it would be a small South Sea island.




KENNETH NAJJAR Keene State College B. in Ed., M.A.

### PRACTICAL ARTS




OLIVIA ANDREWS Pennsylvania State University Framingham State College

Shirley Noyes — a typing teacher and an athlete too. Not only is she "dynamite on the courts", they say she's not too bad when she hits the slopes, either!!






JOHN LENT

The J.V. girls had a very successful season. Their record was 8-11. The team's nucleus was made up of freshmen and they have a very hopeful season to look forward to next year.








