## WC-11 receives IR 100 Award

Digitals' Technical Volume Group has been honored as co-developers of one of the one hundred most innovative technological achievements of the year. The "IR 100 Award" is given by the *Industrial Research Magazine*.

The award was presented in recognition of the WC-11, a portable, battery-operated computer system developed jointly by the Technical Volume Group and the Los Alamos National

Laboratory of Los Alamos, N.M.

The WC-11 system was designed to serve as a small but powerful computer that could be used in the field to control, interrogate and analyze data from other field instruments. But the WC-11, affectionately known as the "WC Field Computer," can also function as a powerful general computer in situations and places that were previously inaccessible.

The heart of the system is Digital's T-11 microprocessor, which uses the same instruction set as the PDP-11 family of computers. The WC-11 runs a modified version of the RT-11 operating system, measures 13" x 13" x 3.5" and weighs only 13 pounds. It will operate for up to eight hours on a battery charge or can be operated from an external source which simultaneously recharges the batteries.

## New structure to support office automation market

To further underscore the company's strong commitment to the office automation market and to build on the momentum created by our successes to date, Digital has created two new groups designed to focus the company's efforts in this important market.

Julius Marcus will head the Business & Office Systems Engineering Group as Vice President-Group Manager. This group will focus on the development of the hardware, software and interconnect capabilities needed in these target markets. Julius will continue to report, as a member of the Operations committee, to Ken Olsen, president.

Bob Hughes, the Northeast Regional Sales Manager, will become Group Manager-Business & Office Systems Marketing. The group's major thrust will be in standalone word processing, office automation and small business systems. Bob will also report to Ken Olsen and be a member of the Operations Committee.

"Julius and Bob bring a wealth of relevant skill and experience to their new roles, which will be closely linked. We are very athusiastic about these new groups and low they can contribute significantly to

Digital's winning in office automation and small business applications," said Ken.

The Telecommunications Industry Group (TIG) lead by Patrick Courtin and the Manufacturing, Distribution and Control Products Group (MDC) lead by Roger Cady will report to Win Hindle, Technical Group Manager. The Publishing and Broadcast Industries Group (PBI) under Joe Ford will report to Patrick Courtin. The Commercial Service Industries Group (CSI), because of its heavy emphasis on the office, will remain a part of the Business & Office Systems Marketing Group.

### Enrollment begins for Employee Stock Purchase Plan

The next payment period for the Employee Stock Purchase Plan begins December 1, 1982. Notification has been mailed to all eligible, non-participating employees. Enrollment cards for the December payment period must be at Investor Services by November 21, 1982. Employees who need enrollment packages should contact their Personnel Services Administrator (PSA). To ensure timely receipt of Statements of Ownership and Stock Certificates, be sure to update your home address with your PSA.

#### How does the plan work?

The purpose of the Employee Stock Purchase Plan is to assist employees in buying common shares of Digital Equipment Corporation through a regular payroll deducation each pay day. This is a convenient way to save regularly, an advantageous method of investing and an opportunity to share in Digital's future.

A prospectus is mailed to eligible employees' and provides information about how the plan works, the possible benefits to be derived from the plan and some general tax considerations. Should an employee elect to participate in this payroll deduction plan, he/she will be granted an option to buy stock. The employee will pay for the stock at 85 percent of the average market price of the company's common stock on the first business day or the last business day, whichever is lower. To enroll, complete the pre-addressed enrollment card provided on the back page of the prospectus. The enrollment card must be received at Investor Services no later than November 21, 1982 or postmarked by November 21, 1982. Payroll deductions will start the first week of December. Please contact your PSA in personnel for further information.

### The recession forces further cost control efforts

The Operations Committee has decided that further expense reductions have to be made at Digital. Spending practices and cost reduction measures will again be examined and tightened. In addition, salary increases will be temporarily postponed for all employees, at all levels.

Digital's commitment to personal computing and the office automation markets requires a substantial investment now in new products. These additional expense controls will help the company reduce and slow the increase in expenses this year while making the investments that are important for its future strength and growth.

To be fair to all employees, once wage reviews are reinstated, everyone's currently scheduled review date will be delayed by the same amount of time. So, if your salary review is now scheduled for November and the postponement is lifted in three months, February will become your new review date. And reviews planned for May will be moved to August.

At the end of the second quarter, the Operations Committee will again review the salary decision and decide whether to lift or extend this measure.

The VLSI Short Course is an intensive 2-week introduction to the design of LSI/VLSI circuits in MOS technology. The course covers the topics of: digital systems design, static and dynamic MOS logic, MOS circuits and supporting processes, computer-aided design tools, testing and architectural considerations for the design of LSI/VLSI circuits in silicon.

The course is an extension of the material prepared by Carver Mead of Caltech and Lynn Conway of Xerox, PARC ("An Introduction to VLSI Systems," Addision, Wesley, 1980). Prerequisites for the course are a formal or equivalent background in EE or CS. An introductory-level understanding of digital logic, circuit theory and device physics is desirable.

### PKO Fun Run Races to \$7000 Total

By Bob Spreat, publicity chairperson September 21 dawned anything but warm and sunny. It was so wet that it looked like the 3rd annual Parker Street Fun Run for the United Way would have to be replaced by a Fun Swim.

But fortunately, the dreary conditions did not deter 75 runners from suiting up — or wet suiting up — to raise money for the United Way. When PKO campaign chairperson Bob Lux fired the starting gun, the most successful Fun Run yet was underway: it got the site United Way campaign racing off to a great start by reaping \$7,066.50. What's really remarkable was that the total represented a 40% increase over last year's run, with only about half as many people competing!

To compete in the Fun Run, a runner needed at least five "sponsors": people pledged to donate a certain amount for each lap completed. In return for their efforts, each runner received a Fun Run teeshirt, the chance to vie for gift certificates, and the good feeling of knowing that they're helping the UW.

The top male and female runners in terms of pledges collected multiplied by number of laps received gift certificates of \$35, \$30 or \$25. The top lap runners of each sex also received a \$25 certificate.

The \$35 certificates went to Steve Incropera (1728 points) and Carol Murphy (1584 points). Scott Shapero (1216) and Karen Monsen (1056) each garnered a \$30 certificate. Ken Vezina (704) and Pat Britton (741) took home the \$25 certificates for point collection. The \$25 certificates given to the runners who completed the most laps overall went to John Elkins and Ronald Kay, who tied with 20, and Michelle McCann with 17.

Points are calculated on the number of laps run times the number of pledges received.

Then donate to the United Way when the Parker Street campaign opens on October 4. These are among the prizes that will be raffled off shortly after the Campaign concludes on the 22nd. The Parker Street UW committee will draw the name of one person in each of five functional organizations; prizes are based on the group's percent participation in the campaign.

The five areas are Personnel, F&A, Marketing/Manufacturing/Engineering, U.S. Area and Non-U.S. Area. In descending order, the prizes are the color TV, a 10-speed bike, the Walkman, a black and white TV and an AM/FM table radio.
