# Spit Brook site opens

With construction finishing on schedule, the Software Engineering Group has begun moving in at Spit Brook Rd. in Nashua, N.H. An additional 40-70 employees will occupy the new facility almost every week until relocation is complete in early October. Building capacity is estimated at 600-plus employees.

The three-story building, situated on over 130 acres includes:

· an automated reception area in the main lobby, with hard copy and video terminals to help visitors locate offices and enable the receptionist and security personnel to keep computerized records:

- · a centralized Office Services, Purchasing and Mail Room area, located next to the Shipping and Receiving
- · no enclosed offices, but numerous private conference rooms:
- a large computer lab on each floor;
- · eye-level windows, visible from most places in the building.

"We involved the tenants very early," says Marny Heinen, an administrative services supervisor and (Continued on page 7.)

# Ad insert draws 2,300 applicants

Digital has a new unified focus for recruitment campaigns in New England. The objective is to present a coordinated image, positioning Digital as a leader in the computer marketplace, according to Brian McDonald, group manager, Staffing and Placement.

The new approach was first visible in an eight-page advertisement insert in the Boston Sunday Globe's help wanted section. The mid-June insert was geographically focused, representing each of Digital's 39 New England sites.

'Our intent was to have a unified, integrated campaign premier for New England," says Brian in reference to the special insert. He adds that he is pleased with campaign results which so far include over 2300 responses from applicants.

"The insert was multi-functional. Not all groups and facilities advertised for specific openings. Merrimack, for example, chose to do non-specific advertising. They indicated the type of opportunities available rather than the specific job openings," notes Brian. He adds that the campaign's broad umbrella approach made it possible to generate a large group of candidates for current as well as projected openings. This is important since the company's growth rate requires a constant influx of new, capable applicants.

Combined open houses in New England are one possible offshoot of the integrated advertising campaign. These might take place as early as this fall. "Eventually, we want to have functional open houses which will enable an applicant to attend one open house and talk with every Digital group having appropriate openings." (Continued on page 6.)

# **Making managers** computer literate

Educational Services is getting into the seminar business.

"Executive Computing for the Non-Data Processing Manager," the first of a series of three-day management seminars, open to employees as well as customers, will be held Sept. 15-17 in Bedford.

# Study semiconductor fundamentals

The Micro Products Development Group is offering two courses in semiconductor design. Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI), a seven-day intensive course, is slated for Aug. 14-15 and 18-22, 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. at Barlin Acres Conference Center, Boylston, Mass. Based on the Carver Mead/Lynn Conway approach, this course presents MOS/LSI design fundamentals and current design strategies which suggest future VLSI applications. (Cost - \$800; class size limited to 25: deadline for registration Aug. 5).

Basic MOS DESIGN and MOS/LSI Design will run 15 afternoons (noon to 5 p.m.) Oct. 13-31 at the Hudson semiconductor facility. This course covers basic theory and technology needed to fabricate MOS large scale integrated circuits. Upon completion, the student should understand MOS concepts, recognize design limitations

and be able to apply MOS logic techniques to the design and development of complex MOS integrated circuits. (Cost -- \$900; class size limited to 22; registration deadline Sept. 30).

Would you like to improve your management skills or brush up on your French before going on a business trip? Would you like a basic course in electronics or computers? Do you wish you hadn't missed that latest lecture in the Engineering Seminar series? If so, you should check the collection of audio-visual materials at the library's new Instructional Media Room in ML 4-3.

Audio cassettes in the collection deal with many management topics, in addition to communication, writing skills, technical subjects and foreign languages. An audio cassette player is available at the library, but many people prefer to borrow the cassettes, on the same basis as books, to play them in the car or at home.

The Media Room has nine selfpaced courses from Educational Services, five LaBelle audio-visual machines on which to run them, and four videotaped courses from Texas Instruments (on semiconductors, integrated circuits and digital subsystems). Each course is available at a \$100 charge to your cost center. (There is no charge for use of any of the other materials in the room).

The collection includes a complete set of videotapes of lectures in the company's Engineering Seminar series (over 50 since 1976). Other videotapes deal with computers (some on an elementary level and others dealing with the latest technological advances), management issues and Digital itself. On one tape President Ken Olsen discusses the origins of the company to a group of new managers; on another Vice President Win Hindle discusses how the product line organization got started.
