Corporate Group works at good customer relations

Ideally a customer's only contact with Digital should be through the Sales organization. However, many choose to call the main number at headquarters or an individual at Digital directly. Six years ago, Corporate Customer Assistance was formed to help prospective and established customers when they call or write corporate headquarters. The staff is trained to assure customer satisfaction and good customer relations.

In the event you receive a call from a customer or a prospective customer, be prepared to transfer the call to Customer Assistance, DTN 223-7161

Remember, when you answer the phone you are a representative of Digital - so always be pleasant and interested in what the caller has to say. Once you determine that the caller is a prospective or existing

customer, explain the function of the Customer Assistance (CA) group and transfer the call to the CA extension, 223-7161.

(Transfer a call by depressing the switchhook once and wait for a dial tone. Dial the desired number; the present call is temporarily on hold. When you get an answer announce the call transfer and hang up. If the line is busy depress the switchhook twice to get back to the caller. Give them the external number to call, 493-7161.)

If the caller has been transferred a number of times and seems agitated, please get their name, company, location and phone number, and explain that you will have the appropriate person contact them as soon as possible. Then relay the information to Customer Assistance immediately.

Computer vendors support ECMA/ISO standards

In a major step towards true open systems interconnection and networking between equipment supplied by different manufacturers, a number of companies have announced their support for a set of local area network standards.

In addition to Digital, the companies are: CII Honeywell-Bull, Computer Technology Ltd., L.M. Ericsson, Fujitsu Limited, Hewlett-Packard Co., ICL Ltd., Information Technology Ltd., Intel Corp., Logica VTS., Mitel Corp., Network Technology, Nixdorf Computer AG, Office Technology Ltd., Olteco-Olivetti Telecom, Siemens AG, 3Com Corp., Three Rivers Computer Co., Ungermann-Bass, Inc., and Xerox Corp.

All these companies support the ISO (International Standards Organization) Transport Protocol Class 4 for the transport layer, which is an international standardization of prior ECMA (European Computer

New multiuser MICRO/PDP-11 system features low cost, small size

A new, highly compact and low-cost microcomputer system based on the PDP-11/23 PLUS central processing unit was announced by Digital. The MICRO/PDP-11 system combines CPU, memory, 10.8 megabytes of disk storage, controllers and power supply in one 5-1/4-inch-high box.

The new MICRO/PDP-11 system is a full-fledged PDP-11 processor with 22-bit addressing capability and runs standard PDP-11 operating systems such as RSX-11M-PLUS, RT-11, CTS-300 and RSTS commercial operating systems, DSM-11 (Digital Standard MUMPS), and MicroPower/Pascal. Designed as a general-purpose system primarily for Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) applications in commercial and technical fields, the MICRO/PDP-11 system contains an extended LSI-11 Bus backplane and supports LSI-11 Bus-compatible hardware options. For timesharing, small business, and office applications, it will support two to eight users.

The system includes the PDP-11/23-PLUS CPU, two serial I/O ports, 256K bytes of parity memory, 5-1/4-inch Winchester disk unit with 10 megabytes of storage, 5-1/4-inch dual floppy disk drive with total capacity of 800K bytes, universal power supply, seven-slot LSI-11 Bus backplane, and an I/O connector panel for external cables.

According to Neil Rich, MICRO/PDP-11 product manager, the MICRO/PDP-11 system carries the lowest price in the industry for a system with comparable performance and capacity. "This new product will provide general-purpose PDP-11 computing power for a very low price and in a very small package," he said. "The MICRO/PDP-11 system fills the space between Digital's personal computers and our larger, more expandable PDP-11 minicomputer products.

"Despite its small size, it can handle complex tasks in multitasking environments because of its ability to run sophisticated software such as resource-sharing RSTS and real-time RSX-11M-PLUS."

Digital introduces 'MICRO/J-11'

Development of the most powerful implementation of the popular PDP-11 computer was announced today by Digital's Technical High Volume Group. Called MICRO/J-11, the 16/32-bit microprocessor is fabricated in CMOS technology.

The MICRO/J-11 microprocessor is housed in a 60-pin package and puts the full functionality and capability of the PDP-11/70 computer in one package. It will be targeted to Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) for incorporation into systems and devices requiring maximum processing power. It is fully compatible with all PDP-11 operating systems and represents the new high end of Digital's microprocessor line.

Concurrent with the MICRO/J-11 introduction, Digital announced availability of a new license plan for PDP-11 operating systems, and a price reduction up to 57 percent on the entry-level MICRO/T-11 microprocessor. The new license plan enables large-volume users to take maximum advantage of existing application software.

Application software for the MICRO/J-11 can be developed on LSI-11, PDP-11 or VAX computer systems.

Q & A

Q: What's the procedure for naming a beneficiary? Can I ever change my decision?

A: To guarantee a benefit to a specific person or persons in the event of your death, you must name your beneficiary on your Group Insurance Authorization (GIA) form. Since your estate is handled exactly as you've specified on your GIA form, be sure the information is clear. You may change your beneficiary at any time by completing a new form.

Minors cannot directly receive life insurance payments, so it's usually best to name an adult as your beneficiary. If you do want to name a minor, you should appoint a legal guardian.

If you name more than one beneficiary, specify exactly how you want them to share the insurance benefits. If you don't, the money is divided equally among them. In the event your beneficiary dies before the entire amount of insurance is paid, the balance goes to his or her estate. If you don't name a beneficiary or if your beneficiary is not living at the time of your death, your life insurance benefits are paid to your estate.

Survivor benefits are paid in one lump sum or in installments, whichever option your beneficiary elects after your death. Digital provides information on each of the settlement options when it contacts your beneficiary.

Employees can now review and update their records

Corporate Personnel Administration is implementing a program to improve the quality of the data in the Personnel Master File, the primary source of information for Payroll, Benefits, employee location and many other employee-related processes. Beginning in August, all active, domestic employees will receive a Record Review form through interoffice mail.

The form contains employee's personal information such as address, marital status, phone number, education data, etc. It is designed so that employees can make corrections directly on the document and send it to their PSA (Personnel Service Administrator) or Personnel Assistant (PA).

The name and location of the appropriate PSA or PA has been printed on the form. After corrections are made on the system, employees will receive a Feedback and Change document showing the new data. Only Record Review forms with cor-

rections need to be returned.

Other data on the form such as tax deductions and insurance coverage are for information only, but directions are given on how to go about changing them through Personnel.

Similar to automatic deposit paycheck, the form is in a confidential self-mailer with personal data printed inside and a code explanation on the back. A cover letter will accompany the document.

Stan Olsen resigns as vice president

Stan Olsen, brother of Digital President Ken Olsen and a co-founder of the company with him in 1957, has resigned as vice president-group manager at Digital. Stan had been on a leave of absence since July 1981.

Manufacturers Association) work (ECMA 72 revised). For the lower layers, they will support the new ECMA standards for the physical and data link layers. These are Coaxial Cable ECMA 80, Physical Layer ECMA 81, and Data Link Layer ECMA 82 for CSMA/CD (Carrier Sense Multi-Access with Collision Detect) local area networks.

The companies believe standardization of these protocols will represent a major step to intervendor networking and benefit both users and manufacturers of computing equipment.

At the physical and data link layers, these standards are largely compatible with the Ethernet local area network specification in all major areas. The interfacing

of such local area networks with public networks would be achieved typically through X.25. It will be possible to integrate X.25 virtual services into such local area networks.

The development of these standards and continuing work within the ECMA community to define standards for networking is seen as a precursor to international standardization. Such proposals from ECMA to ISO are submitted for consideration as input to international standards as are inputs from other national and international standardization bodies. These companies are also working in close conjunction with their national and trade associations.

UMASS announces video program for fall

The University of Massachusetts Videotape Instructional Program is offering master degree programs in Electrical and Computer Engineering and Engineering Management. Students are offered concentrations in computers, communications and systems, and microwaves and microelectronics.

The newest degree program in Engineering Management will be inaugurated this fall through the School of Engineering's Industrial Engineering and Operations Research Department. The 12-course program is designed for currently employed engineers interested in entering the engineering management field. Although the course will be conducted primarily using videotape, certain courses require one or two days on campus per semester. The programs curriculum includes:

Know your ABCs

Are you a non-technical professional in the computer world? Do you communicate with computer professionals in your daily routine? Do you feel left out when the meeting or discussion is about computers? Do you hear terms or words that confuse you?

Educational Services offers two courses to help you communicate more effectively with the computer professionals, make you feel like part of the team, and perform your job more efficiently.

ABCs of Computer Hardware (J1379-A) is a one-week course designed to increase your knowledge on the Application, Basics, and Concepts of computer hardware. This five-day course is intended for non-technical professionals who must effectively communicate about and deal with computers in their daily job. The course has a lab component and has a technical orientation to familiarize the student with computer hardware and software elements, technical terms, industry technology and the structure of computer systems. There are no prerequisites for this course. Aug. 16, Aug. 30, Sept. 27, Oct. 4, Oct. 18 and Oct. 25.

ABCs of Software (J1647-A) is a new five-day course intended for non-technical employees who work in a computer environment and interface with experienced software groups. This course familiarizes the student with the applications, basics, and concepts of software and includes an overview of several Digital operating systems. The student will learn the terminology applicable to the software on a typical computer system. Topics include computer applications, review of hardware concepts, programming, the user interface, programming tools, utility programs, and system generation and patching. The knowledge the student gains from these topics will be further enhanced with a

series of lab exercises on programming, system commands, and utility programs. Before entering the course, the student should have successfully completed ABCs of Computer Hardware or Introduction to Minicomputers or have a good understanding of computer hardware. Aug. 9, Sept. 13, Oct. 18.
