ON EDUCATIONAL TRIP

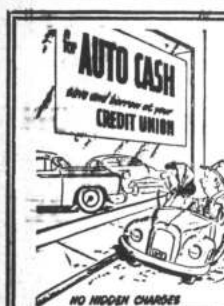

260 BICYCLES EQUIPPED WITH 'SCOTCHLITE'

Maynard PTA Sponsors Safety Device For Local Riders

Maynard—On Saturday, May 15, at Roosevelt School playground, boys and girls took a step toward safety. They had their bicycles protected by the Lite-A Bike drive which Jenney Oil Company gave them free.

Members of the Maynard Parent-Teachers Association, Boeske Brothers, Maynard Police Girl Scouts helped attach strips of "Scotchlite" reflective sheeting, product of the Minnesota Mining and Mfg. Company, to rear fenders, side forks and handlebars of the bicycles. Two hundred sixty bicycles were equipped. Now when one of these bikes is abroad at night, these strips reflect the light of an approaching car and warn the motorist.

Police chief Henry Pieciewicz and patrolmen Cyril Clark and Eino Nyholm, who were on hand Saturday, said this is in their judgment the most practical method found of guarding the lives of young bike riders on dark streets. Wherever it has been made available in the past, accident rates to children have decreased.
