EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

OF THE

TOWN OF MAYNARD,

FOR THE

SCHOOL YEAR 1878-9.

ANNUAL REPORT.

At the first meeting of the Committee, Rev. S. S. Mathews was elected Chairman, and N. H. Scott, Secretary.

The removal of Mr. Mathews from town, in May, was a great loss to the schools, since he was deeply interested in them, and from a year's experience, knew something of their needs.

Soon after, Mr. D. C. Osborn, who from his five years' service on the Committee, was still more conversant with the requirements of the schools, left town.

A. S. Thompson, Esq., and Mrs. Lorenzo Maynard were chosen by the Selectmen and remaining member of the Committee to fill these vacancies. Both of them served the remainder of the year, without pay.

The Committee was re-organized by the election of N. H. Scott, Chairman.

The Committee have earnestly desired to improve the schools, and make them do efficient work. If they have not at all times done that which was for the best interest of the schools, they plead their inexperience as an excuse.

REPAIRS OF SCHOOL HOUSES.

At the annual town meeting, a committee consisting of Messrs. L. Maynard, A. S. Thompson, and A. Whitney, was appointed to make all necessary repairs. Their work was well done. A furnace was placed in the Nason

Street School House, the upper room was papered and an ante-room was built to the lower one. The Main Street and Turnpike School Houses were painted within and without, the rooms papered, and the Turnpike school house shingled.

In January, the Nason Street School House was damaged by fire, on which account the schools were delayed a week. All necessary repairs were made by the Selectmen, and paid for by the National Fire Ins. Co.

As soon as practicable, all the rooms in this building should be painted and the lower room papered. When this is done, all of our school rooms, except that of the Nason street Primary school, which, on account of its location, can never be made so, will be pleasant and well suited to their purpose.

SCHOOL FURNISHINGS.

There have been furnished for the school rooms, two globes, one set of wall maps, one Unabridged Dictionary, several charts, some drawing cards, and a few minor articles.

The High School is still in need of some books of reference, while a few more charts and cards will increase the efficiency of the Primary schools.

TEACHERS.

We have had during the year a corps of good teachers ; that we are not alone in thinking so, is shown by the fact that of the many resignations made during the year, all but three have been made on account of the offer of better positions. One of the three resigned

because of her health, one to attend school, and only one by the advice of the Committee.

Unfortunate as is a frequent change of teachers, it can be avoided only by paying higher salaries.

SCHOLARS.

The whole number of scholars, between the ages of five and fifteen, in town, May 1st, 1878, was 445, an increase of seven, over that of 1877.

The whole number of different scholars registered, during the year, was 524, an increase of forty-one over that of the previous year. The average attendance was 333, an increase of forty-two.

The increased average attendance is particularly gratifying. This is owing, in a measure, to the extra efforts made by the teachers to prevent truancy, and still more to the increased interest of parents in the schools.

The diminished amount of tardiness is due to the same causes. There is still a chance for improvement.

The Spring and Fall terms were taught by Mr. A. S. Oliver. He is a good disciplinarian. Fair progress was made by those under his instruction. As he had been elected principal of the Bowditch School, Peabody, Mass., he resigned at the close of the Fall term.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in finding a suitable man for the position thus made vacant. Fortunately, the services of Mr. James Jenkins were finally secured. Mr. Jenkins possesses unusual energy and a fixed determination to excel in whatever he undertakes; as he is also a fine scholar, it is not necessary to say that he has met with marked success. His services have been retained for another year. We believe this school has never offered better inducements to advanced scholars, than it does at present.

The standard for admission will be raised, as hereafter we shall not be obliged to admit to this school a Grammar school class. On this account, more attention can be given to the higher classes.

We hope that in some way the frequent change of teachers made necessary by the small salary paid can be avoided.

After the school was well organized, a class was sent to it from a lower school, which much increased her work. Throughout the term good order was maintained, and at the closing examination, each class did itself and teacher credit.

We are sorry that we could not offer her a sufficient salary to induce her to remain another term.

Miss Morton succeeded admirably, but resigned at the close of the Fall term to accept a Grammar school elsewhere.

Miss Woodruff had had but a few months previous experience, but she succeeded well.
