the languages of their grandparents fluently.

"So many of the older generation are gone now," Sheridan commented. "And the younger ones, well, they have other interests. They're Americanized."

Which is not to say that the influences of the old world have completely disappeared. Today, many landmarks stand throughout the town to remind its inhabitants of its rich and diverse heritage. Some, like the Russian Orthodox Church on Prospect St., have retained their original purpose. Others, like the Finnish Co-op building that now houses Shawmut Bank on Main Street, have taken on other functions.

But for those with a keen eye and a sense of town history, there are reminders everywhere of the colorful and often turbulent past of the people of Maynard.





'Assabet Village became the by-product of man's ingenuity and his natural inclination to continuous development. He used the virgin forests, the sloping pastures, the fertile fields, the strength of running streams, and harnessed these gifts of nature to his brain and brawn."

S A BY-PRODUCT OF ITS INDUSTRY, Maynard became a magnet, not only for factory labor, but for the entrepreneur as well. Each new establishment added to the good of those who had come before it.

Naturally, each new shop meant new competition for its neighbors. But at the same time, with each addition the business district as a whole grew to provide a more vibrant shopping area, drawing its clientele from an ever-increasing circle of customers.

#### AMORY MAYNARD

Among Maynard's most ambitious and influential businessmen is Amory Maynard, for whom the town was named in 1871. Born in Marlborough in 1826, Maynard was the son of Isaac Maynard, who owned a sawmill on the very pond where Amory was born.

At the age of 16, Amory inherited the mill from his father. But when the city of Boston took over the pond, Maynard lost the water rights and was forced to look elsewhere to channel his industrious nature.

In 1846, he and his partner, William Knight, began a series of land purchases which eventually placed water rights under their control. In all, they purchased over 100 acres in the center of the Assabet Village.


They subsequently channeled the flow of the Assabet River and dammed it to form Mill Pond, on which the Assabet Mills now stand. Thereafter, they began construction on the mills which began to churn out their first products, carpet yarns, in the spring of 1847.

The History of Maynard, Massachusetts records that "in 1855, the industry was contained in three wooden buildings and consisted of eleven worsted combers, four sets of cards, fifty-two hand carpet looms and employed one hundred and twenty-five hands."

Maynard took over the entire mill operation in 1852 upon William Knight's retirement. Five years later, however, the business failed in the panic of

The outbreak of the Civil War five years later was a saving grace for the company, creating a great de-

mand for wool coats, tents and blankets. Maynard had since switched mill production from carpets to wool and was thus in a position to turn a profit from the war, although his business was in need of some revitalization.

In 1862 the Assabet Manufacturing Company revived the mills and kept Maynard on under the title of "Agent." He continued in this position until his retirement in 1885, when he turned his title over to his son, Lorenzo.

Town historians reported that the value of Maynard's mills increased ten-fold between the year they were built and the time of Maynard's death in 1890. Several of his descendants would later play an active role in the community and in town government, although today not a one of them remains in the town.

#### VILLAGE JEWELERS

Beside Amory Maynard's mammoth factories, many shopowners were able to weather the turbulence of the mill cycles. Among them is the past president of Maynard's Chamber of Commerce, Irwin Gomberg.

Gomberg currently owns Village Jewelers on Main Street, which he purchased from former owner Joseph Stuart 32 years ago.

"Icame here as a watchmaker working for Stuart's International," Gomberg recalled. "Mr. Stuart told me at that time that some day I would own this store."

Five years later Stuart sold the store to Gomberg on generous terms, allowing him an extended period of time to pay for the purchase. Today, Gomberg's son Allen works in his father's store and will, when his time comes, inherit the business.

It's a trade that has been passed through the generations, Gomberg explained. "My dad was a jeweler." That, however, is not the only tradition at Village Jewelers.

"I have customers who have been with me almost since I began the business here," he said. "I've sold engagement rings to fathers and now to their sons."

Gomberg has expanded the store, adding not only his talents at watchmaking, but those of his son, now a professional gemologist. A goldsmith also works full-time in the back room of the store.

Gomberg was attracted to Maynard, he explained, simply because "I liked the town. It was a small town and I enjoyed working in this atmosphere. I got to know quite a few people in this area."

In addition to the friendships that have developed in the area, Gomberg relishes "the satisfaction of working for yourself."

Which is a good thing, he said with a smile. "I spend more time here than in my own home."

#### THE PAPER STORE

Another business that has survived the cycles is the Paper Store, located on Nason Street. The original founder of the store, Bartholomew J. Coughlin, known more simply as "B.J." was the second person to be born into the newly-incorporated town.

While working in the burling room of the mills, Coughlin observed through a window the patrons who frequented a nearby fruit store. It was then that he got the idea to start a business of his own.

In the summer of 1892, B.J. opened a fruit and variety store, which he changed to a bicycle shop in 1896. Within two years he was able to turn a significant profit, after which he expanded into selling newspapers. Ten years later he sold the entire business, resting on the rewards of his labor.

It was purchased by James J. Ledgard and thereafter the Paper Store came into being.

Today the paper store stands next to its original site in what was Maynard;s first fire station. Robert Anderson, currently the third owner of the store, has turned a steady profit from its wares.

Described by Store Manager David Januskiewicz as "a real family store," the shop now offers everything from greeting cards to books to games and novelties.

"We try to have something whether you're three years old or 83 years old," Januskiewicz said. Anderson has expanded his store to include branches in Acton and Clinton, Mass.

#### THE ASSABET JANITORIAL AND PAPER SUPPLY COMPANY

A classic tale of the fruits of hard work and ambition is the story of Roger Hatch. At 37, Hatch is the owner of the Assabet Janitorial and Paper Supply Company, a young and growing company that grossed over one million dollars in 1988.

After graduating from Maynard High School, Hatch attended a vocational school in Waltham,

where he studied machine shop.

In 1970, he took a job in his field at Reese Corporation, where he worked for nearly a decade. According to Hatch, however, the company that employed him invested only four percent of its profit into research and the rest, he said, "went into the stockholders' pockets."

"I saw the writing on the wall," Hatch said, and as the company fell on hard times, he went off on his own to start up the Hudson Appliance Company with a partner, Arthur P. Redding. Once the company was started, Hatch began pounding the pavement, selling his commodities. But this, he discovered, was no easy task.

"You go cold calling," he explained, "and you get slapped in the face five or six times. You start to think

there's something wrong with you."

Then he learned to see his trade as a matter of percentages. If he made a sale in only ten percent of his attempts, he figured, he was doing well.

"If I got nine 'no's'," Hatch said, "I felt good be-

cause the next one I would hit."

With persistence, his company grew until several years later business was cruising on an even keel. But once the appliance company began running itself, he recalled, "there was nothing for me to do because I just can't stand there and wait for customers to come in the door."

At the urging of a friend, Hatch began a second company, the Assabet Janitorial Company. It began in his cellar on Parker Street, he said, because "I couldn't afford a place at that time." Shortly thereafter he rented space for his company on Nason Street, where he stayed for three years. Then he purchased the building where his company is presently on Main Street.

"Both companies grew so big that my partner and I decided he would keep the appliance company and I would take the janitorial company," Hatch said. Once again, he began going from door to door, selling his products, but instead of appliances, this time they were cleaning products from detergents to paper towels.

In time he got as regular customers the Maynard Elks, the local American Legion, Digital Equipment Corporation, and schools in Maynard, Sudbury,

Hudson, Marlboro and Bolton.

His company has grown at a steady 44 percent a year, he said. "We worked hard and we had a good crew." Initially the sole employee, Hatch has brought his company in only eight years to its current size, employing nine other people and practically outgrowing its present building.

His previous customers keep coming back, he

said, and the search for new customers continues. He prefers to limit the growth of his company, however, to the point where it turns a steady and healthy profit, but not so large that it becomes overly cumbersome.

"It's not how much you make, it's how much you take home," he explained.

The key to his success, he said, is keeping abreast of the latest products and technology, and making the right business decisions. "It's just making sure every move you make is correct before you make it," he said.


"If you're going to make a mistake, make a small one first."

#### KEN OLSEN AND DIGITAL

In the midst of Maynard's many successful businessmen is a man who began his career as a computer engineer. Now the president and cofounder of the multinational Digital Equipment Corporation, Kenneth Harry Olsen has become Maynard's most famous entrepreneur by far, and to hear him tell it, it's from simply building a better mousetrap.

Speaking in Boston in 1982, Olsen stated that when he began his career, "I only wanted to do some research."

"Back when I was at MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology), I was perfectly happy—I had all the things I had ever dreamed of, and I though I could talk them into any project—thought I could get all



the money I wanted for research, not for pay, and this is where it developed."

Before long, however, he "discovered there was one thing missing in research. Nobody cared."

"That really set the idea that we had to show people at MIT how to make transistor computers, but nobody paid any attention to us," Olsen said. "So, we decided to go into business."

Olsen and his partners had "some very unusual computer ideas," he explained. His new brand of computers, developed by engineers at MIT were, in his words, "very simple."

"Most computers at that time were designed by professors who had an obligation to make things complicated so they would have something over their students," he said. But the people who came together on Digital computers "were not professors and had a vested interest in making it simple. They hired retired television repairmen to do the work."

"All the complexity given up to make the machine simple was put into making it fast," he said.

In 1957, Olsen took his idea for the manufacture of this new model to the American Research and Development Corporation, which loaned him \$70,000 to develop his product.

"We found space in the old woolen mill in Maynard on the second floor, with a narrow stair-

way and no elevator," Olsen recalled.

At that time, the mills had been bought by several Marlborough businessmen and the rooms of the mammoth structure were being rented out to budding local companies. Olsen replaced a discount store that had just moved out.

Production began with only three people: Olsen, his brother Stan, and fellow engineer Harlan Anderson.

"We paid twenty-five cents a square foot per year with watchman service and heat," Olsen said. "The next lease was fifty cents a square foot, so it was extravagant. There were nine thousand square feet. It seemed tremendously large when there were just three of us."

Sales during the first year reached \$94,000. By 1962, Digital earnings had increased to \$6.5 million. In 1963, the company went international, opening sales offices in Germany, Canada and later in Australia and Great Britain.

By 1974, Digital completed the purchase of other portions of the mill complex, bringing the entirety of the structures under its ownership. With annual revenues of \$121.5 billion dollars in 1988, over 100,000 employees and branches in 64 countries, Digital has emerged as one of the most significant sources of employment and prosperity for the area.

Olsen has supervised renovations of the mills, making them at once an efficient base for the corporate giant and an attractive landmark in the center of town. Today, Digital still claims Maynard, Mass. as its home base.




#### Maynard Today And The Revitalization Project

As the clock strikes noon on any weekday, the sidewalks, shops and restaurants of Maynard fill with local employees. Restaurants and cafes are in abundance and the scene is lively.

The town has come a long way, particularly in recent years as town officials and businessmen joined together nearly ten years ago in a massive effort to revitalize the downtown area.

more space for pedestrian traffic. Space was provided for trees to be planted, adding a touch of greenery to the downtown streets.

Town officials acquired both state and federal funding to finance in its entirety the construction of the project, leaving the town to pay only the engineering costs. Of this amount, two local corporations, Digital Equipment Corporation and Data Terminal Systems, contributed \$50,000, or approximately half of the cost.

The cost of the actual work was \$1.7 million when it went out to bid in 1984, but according to Maynard's Administrative Assistant Michael Gionotis, the final cost "was well over that."

Downtown shopowners did their part to enhance the project, drawing on state aid available to merchants desiring to renovate the facades of their buildings as part of the effort. The Assabet Village Marketplace, emerged, offering store space to new entrepreneurs in the town. Although the town is no longer a business center for the area as it once was, it still draws its clientele from Acton, Stow, Sudbury, Framingham, Chelmsford and many other nearby towns.

Maynard provides "a pleasant shopping experience," explained Irwin Gomberg, past President of the Maynard Chamber of Commerce. "Most of the shops are owner-operated, which gives you personal service and personal satisfaction. That's one of the biggest assets that Maynard has."

Gomberg said he has found Maynard shopowners "more helpful and more interested in customers."

"I think the town is destined to become a much better shopping area," he said. "The merchants are becoming more progressive and will help to make the image of Maynard a better one."

"I'm very optimistic about bringing people here after the project," Chairman of Maynard Selectmen George Shaw concurred, adding that business in the future also hinged on "merchants of the town getting together and keeping it nice."

Shaw cited stores such as Murphy and Snyder printers and Gruber Brothers furniture store that have been doing business in town since the beginning of the century.







#### **AUTO REGISTRATION** AND LICENSE PLATE PURCHASE

License plates for new vehicles and vehicles of new residents must be registered with the state Registry of Motor Vehicles. A new registration sticker must be purchased yearly. The nearest registry office is located at 525 Maple Street in Marlborough, telephone 485-1700. A new resident to Massachusetts generally has 30 days to obtain a state driver's license and license plate.

#### **AUTO INSPECTION**

Motor vehicles must be inspected annually. Generally, the last number of your license plate is the number of the month in which your auto is to be inspected. (Example, if the last digit is "5", then your car should be inspected in May.) An inspection sticker is affixed to the front windshield after the vehicle passes certain safety and emissions testing. #### LIBRARY

Maynard's library (897-1010) is located adjacent to the Town Building on Main Street. The hours beginning in early September are Monday through Wednesday 12-7 pm, Thursday and Saturday 10 am-5 pm. The library is closed on Friday and Sunday. In the summer the library closes on Saturday and is open Fridays 10 am to 5 pm. Friends of the Maynard Public Library meet at the library the 3rd Tuesday of every month at 7:30 p.m.

#### LICENSES

The town clerk (897-1000) should be contacted for licenses for dogs, hunting and fishing, marriage, death, and birth certificates and business licenses. Fees and regulations vary for each required license.



#### **MUSEUM CARDS**

The Maynard Library has passes available to any Audubon Society facility in Massachusetts. The closest facility is Drumlin Farm in Lincoln. Passes are also currently available for the Museum of Science and Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. The pass gives the borrower free admission. Please call the library to reserve your pass. The Friends of the Maynard Library are interested in raising funds for other free passes to local museums such as The Discovery Museums in Acton and the New England Aquarium in Boston. Please call the library (897-1010) to get an up to date list of the museum passes available.

#### MUSEUMS

The list of museums in the Metro West area and in the City of Boston is very long. The following is a partial list of museums in the area. The library is also a good source for a more complete list of area museums and places for family outings.

The Discovery Museums, on Main Street in South Acton (264-4200) are two educational, non profit museums specializing in hands on activity. Opened in 1982, the Children's Discovery Museum has nine theme rooms, including a dinosaur room and a chain reaction room. It is ideal for young children, ages one to ten. An adjacent Science Discovery Museum, geared to age 6 and older, opened

in 1987 and is completely accessible to the handicapped. It is filled with exhibits such as water discovery, inventor's workshop and a light and color room. The museums offer numerous special events and activities which are announced in local news media and a membership newsletter. Admission to either museum is \$4.50 per person; children under 1 year are admitted free. Both museums in one day costs \$8.00. Annual membership is \$65 and includes unlimited visits to both museums during public hours and a newsletter. Museum hours September to June are 9 am to 4:30 pm, Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday; and 1 pm to 4:30 pm on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Summer hours are Tuesday-Sunday, 9 am to 4:30 am. They are closed Mondays except during some school holidays, which may also include extended hours. The first two weeks in September both museums are closed for annual "spruce-up". On-site parking is available. The Children's Museum also offers a story phone at 264-4222. The Science Discovery Museum offers an experiment phone at 264-9592.

Other local museums include: Hosmer House Museum (built in 1760 by Jonathan Hosmer-an early settler of Acton) 300 Main Street Acton, 263-2090; Faulkner House (National Register building built in 1702) 5 High Street, Acton, 263-7503; Great Brook Farms State Park (a working dairy farm), Carlisle, 369-6312; Museum of Our National Heritage (exhibits of American History), 33 Marrett Road, Lexington, 617-861-6559; DeCordova and Dana Museum and Park (a contemporary center for the arts), Sandy Pond Road, Lincoln, 617-259-8355; Concord Museum (American decorative arts and historic artifacts), 200 Lexington Road, Concord, 369-9609; North Bridge Visitors Center (Colonial exhibits), Concord, 369-6993; Thoreau Lyceum (Thoreau artifacts), 156 Belknap Street, Concord, 369-5912; Fruitlands Museums (four museums of nineteenth century American art and history), 102 Prospect Hill Road, Harvard, 456-3924; Alcott-Orchard House (Alcott family home) Lexington Road, Concord, 369-4118; Lowell National Historical Park Visitors Center (a history of the early Lowell mills-including canal tour during the summer) Lowell, 459-1000.

The Boston Globe (800-532-9524) and Boston Herald (800-882-1211) and Lowell Sun (458-7100) also circulate in Maynard. The Action Unlimited of Concord (371-2442) also serves Maynard.

Cable Channel 61 broadcasts programs from the Maynard High School. A popular kid's show, Fleepo the Clown, is aired Thursday nights. The show is filmed Friday afternoons. Parents whose children are interested in being on the show should call the studio at 897-5213 for information.

The high school radio station broadcasts on 91.7 FM (WAVM). The public is encouraged to participate with the TV or radio station. Call Joe Magno at 897-5213 for more information.



#### **P**ARADES

Maynard has many parades throughout the year. The Veteran's Council schedules a parade on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The Christmas parade (held every year for over 20 years) is in early December and features a "special" guest. Independence Day is yet another parade held in conjunction with other festivities. Check the local papers for the specific dates for the parades.

#### PARKING BAN

There is a parking ban on all streets in Maynard from 2 am to 6 am during months of expected snowfall.

Yearly expenditures per pupil for the '86-87 school year were \$3653. School bus transportation is provided for all kindergarten pupils; all grades 1-5 who live one mile or more from the school, all 6-8 grade pupils living 11/2 miles or more from the school and all 9-12 graders who live 2 miles or more from the high school. Classroom assignments are given out at the end of the school year for the following school year. Bus schedules are published in local newspapers prior to school opening in September.

Precinct III votes at Maynard High School Gymnasium and Precinct IV votes at Maynard Housing Authority Recreation Room. Call 897-1000 for your precinct or check the Town Report available at the Town Building.

### VOTING REGISTRATION

Residents 18 years or older must go to Town Hall or specifically designated places to register to vote during Town Clerk hours (Mondays (except holidays and town meeting) 9am-1pm and 2pm-7:30pm; Tuesday-Thursday 9am-1pm and 2pm-5pm and Fridays 9am-1:30pm.) Special registration days with longer hours are held before elections. Registration is closed 28 days prior to state or national primaries and general elections, 20 days prior to town elections and regular town meetings and 10 days preceding a special town meeting. For more information, call 897-1000.

### ZOOS

Although not really a zoo, Drumlin Farm Education Center and Wildlife Sanctuary, route 117, Lincoln, (259-9807) is a 220 acre working farm with domestic animals and indigenous wildlife. Hours are Tuesday through Sunday 9 am to 5 pm. A free pass is available through the Maynard Library.

Animals can be viewed relatively nearby at Franklin Park Zoo in Dorchester (442-2002), the Walter D. Stone Memorial Zoo, 149 Pond Street in Stoneham, Ma (438-3662). Small indoor and outdoor zoos are located at the New England Science Museum, 222 Harrington Way in Worcester (791-9211).
