MITI Vice Minister Shinji Fukukawa visits Digital

Marlboro and Westboro host Ninth Annual Hockey Tournament

Digital to sponsor AIDS walk-a-thon in Boston

Digital will participate as a corporate sponsor of the AIDS ACTION Committee's third annual "From All Walks of Life," 10 kilometer (6.2 mile) walk-a-thon on Sunday June 5, in Boston. Walkers will be sponsored by individuals who pledge to contribute money per kilometer walked.

Digital has previously made contributions to the AIDS ACTION Committee, and will contribute \$10,000 to underwrite the costs of this year's walk. Digital will also match the donations of employees through the Employee Matching Gifts Program. (Since last July, Digital employees have already contributed more than \$7000 to the AIDS ACTION Committee, and those funds have been matched.)

Since the Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) was first recognized in 1981, the number of cases in the U.S. has doubled every 12-18 months. It has already resulted in about 180,000 deaths. The AIDS ACTION Committee is a non-profit organization that assesses the needs of people with AIDS, provides services for them and provides comprehensive education concerning AIDS and related issues. The goal of this year's walk is \$880,000 to be dispersed among 18 different agencies.

Rainbow computer camp for kids

Digital and the French River Education Center of Oxford, Mass. has designed a two-week program which blends computer learning, recreation and personal growth exercises in a camp setting.

The camp is located at Hillside School, an independent boarding school for boys in grades three through eight. The school resides on a 310-acre site in rolling woodlands just three miles from the MRO3 facility. It includes classrooms, full-sized gym, infirmary, athletic field, and dining hall.

Students will be introduced to the programming language, LOGO, as well as WPS-80 and Multiplan software packages. Ample time will be provided for students to access a variety of fun and educational software programs designed to reinforce basic skills and promote logical thinking and problem solving. They will also collect information from probes and use the computer to develop a data base of scientific facts as part of their environmental studies component.

Campers will also use programmable robots and LEGO LOGO, which combines the LOGO language with LEGO building blocks. The end result is three dimensional learning of basic math, science, physics and engineering concepts.

The program will run from August 8-19 (8:30 a.m.- 5 p.m.). It is open to dependent children, friends and relatives of Digital employees between the ages of 8 - 16 years. The cost is \$295 per camper; or \$250 per camper, if there are two or more from the same family who attend. Lunches and snacks will be provided daily. 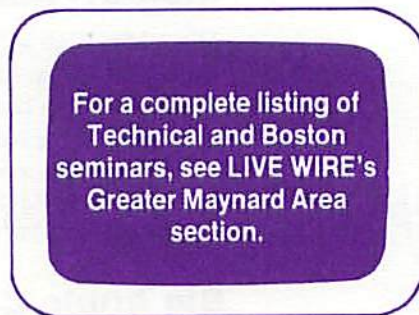

Low End Regulatory Engineering opens new EMC Test facility

Low End Regulatory Engineering (LERE) recently moved into its new EMC (Electro-Magnetic Compatibility) Test facility at Marlboro, Mass.

EMC engineering is responsible for the compliance of Digital products to government regulations which limit the emission of radio interference. The groups are also concerned with the susceptibility/immunity of Digital products to interference from sources such as electrostatic (spark) discharges and nearby radio transmitters.

The new facility is a cluster of three buildings, a lab/office building, which houses and an Anechoic Chamber, and two all-plastic structures which protect "open area" test sites.

The Anechoic Chamber is a shielded room in which the walls are lined with large carbon-loaded foam pyramids which absorb radio frequency energy rather than reflect it.

An "open area" site ideally consists of a very large flat area covered with a metal mirror. The product to be tested, and the test antenna are placed above the "mirror" and moved in a prescribed

manner, to find the points of maximum radio emission from the unit under test. The protective structures are built of plastic because that material is essentially invisible to radio signals.

Open area, test site measurements are specified by the U.S. and German governments. The anechoic Chamber is a

very useful engineering tool, and is necessary for radio frequency susceptibility testing.

The three new LERE buildings are located close to three other Digital EMC facilities and in combination, make Marlboro a major center of EMC technology. ●
