Manufacturing productivity conference outlines challenges of the future

As markets and products change, Digital's Manufacturing plants will still have the same objective--to manufacture competitive, quality products--but with new challenges and opportunities available from technology.

To understand the direction, tools and goals of the future, Manufacturing Productivity Challenge 83 (MCP83), recently held in Andover, assembled more than 500 of Digital's senior Manufacturing managers and technologists from all over the world to address key technologies needed to achieve major productivity gains.

In opening the conference, Jack Smith, ice president, Manufacturing, said, "While ir role in the past was providing service and meeting the demand for product, we now have a different role of making Manufacturing a 'competitive weapon'."

Presentations of papers and videotapes during the three-day conference covered a broad spectrum of tools and technologies ranging from those which are installed and running in Digital plants such as Tempe's Automated Material Handling System to new ideas and concepts emerging from the research laboratory such as machine vision and artificial intelligence.


Speakers from Unimation, Stanford Research Institute, Carnegie Mellon University, UMass, University of Rhode Island and Draper Labs along with Digital's own technology experts were at the conference to present various components of the plant of the future.

In his overview, Dick Clayton, vice president, Advanced Technology, described the opportunities technology presents as plants move from an assembly orientation to a process orientation. He also discussed the importance of quality and flexibility and the role of automation and robotics.

Ron Cadieux, MCP83 conference coordinator explained, "The manufacturing productivity challenge of the 80's lies in e effective implementation of the available tools and technologies to create a new Digital, one whose manufacturing resources are strong, flexible, highly productive and ready to meet the future."

Professional 325, 350, and LA12 win award at Hannover Fair

Digital's Professional 325, 350 personal computers and the LA12 printer were recently honored with the prestigious 1983 "Good Industrial Design" award which is granted every year by "Die gute Industrieform Hannover e.V.", a world-renowned non-profit organization based in West Germany.

This award is only given to products which will be displayed at the annual Hannover Fair exhibition of international office equipment and data processing technology in West Germany, and for which the owner company submits a request to be considered for the award. Digital was one of over 300 companies from 14 different countries which competed this year in the selection process. This event puts the seal of quality on the three products and confirms the excellence of their design and ease-of-use.

An international, independent jury com-

posed of university and industry experts, judged Digital's products and many others on the basis of practical criteria. The functional and technical design factors are taken into consideration as much as aesthetic and ergonomic aspects. The Professional 325, 350, and LA12 were chosen on the grounds of excellence in ergonomics, work station design, high design quality, great practical use, product safety and practical application.

As recipients of this award, Digital will be able to prominently display the seal of "Good Industrial Design" on the three products which will be featured in a special display at the Hannover Fair honoring products which have demonstrated good industrial design. In addition, our products will be featured in a catalog containing all products which have been given the award with descriptive text and color photographs.

New program trains employees in artificial intelligence

To position Digital as a leader in artificial intelligence (AI) and expert systems, Manufacturing has begun an intensive training and apprenticeship program to build a base of employees capable of applying these new technologies.

Simply stated, artificial intelligence is the science of making machines do things that would require intelligence if done by people. Expert systems are one of the "problem solving" applications within artificial intelligence. They are computer programs that reflect the specialized knowledge and experience of a human expert in a given discipline.

Currently, there are 17 employees in the training program which began in January and is run in conjunction with Carnegie Mellon University. "Its important for Digital to maintain an environment that is 'friendly' to the new technology and provide tools and knowledge to make sound investment decisions," says Mike Houlihan, manager of Business Application Development and Training for AI.

"We are committed to training employees for jobs of the future and to manage change. As AI emerges more and more in industry, we want Digital to be prepared to take advantage of the new technologies in our processes and with our products," he explains.

There are now less than 100 experts in AI in the country. At the end of this fiscal year, 60 employees will be trained in AI and more in following years.

Bob Falin, Program manager, explains the course is intensive and challenging-packing a lot of information and experiences into a short period of time. "It provides an opportunity to learn and practice necessary technical, interpersonal and business skills. It is important that 'knowledge engineers,' as practitioners are called, select and solve significant business problems in a way that contributes to a positive working environment," Bob explains.

Phase one of the program consists of 12 weeks of formal training including: Al at Digital; history of Al; an overview of systems and software methodology; software development concepts, programming and application languages; and problems solving and managing change. A module on design characteristics of expert systems will be added in the fall.

In the second phase, participants will begin a ten-month internship at either Carnegie Mellon or within Digital. At Carnegie Mellon the apprentices will work under John McDermott, a recognized leader in expert systems, on projects which are being developed for Digital. At the end of the work study, they will return to Digital and be assigned to the Intelligent Systems Group where they will work for one year. At the end of the project the person will return to their sponsoring line organization.

Candidates for the program are selected by their group staff based on their past performance and ability to succeed. They are then interviewed by an Al program committee. "The field has attracted creative and bright people. A technical background or orientation, a successful performance and a willingness to make a career change are important. It also helps if they are knowledgeable in some base technology area and have experience wi product and design technology," Bob explains. The decision to accept a trainee into the program is made jointly by the individual's group staff and the Al committee.

There are currently nine operating groups involved in the program. In addition to expanding this number in the future, training will be available through line organizations. Anyone interested in the program should ask their group manager for more details.

Know your ABCs of computers


Educational Services offers two courses to help non-technical employees communicate more effectively with the computer professional.

Inplant Travel helps plan cost effective trips

The Parker Street Travel Office, staffed by Digital employees, is responsible for the business travel needs of employees in the Greater Maynard area. Because of the opportunities evolving from airline deregulation, the travel office became an "inplant" branch of Crimson Travel in October 1981.

As an inplant office, the majority of commissions paid to Crimson Travel for air, auto and hotel arrangements made by the Parker Street Travel staff are reimbursed to Digital. These commissions defray many of the overhead expenses of running the group. When travel arrangements are purchased outside of the inplant travel service, commissions generated by these arrangements are paid to other travel agents. "Loss of these commissions affect the ability of the Travel Office to operate at little or no cost to the company," explains Beebe Meyer, Inplant Travel manager.

The office operates like any other commercial travel agency. It is connected to the American Airlines Sabre Reservation System and the Agency Data System which provides a variety of management reports. Arrangements for airplane, automobile and hotel reservations are made for Digital employees, customers, vendors and applicants with particular emphasis placed on special airfares and Corporate Programs.

Tickets, itineraries, seat assignments, boarding passes on American and United Airlines, one-time car rental vouchers, hotel and car rental confirmation numbers and hotel deposits are issued from the office.

"We try to suggest ways for employees to plan the most cost effective itineraries. If we are aware of a lower fare that might mean a different departure time or a different carrier, we suggest it to the passenger. Often, with a change of itinerary, hundreds of dollars can be saved. In the last four months, more than \$200,000 was saved through the use of airline promotions alone," says Beebe.

The Aviation Services reservation department is also a part of the Parker Street Travel Office. This staff is responsible for making reservations on the company's scheduled helicopter and airplane services. Eventually, the Sabre Reservation System will be enhanced to make it possible to book commercial flights and company helicopters and planes on the same video terminal. This "one stop" travel feature should be available in the spring.
