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Digital introduces MicroVAX II, industry's most powerful supermicro

Digital announced two powerful new additions to its popular VAX family of computers, the MicroVAX II and VAXstation II at a press conference held last week at The Computer Museum in Boston.

- MicroVAX II, the industry's most powerful supermicrocomputer system is priced under \$20,000 and is available for immediate delivery. Shipments of larger versions, accommodating up to 16 users, will begin this summer at prices ranging up to \$43,780.
- VAXstation II, a high-performance graphics workstation for technical and professional users is priced from \$26,500. It is the most powerful workstation in its price range, and will be available in July.

The heart of both new systems is the revolutionary "VAX-on-a-chip," which has the highest level of functionality of any 32-bit processor in the industry. It was designed and fabricated by Digital's VLSI group in Hudson, Mass.

At the same time, the company also announced three related products:

- CD Reader, the industry's first commercially available, compact read-only optical disc system from a major computer maker that makes possible quantum reductions in electronic publishing costs. It is priced at \$2,195 and volume deliveries will begin in July.
- Two new peripherals: the 95 MB TK50, a high capacity streaming cartridge tape subsystem priced at \$3,490 uses 1/2-inch CompacTape cartridges, and the RD53, a 71 MB Winchester disk drive, priced at \$3,350.

Digital president Ken Olsen told the gathering of more than 150 press representatives and securities analysts that "MicroVAX II is certainly the most exciting and, in many ways, the most significant product Digital has ever developed. It represents, not the end of an investment stream, as some have suggested, but rather the beginning of a whole new wave of computing. We think this machine will truly change the way the world does computing," he said.

"The introduction of the VAX 8600 computer last fall gave us a very large, high per-

Harvard Law School and Digital plan major legal assistance research program

The Harvard Law School and Digital have announced plans for a major research program to improve delivery of legal services to low income clients through the innovative use of advanced computer technology.

Known as Project PERICLES - Program for Education, Research and Instruction in Computerized Legal Services - the program will assist legal service lawyers in handling cases for low income households on civil matters such as housing, family problems, federal and state benefits, and immigration.

The announcement was made by James Vorenberg, dean of the Harvard Law School, and Digital's Sam Fuller, vice president, Research and Architecture, at a press conference at the Law School.

"We welcome the opportunity to undertake this project, particularly since we expect that it will open new approaches to the clinical training we have pledged to make available to all of our students. Students will play an important role in developing the project, and will be better prepared to serve those who need and cannot afford a lawyer," Dean Vorenberg said.

Digital has committed more than \$2 million in hardware, software, technical support and personnel to the project. The Law School will seek to raise funds from other sources to extend the program beyond the initial four years.

Commenting on Digital's participation in Project PERICLES, Sam said, "Digital is particularly pleased to be a partner with Harvard in the PERICLES project. We have a strong, long-term commitment to supporting university research that pushes the known limits of computing. PERICLES is an excellent example of focusing research on the innovative application of new computing techniques to an important service, legal counseling."

A VAX-11/785 computer system will be networked to Legal Services offices and law schools throughout the United States and

other countries to coordinate communications and relevant legal information. Rainbow personal computers and MicroVAX workstations provided by Digital will also be used for computer-based interviewing, to help ensure the production of systematic case files, and for the generation of legal documents. In addition, artificial intelligence tools and techniques will be used to study lawyer reasoning and to provide computerized legal expertise. The project will also explore the application of IVIS, Interactive Video Information System, to provide computer-assisted legal instruction to lawyers, paralegals and student assistants.

PERICLES will be directed by a steering committee of four Law School professors, including Donald T. Trautman, chairman, Robert Clark, Oliver Goldman and Gary Bellow. Bellow, also the founder of the Legal Services Center in Jamaica Plain, Mass. said, "Project PERICLES is a major step in overcoming the inability of millions of Americans to have access to low-cost, efficient and effective legal service."

According to Trautman, the computer component of the project will enable many routine legal services to be performed more efficiently and at a lower cost. Some tasks usually requiring the attention of a supervising attorney may be eliminated, delegated or systematized so that an attorney can devote more time to a greater number of clients and their cases.

The Center for Computer-Assisted Legal Instruction, a group of over 50 American and Canadian law schools, was founded over two years ago by the Minnesota and Harvard Law Schools to promote the use of computers in the teaching of law, is collaborating with Harvard Law School on Project PERICLES.

Harvard Law School, the oldest law school in the United States is, with 1800 students, also the largest. ■

Digital begins transition to picture badges

Digital has begun a transition to picture badges for employees in organizations and facilities which have a business need for this level of security. The decision to change Digital's longtime badge system was made after careful consideration of business and asset-retention issues facing the company and its customers.

In this highly competitive industry, the need to protect proprietary information, products and processes is felt by Digital as well as its customers. Employees in the Field have reported numerous instances where customers have refused to accept a Digital badge as positive identification for entry. Today's industry standard calls for photo-

graphic employee badges, similar to those used for state motor vehicle licenses. In particular, government contractors, the banking community, and customers who need personal computers serviced in their homes are sensitive to the need for a tighter identification system. Some states have even passed laws which prohibit a person from entering another person's home to deliver, install or service a product without photographic identification.

"The marketplace now demands a more positive means of employee identification," says Ray Humphrey, Corporate Security director. "Coincidentally, this changeover, driven by business requirements, will also assist in providing a more disciplined approach to the protection of our valued resources -- our people, our information and our products. The existing badge has become an uncontrolled collector's item, with both current and former employees possessing numerous copies. Employees from across the corporation have recognized the need for a more efficient and effective identification system and have verbalized their concerns throughout the past year."

The new gray-and-white employee identification badge will feature a color photograph of the employee. In addition to the employee's name and badge number on the front, each badge will include the individual's signature, issuing site and issuance date on the back.

The entire U.S. Field population is making the transition to picture badges during May and June. Other functions and facilities which have a business need are beginning their planning process. The program was piloted in New Hampshire last summer and fall, when more than 4,000 Merrimack area employees received picture badges. ■

Digital continues interest in Acton Summer School

In its eleventh year, the Acton Summer School program continues to offer students a wide variety of remedial and enrichment courses with an emphasis on math and science. Digital has had a continued interest in the program since many employees in the Greater Maynard Area have children in grades seven through 12 who participate.

In addition, this year Acton-Boxborough Regional High School has been chosen as the host site for a Math/English/Science/-Technology Education Project (MESTEP) being offered in cooperation with the School of Education at UMass-Amherst. This project encourages students with undergraduate degrees in natural sciences, mathematics and English to pursue careers such as math, science or English teachers. Students selected for the project participate as student interns assisting teachers in the Summer School classes. This year and last, Digital has participated as the major industrial

sponsor of the project.

According to George Frost, director of the Summer School program at Acton-Boxborough Regional High School, "This joint venture between the high tech industry, the university and public school system is unique in that it is a creative solution to the growing need for math, science and English teachers. Digital is highly committed in its effort to kindle an interest in public education. The MESTEP program offers a new dimension to Summer School offerings in Acton and strengthens those offerings."

"The inclusion of this facet to the Summer School program will greatly enhance student-teacher ratios, and enable us to offer a much wider range of courses," said George.

M.I.T., Digital present symposium

The organizational and managerial changes that businesses must make to take full advantage of the new generation of ultra-powerful computers now under development was the subject of a symposium held recently at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The symposium, "Managing the Transition to the Fifth Generation," was presented by the M.I.T. Industrial Liaison Program in conjunction with the Sloan School of Management and Digital. Symposium chairman Gerhard Friedrich was from Digital's Artificial Intelligence Technology Center.

The words "fifth generation" refer to both the major Japanese initiative in information technology and, in a more general sense, to long-range computer research in artificial intelligence.

Experts at the Sloan School believe that advances in computers and artificial intelligence systems will lead to changes as profound as those brought on by the Industrial Revolution. ■

formance system at the high end which permits the building of VAXclusters as powerful as the largest mainframes. necessary to provide this interface (see related article).

"You are the sunshine of my life," said Stevie to the Digital engineers who designed DECTalk, playing off the title of one of his many hit songs. "I hope Digital continues designing products for those less fortunate."

He demonstrated the interaction of DECTalk and his synthesizer to the audience by performing his recent song, "I Just Called To Say I Love You." While singing, he substituted a few lines about how this type of technology was making it possible to expand his musical creativity. Noting that the word technology comes from the Greek

words for "skill" and "expression," he said, "We can never underestimate the importance of expressing our skills."

In addition to helping Stevie write music, Stevie's DECTalk — which he has nicknamed Boo Boo — answers his telephone and reads back what he writes in braille.

The forum was designed to bring attention to the actions businesses can take — through hiring practices, partnerships with community and non-profit organizations, and the development and use of technology — to break down barriers for handicapped individuals.

John Sims, vice president, Personnel, out-

lined Digital's experience in hiring the handicapped, and discussed the Corporate Contributions program which focuses on promoting self-sufficiency and personal growth for the disabled.

Ray Kurzweil, developer of the Kurzweil 250 synthesizer and the Kurzweil Reading Machine for the blind, also spoke on applications of voice technology to the handicapped, education and industry. Another blind DECTalk customer, Russell Bourgoin, a senior computer programmer with New England Telephone, described how this technology had helped him advance in his career.

According to Laura Morris, Corporate Urban and Social Affairs consultant and project manager of the DECTalk business and educational seminar, "Digital is committed to opening doors for all people, especially the disabled, so they may become productive members of society. The participants at the educational seminar were enthusiastic about Stevie's demonstration and comments, and also seemed appreciative of the benefits of voice technology." The event received media coverage locally and nationally.

Jim Pitts, Digital's Metro Boston District Sales manager, said the purpose of the educational seminar "was to build stronger relationships with our customers in the Greater Boston community leading to a broader understanding of Digital and its products."

As part of the event, Stevie was presented with a pewter and brass replica of the Maynard Mill clock which is given to Digital's employees who have worked for the company for 25 years. He also received a Paul Revere bowl from Ben Thompson, Director of Human Resources for the city of Boston. ■

DECTalk-to-Kurzweil interface developed by preproduction crew

When most people think of pre-production crews for a Stevie Wonder event, images of cameramen, sound crews, gaffers, and producers come to mind. For the Opportunities through Technology program sponsored recently by Digital, the crew comprised DECTalk engineers working under tight deadlines to produce the DECTalk-to-Kurzweil interface for the educational seminar.

The task was to make it possible for Stevie to hear the options that were displayed on the Kurzweil's LCD monitor. Star Dargin, Chris Diminico, Yvonne Yoneshige, Dave Conroy, and Ed Bruckert of the DECTalk Engineering Group had less than two weeks to write the software, design the circuit, debug and test the program.

The outcome was a system that permitted the DECTalk speech synthesizer to receive and speak aloud the same instructions that were being displayed on the LCD screen —

communicated through a Rainbow 100 personal computer. The team had to work with a new and not fully documented Kurzweil system. They also had to load DECTalk's dictionaries with a myriad of musical terms that DECTalk could not pronounce because the words did not conform to standard letter-to-sound rules. In addition to musical terms, the system used acronyms and abbreviations, such as INST for instrument and DIG for digitizer, that also had to be loaded into DECTalk's dictionary.

The DECTalk group worked with Stevie's and Kurzweil's technical engineers right up until showtime. "Everybody was cooperative, straightforward, down-to-earth, and helpful," says Chris Diminico from the DECTalk group, "When we got the demo running, people were so enthusiastic they called Kurzweil and Stevie so they could hear it over the telephone." ■
