#### VATICAN II SPEAKS

"The laity, dedicated to Christ and anointed by the Holy Spirit, are marvellously called and equipped to produce in themselves ever more abundant fruits of the Spirit. For all their works, prayers and apostolic endeavors, their ordinary married and family life, their daily labor, their mental and physical relaxation, if carried out in the Spirit, and even the hardships of life, if patiently borne—all these become spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. During the celebration of the Eucharist, these sacrifices are most lovingly offered to the Father along with the Lord's body."

The Constitution of the Church. n. 34.

Such is our task in the Church. Such is our commitment to Christ. As we unfold the pages of this program, some effort will be made to afford some guidelines of thinking. But, as becomes increasingly evident, the actual carrying out of the laity's mandate is not at all easy.

There is so much alienation on every level.

The e is a restlessness.

There has been such a swift collapse of so many trappings of the "one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church."

We know God knows what He is doing. We know God will eventually steer us again into a stronger peace and unity than ever before. We know God's Message in the Gospel will prevail with mercy to all men. And . . . because we are determined to stay faithfully with Him and His Church, we shall prevail as well!

In the meantime, we dare not remain placid and inactive. We must be doers. We cannot allow ourselves to be buffeted about by any and all who claim still to retain the name of Catholics—but whose words and actions are hard to understand.

We are told that the People of God share in the Magisterium of the Church with the Bishops and with the Holy Father. We, too, are of this People of God in virtue of our Baptism. And so we, too, share in this Teaching Power of the Church. Then, let us use our power and privilege within the degree allotted to us by Christ Himself. Let us teach the world what we believe. In the light of day and of reason, all flaws and errors and deficiencies are bound to appear in time. And, if the need should arise, we hope we shall be the first, with and under God's grace, to acknowledge the eternal truth of God as manifested to us.

Our chief concern should be that our intention be right . . . then God will help us and guide us!

But we do not have to allow ourselves to be bullied by anyone without the necessary and sufficient credentials.

The Church Herself, in these trying times, is issuing authoritative pronouncements, without giving them the character or status of infallibility. When arrogant innovators and bold interpreters try to foist their unproven theories and hypotheses upon us, there is no obligation for us to espouse them.

First, let us protect what the Church has been teaching us and has not changed. Let us abide by what we have believed through the years. We cannot afford . . . nor do we intend . . . to relinquish our heritage of the ages at the appearance of the first winds of storm and turmoil.

#### LOVE AND CHRISTIAN CONSCIENCE

The word of our day is that one needs only to follow his conscience in justification of all his works.

Conscience is, of course, nothing more than an individual's judgment at any given moment about the morality or immorality of an action.

To be an effective guide in life conscience must be a responsible judgment. Thus, conscience, which is eminently personal and subjective, must be properly based upon knowledge of objective elements, such as the Law of God.

Therefore, in life there must be a continuous process of FORMATION OF PROPER CONSCIENCE.

The proper training of conscience is not an easy job. Not everyone receives from nature the same ability to judge correctly. Some find it comparatively easy to look calmly at all angles of a given situation and decide what they should do. Others, because of ignorance, emotion, prejudice and habit, find it difficult to make right decisions.

Therefore to train my conscience, I should foster certain attitudes: 1) a sincere love of truth; 2) the habit of thinking before acting; 3) a well-ordered charity toward God, myself and neighbor; 4) an understanding and use of the gift of prudence.

My life on earth is a period dedicated to growth in spiritual maturity. This requires of me the proper training and formation of conscience. It also demands regular self-examination to see how I measure up to God's standards. I can talk about love all I want, but until I know what the word actually means and prove it by my actions, I am a long way from the maturity which is proper to the sons of God.

# WE ARE OVERJOYED — WE HAVE BELIEVED AND SHALL ALWAYS BELIEVE THE HOLY FATHER IS SUPREME PASTOR

These are days when many people are prone to engage in a subject of grave theological controversy and concern: the alignment of the proper place of the Holy Father and of Bishops in our Church. The subject has so many amplifications and possible ramifications that we are not able to give all possible solution in a twinkling of an eye.

The post-Vatican II Roman Synod is over. Let us study carefully an excerpt from an exclusive NC News Service interview with Cardinal John Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit and head of the U.S. Bishops' Conference.

Speaking of the significance of the Synod, for the Church as a whole, and for the Church in the United States, the Cardinal said, "... its value lies in the very significant step it has taken in the exercise of collegial concern on the part of the Bishops of the world. Certainly, the purpose of the Synod, the functioning of the Synod, the very makeup of the Synod is a kind of sharing in the mission of the universal Church by the Bishops of the world. ... "The Cardinal continues "... I do not claim, for it would be untrue, that the expression of the Synod is a sign of full, formal collegiality. It is not. But it is a long step in the direction of collegial concern, collegial participation. This is good for the Church. It is good for the Holy Father. It seems to me that for the future, the exercise of authority is going to be marked by greater participation of many more people on every level. That is the most important thing coming from this Synod, for us in America and for the whole world."

And in answer to the question as to how this "sharing" affects the authority of the Holy Father, His Eminence responded: "It should be made clear that this sharing never means the abrogation of or the walking away from authority. For instance, let me speak of collegiality as that sharing. That certain sharing, of the authority of the Holy Father. That does not mean that he gives up something or is expected to give up something. In point of fact, he cannot give up the authority that is his by the divine commission that Christ gave the Church.

THE HOLY FATHER IS THE SUPREME PASTOR WITH COMPLETE, FULL, DIRECT AND PERSONAL JURISDICTION OVER THE ENTIRE CHURCH. THEREFORE, THAT AUTHORITY CANNOT AND WILL NOT BE CURTAILED."

# BE HUMBLE BUT NEVER WAIVER IN YOUR FAITH OR IN YOUR LOYALTY TO YOUR CHURCH

By baptism you are members of the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ. You are of the People of God. As members of the Catholic Church you have a real, sometimes difficult, role to perform in the Church's performance through the ages of Her Divine Commission.

Vatican II had to come. In the same manner all previous Councils in the two thousand years of the history of the Church had to be. And, up to the end of time, there will be other Councils which will have to be.

Why? Isn't the Gospel message of Christ always the same? Isn't it eternal? Of course it is. But in the measured finiteness of the human mind, man has never been able to understand it fully. Till the end of time human inadequacy to absorb fully the Divine Message will be more and more made evident. As civilization progresses, as human culture develops, as human needs arise, the Church, with all Her entourage of great and holy minds, tries to adapt the eternal message of the Gospel to the needs of the times. So as is to be expected, there will always be progress in understanding, but never complete exhaustion or comprehension of the totality of the truth in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Constitution on the Church is certainly the basic charter of Vatican II for the reform of our Church in this century. It contains the supreme authoritative dicta of the moment. But you will notice, even these are not infallible. Nor does the Church claim them to be so. In fact, the Church says that only if and when specific words and signs are used to pronounce the infallibility of any statements, the presumption must be that all the rest, while given authoritatively as guidelines, are not being taken as infallible. Again why? Because the Church wants to keep the doors open for further expansion of human understanding and for further adaptation of the eternal message of God to the needs of succeeding generations.

Yes . . . there is a strong consciousness in the Church of our day that the Gospel is a living reality and, therefore, Christian people show progress in understanding it. No doors must be closed to future developments and the growth of insight into God's Word. . . . So the Conciliar teachings of Vatican II must be regarded as a stage in the Church's quest, guided by the Holy Spirit, to understand more deeply the meaning of God's revelation and His covenant of mercy with His people.

#### OVERREACTION

An abnormal situation calls for a reaction. That is what the Church was doing when Pope John XXIII called Vatican II to counteract the evils that had crept into the lives of the Church and the People of God.

But history shows us right along that, while a reaction may bring about a remedy, when carried too far it becomes an overreaction, and a great deal of chaos can result. Thus, overreaction is to be guarded against because it so often bespeaks of irresponsibility. It is a very perilous and besetting problem.

For example . . . the strident action of the alarm clock in summoning a person to consciousness at a given morning hour, is intended to effect the reaction of calm reawakening and a joyous greeting of the dawn. But, how often does it culminate in one taking a hatchet to the timepiece and shattering it to shards!

Another example . . . the protest against tyranny is intended, at the outset, to effect justice and to restore man to his rightful dignity. How often, to the contrary, does it go to institute a worse tyranny under a slightly different name! Hilaire Belloc, the great historian, used to stress the Christian inevitability of the French Revolution . . . that it was, essentially, the result of the Catholic conscience of France seeking to right the accumulated wrongs of the centuries, to replace a discredited feudalism by an enlightened democracy . . . to replace a regal absolutism by a constitutional monarchy. But instead of resting content with the achievements of 1789, it plunged blindly on the terror of 1793. Mirabeau and Lafayette gave way to Marat and Robespierre. Overreaction!

Yet another example . . . The Appomatox victory for the Union was seemingly necessary for our national survival, even at the cost of so much blood and such vast treasure. The reaction, in the mind and heart of such a man as Abraham Lincoln, who stood for moderation and forgiveness, would have been, hopefully, a speedy renewal of the ties of friendship, a quick amnesty of former enemies, an immediate burying of the hatchet. Instead there was the waving of the Bloody Shirt for ten dreary years, the era of Thad Stevens and Ben Butler, of the Carpetbaggers, and the humiliation of the South. Again, overreaction, costlier in the result than the original holocaust of the battlefields.

Or consider the Crusade for Justice in our Time — social, economic, racial. No question but that the sins of our fathers weigh heavily upon us: the discriminations allowed to fester over long ages to suppurate into pullulant abscesses on the body politic: class distinctions disallowed by Constitution, and the Law of the Land, still tolerated if not encouraged by a ruling segment complacent in its assumed superiority of blood and brains: equality of economic opportunity proclaimed with pious unction and refused in practice by subterfuges as blatant as they are calculated. But how appallingly easy it is for the manipulators to push reaction over the margin into overreaction, to raise the red flag, to man the barricades, to shout defiance to all civil authority, to proclaim the death of the American democracy and the coming of the Dictatorship of the Proletariat. It is not at all dissimilar to that overreaction to the cruelties and horrors of war which would stop, not at some approximation of peace with justice, but in a total surrender and abasement to the world's new masters — whose very first dictate would be a declaration of war.

### AND NOW ABOUT OVERREACTION IN THE CHURCH IN REGARD TO VATICAN II

It is against the background of overreaction that the current anxieties of the Church are to be understood and judged. There is no reasonable doubt but that the action of Pope John XXIII in summoning II Vatican Council was a response to the promptings of the Holy Spirit.

No need to exaggerate the need for renewal, aggiornamento.

The pre-Conciliar Church was neither as healthy as the stand-patters imagined nor as "corrupt" as Messrs. Kung, Baum and Co. would persuade us to believe.

The reaction of the Council was eminently sane: not providing a perfect answer for all questions of authority and freedom in the Church, not supplying a compendium of ready replies for all problems of pastoral or ecumenical involvement but trying hard to furnish a realistic blueprint for vigorous action in this rapidly changing world. And there was great hope, as the Fathers of the Council gathered at St. Peter's in December, 1965, for the final session, that this reaction would be implemented with good will and good order.

Unhappily, this has not altogether been the result. Almost immediately, overreaction began to manifest itself, and one can hardly escape the suspicion that this was by deliberate intent and cold contrivance on the part of certain activists who saw some advantage for themselves in trying to destroy the equilibrium of the Church. Thus, if the Council sanctioned a wider adaptation of the liturgy to the cultural needs and comprehension of the people, overreaction promptly set about to make the liturgy a kind of a free-for-all with the result a shambles of what was once the decorum of divine worship and the abandonment of any sense of the sacred in worship. Or if the Council recognized the danger of too much formalism and formality in the clerical and religious life, overreaction tended to run wild in a perfect frenzy of dismantling the structures of this life, repealing all the rules — the essential along with the trivial and reducing the whole concept to an indistinguishable laicity.

And if the Council in candor acknowledged the damage done in the past by authority exercised arbitrarily and without due process of the canons, the principle of authority itself in the Church, shared by the whole College of Bishops, as successors of the Apostles, under the supreme jurisdiction of the Pope as successor of St. Peter, was clearly declared inviolate. But overreaction has lost no time in setting in, to result, in some minds that still claim the Catholic name, in a repudiation of all authority in the Church, doctrinal, moral and disciplinary. Every man, we learn from these, is his own priest . . . if his own priest, why not his own Bishop? . . . why not ultimately his own Pope? At which point even overreaction runs out of steam. There is no better gift in the Giver's giving than the good sense to know where to stop, when to say: "Hold, enough!"

Vatican II has brought us **new insights.** We find ourselves face to face, in liturgy and debate, with the Oriental Catholicism of the Uniate Church, so remote from the scholastic theology and sober Latin worship of the Western Church. We can no longer shut our eyes to the needs of the Church in the Afro-Asian countries. Perhaps, above all, we are confronted with the representatives of a great theological rebirth which goes back to pre-war years, but has grown in scope, depth and purpose largely as a result of the war itself.

Now, as in times past, we are all in need of special help and special grace. Vatican II has turned up many a hornet's nest. Great Churchmen are divided on so many different points. We hear so many divergent opinions on many important subjects. It seems we are incapable of decision as to what we can safely believe any more. We grant, because we must assume, that all the aforementioned great teachers are sincere. Yet they confuse us so terribly. What are we to believe?

When God gave us the Gift of Faith, He did not say that thereafter there would be only clear sailing in Life. He did not assure us that complete, ready-made answers would always be at hand. As a matter of fact, His Catholic Church never enjoyed a peaceful existence. So who are you to expect to be free of anxieties? of doubts? of trials? The Church and the Church's understanding of the message of Christ's Gospel cannot be expected to cease in progress and evolution just because of you. Especially when things are hardest and darkest, you must continually repose all trust in God. In all humility let God guide you.

For . . . as long as God is . . . as long as His Church is . . . all will be well. As in the past two thousand years . . . today and forever more God will take care of all problems. He will break down the seemingly most insurmountable impasses. You just do what God expects of you.

God will take care of all the rest!





Excerpt from "Light and Sacrifice." Address of Pope Paul VI on the Feast of the Presentation.
