ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers and Committees.

ART. 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers and Committees for the year ensuing.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will purchase a road scraper, to do or act as the Town may think best.

ART. 5. To see whether or not the Town will authorize the issue of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors within its limits during the year ensuing.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will accept the donation of Benjamin Conant, the same having been placed in the hands of the Treasurer; the interest of the same to be expended for keeping in repair his lot and the surroundings in Glenwood Cemetery.

ART. 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to truants, to do or act thereon.

And you are required to serve this warrant by posting a printed copy thereof, by you attested, at the Post Office, and one at each of five other public places in said town, seven days at least before the time appointed for meeting, as aforesaid.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Fellow Citizens :

The School Committee respectfully submit the following report :

At the commencement of the Spring term, the scholars in the Grammar School were sent to the High School room, where they have remained ever since.

This was done in order to find room for a new Primary School, which we intimated in our last report would soon be needed. The demand was made upon us sooner than we anticipated, and was met as above stated. It was not without some doubts that this plan might not be a success, but experience shows us that it has been beneficial in several ways. Our High School had always been small except during the winter terms, falling as low as seventeen scholars at one time. But as the school is now constituted, the prospects are that there will be a school at all times of not less than forty-five or fifty members, and this without sending any more from the lower schools to the same for two years.

At no time have the two schools been so consolidated, but that they could be separated without any inconvenience or hindrance. Mr. Studley, the principal of the High School, has heard the recitations of some of the Grammar school scholars, but this has only been done for convenience.

The High School scholars have lost nothing in attention or instruction, and the Grammar School scholars have had the benefit of Mr. Studley's supervision, and the smaller scholars who formed the new primary school were saved the inconvenience of going to the old Turnpike school house, which still remains unoccupied. The situation to be met was, that the scholars to be accommodated lived in the vicinity of the Acton and Nason street school house, and not in the vicinity of the Turnpike house.

Miss Perry's primary school was divided, which had eighty-five scholars at the Spring term, and Miss Richardson, of Concord, hired to take charge of the new primary school. Miss Richardson

had formerly taught in Acton, and came well recommended by Rev. E. P. Wood, Supt. of Acton schools. Miss Jordan was engaged as assistant in the High School, who brought good recommendations from Rev. Nathan Thompson, formerly chairman of School Committee, of Boxboro, and now principal of Lawrence Academy, at Groton.

The committee have to report the loss of the valuable services of Miss Dawson, teacher of the Main street primary school. At the close of the Fall term, Miss Dawson left her school, but during the short vacation that intervened, informed the committee that her health would not permit her to return. Miss Dawson had not enjoyed good health for some time, occasionally being obliged to substitute or lose a day. Miss Dawson took charge of this school without any experience as a teacher, but she had good success from the beginning, which she maintained to the end, and her leaving is a loss to the town. Mrs. Winkley was engaged to fill Miss Dawson's place.

We think the citizens should be thankful to Mr. Studley, of the High School, for the extra amount of labor performed without increased compensation by the extra care and supervision of some forty or more pupils.

The High School is in a better and higher condition than ever before, and if those now connected with it will remain until such ages as most scholars leave school, it will compare favorably with any public High School. The town is required by law to maintain a High School, and it is more to its credit, and it will not cost any more to support a good one than a poor one.

The Turnpike school house remains unoccupied, and we do not believe the citizens will ever care to occupy it again, at least not until there are more families in its vicinity.

Two of the school buildings, the Acton and Nason street houses have been painted, and the Acton street house, and Main street house shingled, during the year, beside general repairs. The fences need painting, and a fence is needed at the Sudbury street house.

The whole number of children in town, between the ages of five and fifteen, May last, were 541.

Length of schools, 36 weeks.
