Digital answers "overcharge" claim

You may have seen news reports of a public hearing held in Washington, D.C. last week at which Digital was cited by a Senate subcommittee for overcharging the government for computers sold under our contract with the General Services Administration (GSA) for 1978.

President Ken Olsen explained that what is characterized as "overcharging" is a reflection of the higher costs of doing business with the government through GSA as a result of several

unique terms and conditions imposed by GSA which create added elements of cost and risk to Digital. These unique conditions are not normally present in our dealings with commercial customers.

"Digital has always prided itself in treating all of its customers in an honorable and ethical manner, and we are confident that Digital has acted in this way in its dealings with GSA," Olsen said.

Digital holds groundbreaking in Franklin

Franklin, Mass. will be the site of a new Final Assembly and Test (FA & T) plant, part of the Systems Manufacturing Group.

Governor Edward J. King, President Ken Olsen, and James C. Johnston, chairman of the Franklin Town Council, headed a large group of state, local, and company officials who participated in groundbreaking ceremonies Oct. 7 at Digital's 115-acre site at Washington and King Streets.

The company will build a 300,000 square foot manufacturing plant which it expects to occupy before mid-1982. The workforce could reach 600 within a few years.

Pre-retirement sessions start

A pre-retirement planning program will be held for eligible Maynard area employees this fall. The program, which begins Friday, Oct. 24, will run for six sessions from 8:30 - 11:30 a.m., in the PK3 Corporate Conference Room.

The goal of the program is to provide information as well as a support system for employees who are near retirement age. This program was piloted two years ago by John Chronkite when he was in Maynard Manufacturing's Employee Relations department.

Consultant Clare Corbett will kick-off the pre-retirement program with a discussion about the psychological adjustments required for retirement. Individual concerns of the participants will be addressed and issues are expected to range from money matters to concerns about filling free time. The other sessions will present more in-depth material about Social Security, Digital's benefits and pension programs; medical care issues, financial and legal issues, the development of interests to fill anticipated free time, and housing concerns.

Digital supports program for alcoholics

Norwood Hospital's Comprehensive Alcoholism Program (NORCAP) for alcoholics received a generous donation from Digital at the hospital's annual appeal kickoff earlier this month. Gerry McKenna represented Digital at the event.

The donation will help support a building, detached from the hospital grounds, where recovering alcoholics undergo extensive therapy for four weeks. They already will have gone through five to seven days of detoxification at Norwood Hospital. According to Gerry McKenna, a recovered alcoholic, this "re-entry" time helps the recovering alcoholic develop support systems and begin to deal with the psychological and social issues related to alcoholism.

"It is time to confront the disease; to buy time away from alcohol; to break down the barrier of denial that

recovering alcoholics have toward their problem," says Gerry who was instrumental in securing the donation for the hospital.

NORCAP is one of several facilities Digital recommends to employees and employee families who suffer from alcoholism. Since it is a not-for-profit organization, it is eligible for a donation under Digital's contribution program.

Several Digital facilities have Employee Assistance Programs (EAPs) for evaluation and referral of emotional and other problems that might negatively impact on employee's job performance. EAPs generally refer employees to the community treatment providers best equipped to deal with the specific problems. Gerry's determination to help employees with alcoholism problems included help in developing the EAP at the Acton facility where he works on Route 2.

Gerry explains that alcoholism is a disease, not a moral problem; that alcoholics cannot simply use "will power" to get rid of their drinking problem. They need professional help. Those who seek help for their illness have a recovery rate of about 70-80%.

Digital is one of many companies becoming more active in the growing awareness and successful treatment of alcoholism, thus stressing the importance of retaining a valued employee.

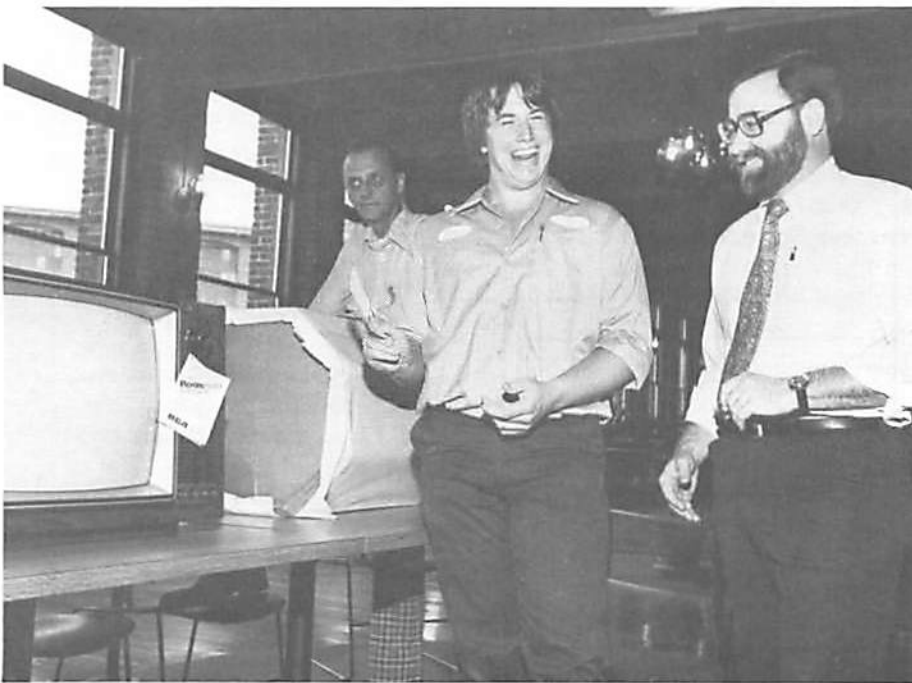
Prior to joining Digital, he worked for IBM for ten years, holding such positions as staff physicist, marketing representative, regional marketing

FCC mandates interference tests

All our products now in production must be labeled to state if they have been tested to determine if they might interfere with radio and television reception. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) requires that these labels be affixed beginning January 1, 1981.

To ensure our products do not violate this regulation, Digital Equipment Corporation has entered into a "Basic Order Agreement" (No. 1500) with Dayton T. Brown, Inc., an FCC approved testing company. The contract covers both testing and consulting services.

This agreement provides discounts as the testing quantities increase. In order for Digital to take advantage of this discount, employees should use this order agreement.

Tewksbury facility receives Energy Conservation Award

The Digital facility at Tewksbury was singled out to receive an Energy Conservation Award from Governor Edward J. King and the Massachusetts Energy Office as part of Energy Awareness Week. At a ceremony held at the State House on October 3, Bill Demmer, host manager, Tewksbury, Gary McMillan, facility manager, Tewksbury; and Jim Magaldi, Corporate Plant Engineering manager, West Concord, received one of sixteen awards for their efforts in energy conservation at the Tewksbury site.

Governor King said, "These businesses and individuals are representative of the fine efforts this state has made in tackling our energy challenges." Joseph S. Fitzpatrick, secretary of Energy; James Carlin, commissioner of Commerce and Development; and George S. Kariotis, secretary of Economic Affairs, were on hand to give each recipient an engraved silver bowl and scroll.

"Saving energy is easy," said Gary McMillan, "It just takes a little innovation and some common sense. The hard part is making sure that your energy reduction does not effect the

work environment adversely. You can make your facility so efficient it is uninhabitable." The first step at Tewksbury was to hire an outside consultant to help conduct an energy audit. The resulting energy management program ranged from just turning off lights when not needed to installing heat recovery units that transfer heat generated by computer equipment to heat office space.

The results are projected to be a 14% electric and 38% natural gas reduction in fiscal 1981. The payback on the total investment is expected in a maximum of 1-1/2 years.
