YEAR OF FAITH

The apostles Peter and Paul are rightly considered by the faithful to be the principal pillars of this holy Roman See and also of the whole universal Church of the living God. Accordingly we feel it part of our duty to address this exhortation to you, calling on you to unite spiritually with us by promoting in your own territories the devout celebration of the courageous martyrdom in Rome nineteen centuries ago of these two apostles: Peter, chosen by Christ to be the foundation of His Church and the bishop of this mother city; and Paul, the "Doctor of the Gentiles" (1 Tim. 2:7), teacher and friend of the first Christian community established in Rome.

This year, commemorating the centenary of SS. Peter and Paul, will be "the year of faith." To ensure a certain uniformity in its celebration, We will begin the centenary year on the forthcoming feast of the two apostles, June 29. Until the same date in the following year, We intend to hold many special commemorative celebrations, all directed toward an interior renewal of our holy faith, a more profound study and a religious profession of our faith and an active witnessing to that faith without which "it is impossible to please God." (Hebrew 11:6)

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WHAT WILL THE YEAR 2000 A.D. HOLD FOR HUMANITY? - SIX PROPHECIES

Several friends were discussing Cardinal Heenan's prediction of persecution for the Catholic Church. Note the varying views expressed about the future.

A DOCTOR . . . was convinced that what was coming was a world-wide plague that would carry off half of the human race. Every 20 years, he said, there has been some such pestilence or black death. The last was the influenza epidemic in 1918. That was 50 years ago. We are away behind time, said the doctor. At the objection that modern science has made great progress in the past 50 years, the doctor was not impressed. He observed: modern science still does not know the cause of the common cold, nor the cure for cancer.

Luxury and sudden collapse, he added, often accompany each other. History shows many cases of advanced civilizations, cities full of luxury, that perished almost overnight. Nowadays, in some nations, there is luxury as never before in history. And the doctor opined a pestilence would take care of that.

Thus . . . his prophecy: LUXURY AND SUDDEN DEATH: A.D. 2000 — THE EXPLOSION OF CANCER.

A NEWSPAPERMAN . . . did not share the doctor's pessimism at all. He predicted 2000 A.D. would be marked by the height of peace and prosperity. He cited the prediction of the Mother of God at Fatima, that after World War II, Russia would be converted and a 'period of peace' would be granted to the world. As for prosperity, he quoted a number of predictions of Pope Pius XII, especially one made not long before his death in 1958 to the effect that at that time the world, or humanity, was to enter upon its most glorious springtime.

So . . . his prophecy: HISTORY'S SPRINGTIME: A.D. 2000.

A RETIRED ARMY OFFICER . . . very military, very precise, every inch a soldier. His idea: in 2000 A.D. the Inquisition would be functioning again, 100 percent efficient. He explained: it is an axiom of military history, that periods of liberty and license are always followed by times of highly centralized authority. We are passing through a period when liberty is being abused to an extraordinary degree. It is a popular thing to be against authority. The reaction is inevitable. There will be a swing back to authority, even to autocracy and tyranny. The popular thing then will be to fawn upon authority. Tyranny will have its devotees. In the Church it will mean a revival of the Inquisition, or something very much like it.

His prediction: A.D. 2000 - INQUISITION.

A PRIEST . . . agreed with Cardinal Heenan. For his reasons, surprisingly he cited Vatican Council II. He explained: no one knows the designs of the providence of God in promoting Vatican II. A very good guess: to prepare Catholics for the hard times of a persecution.

e.g. the vernacular in the liturgy runs counter to the spirit of the times, namely: internationalism, unification, no barriers of nation, race, language, the whole world as one. For the vernacular is nationalistic, narrow, divisive, obstructive to unity. The Vatican did not command the vernacular but gave restrictive permission. Yet the idea swept the world, as if the Holy Spirit had reasons of His own, like steeling and protecting the people for persecution to come. Latin is fine for pompous celebrations — but a hunted priest in time of persecution will be a source of strength to the people around him. The priest thus construed the call of Vatican II for ecumenism like the invitation of Noe to his neighbors to take refuge in the ark before the storm. So too did he interpret Vatican II's

definition of religious freedom of Catholics against tyranny and persecution, as though Vatican II were forecasting a time of persecution to come. The priest added how very strong Vatican II was on the 'pilgrim church.' . . noting that Vatican II sees the Church of the future as a mournful figure, alone and lonely in a hostile world, 'the pilgrim church.'

His prediction: A.D. 2000 - PERSECUTION.

PROFESSOR OF HISTORY . . . agreed with the priest that persecution is coming, but did not see it in Vatican II. He saw the persecutors already: the enemies of God and lovers of indecency already at work. The only serious challenge these enemies of God have to contend with is the Catholic Church. But the forces of evil are in the majority, and will use their power. Now they are securing legislation in favor of their evil practices . . . soon will come legislation openly hostile to the Church, and penalizing faithful Catholics. The professor based his idea on the 'history of salvation' and its opening date. God really began the history of salvation in a definite way when he singled out Abraham for a special call. Before that He allowed people to wander and struggle in the dark. The date of Abraham's call was 1967 B.C. At least, said the professor, 1967 A.D. is as good a date as any other. So he posed the question: As the world came out of the night of darkness at the call of Abraham in 1967 B.C., is it to go back into the night in 1967 A.D.?

So his prediction: A.D. 2000 - CAME THE NIGHT.

THE ARCHITECT was shaking his head. He did not agree. His prophecy: A.D. 2000—the NEW CHRISTENDOM. The Old Christendom, he explained, resulted from a fusion of Roman civilization and law with the barbarian tribes which overran Europe around 500 A.D. In this the Catholic Church was the guiding agent. It took centuries, it had to pass through the Dark Ages, but the result was Christendom and all its glories: Gothic architecture, the intellectual eminence of the mediaeval universities, an era of peace for the ordinary people. Two centuries of it, unrivaled in human history.

Now the elements of a new Christendom are at hand. This time it will not be north and south, but east and west: the ancient culture and dignity of the Orient, especially China, on the one hand: and the energy and mechanical skill of the western world, on the other. The Catholic Church stands ready again for its office as guiding agent to produce the new fusion of the New Christendom. The so-called 'social encyclicals' and similar pronouncements of popes and of Vatican II can be called a blueprint for the new fusion. It will not take centuries, like the Old Christendom: things move faster nowadays. There may be some wars, some invasions, some dark decades, if not Dark Ages. But in the end, the New Christendom will emerge, with glories greater than the old.

Someone asked: What about Russia? He replied: I used to think the new Christendom would be a fusion of Russia and the West: but now I see that Russian belongs, or will soon belong, to the West over against China and the East. I Predict a solemn Concordat between China and the Holy See about 2000 A.D. Pope Paul took the first step, speaking in St. Peter's on the Feast of the Epiphany. He presented the Chinese people with a formal invitation to peaceful discussions looking to peaceful collaborations between the Church and the Government of China.

His prediction: A.D. 2000 - THE NEW CHRISTENDOM.

A long discussion followed. Is a synthesis possible?

And that She placed my lamb beside the Child.



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

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SPORT: SYMBOL OF A SPIRITUAL REALITY

The golfer epitomizes the spiritual growth that can evolve from physical indulgence. Trudging up the fairway to the No. 1 green, the golfer in effect leaves one world and enters another. A half-hour earlier, this man could have been enmeshed in business problems that seemed to have no solution. He could have left a home in which there were equally pressing problems involving economics, marital disagreements or parental responsibilities.

Departing for the golf course isn't escapism as much as it is a reason for physical and mental relaxation, a chance to cleanse the body and spirit of tension in order to return to the world of realism with equanimity and conviction. Walking from hole to hole and concentrating on his shooting invigorates the golfer physically and diverts his mind from a confused state. A long accurate drive shores up his enthusiasm. A poor shot renews his determination. His confidence in his game grows as the match progresses.

Win or lose, good game or poor game, the golfer inevitably benefits from the change of pace the game affords. He is tired but he is relaxed. He is able to think more clearly, to sleep better.

More importantly, the relaxed athlete is equipped for introspection. He can look back and perceive his personal mistakes, recognize their folly and make up his mind to follow a more prudent course in the future. His physical well-being makes it easier for him to live up to his resolve.

Another sport in which recreation is closely akin to spirituality is hunting and fishing. Izaak Walton dwelt on the contemplative aspects of outdoor sports. The fisherman at streamside, the duck hunter pacing through the grain fields—all are subjected to the overpowering magnificence of creation. They can't help but assimilate some of the wholesomeness unfolding about them. Gazing at it is meditation at its purest. The outdoorsman is a particularly vigorous individual, full of desire. He must be to put up with and enjoy the hardships necessary to enjoy his pastime.

The rugged nature of outdoor sports, combined with the patience required in the successful pursuit of wily game and fish, inculcate in the sportsman an enviable virtue of calm strength. The mind of the sportsman is perceptive, appreciative of the soil and water and its fruits. While he waits for his quarry to strike or flush, he inhales deeply of the beauty and mystery about him.

The angler, poised in a swirling spring branch waiting for a rainbow trout to strike, and the major league baseball player, trotting toward home plate after a game-winning home run, have nothing on the crew-cut boy playing center for a high-school.

Driving with all the energy to score a last-minute basket, this boy isn't thinking of exams, girls, or of personal glory. His mind is fixed on putting the ball through the hoop at all costs. Adulation of his classmates may be in store if he is successful, and there may be sorrow in the grandstands if he misses. But at the moment he is charged with delight, and his friends are sharing with him the excitement of the play.

Pope Paul put into words the affinity between sports participation and spirituality when he addressed a group of Italian bicycle racers. He told the athletes they had an intuition in their souls—an intuition that they perhaps did not know how to express—that sport, besides being a sensitive and experimental reality, "is the symbol of a spiritual reality that constitutes the hidden, though essential thread of life."

Sports have the unique capacity to teach humility and tolerance in an era when racism is rampant. The ballplayer who gets cocky after connecting for a clutch double is apt to be picked off second base on the next pitch. The subsequent march to the bench has a sobering effect. The golfer who drives to the green and then four putts knows the taste of gall. The cager who muffs a layup realizes that fame is fleeting. Racial tolerance undoubtedly received its greatest boost from sports. White and colored boys played together on the gridiron and diamond long before they sat together in classrooms.

This would not be complete without reference to the Olympics and their role in helping to build international peace.

One last reflection: Doesn't the star athlete possess the rare knack of inspiring the hundred, the thousand, or the million people with a solitary performance? Isn't a mere moment of uplift for so many people something to be sought—a deed likely to find favor in God's sight?

In city streets, in every country road,


Let each one search for stable and for Star:

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NIE WOLNO NAM SPLAMIĆ HONORU NASZEJ TRADYCJI

Sensacja wsród mówców bylo wystapienie Kongresmana Lucien Nedzi (D) z Detroit, który ujal swoje przemowienie w plaszczyznie szerokich mysli, odnoszacych sie do zagadnien ogolnoamerykanskich, polonijnych i polskich. Dal swoim przemowieniem wiele do myslenia.

Kiedy tak patrze na tyle znajomych twarzy, z tylu stron Ameryki, z tylu stanow i powiatów, dopiero w calej pelni zdaje sobie sprawe jak dumnym jestem z tego ze jestem Amerykaninem Polskiego pochodzenia, lojalynym i wiernym obywatelem Ameryki, a jednoczesnie dumnym synem naszej wielkiej i bogatej tradycji i kultury polskiej.

Zwarte zycie rodzinne, przedsiebiorczości zapobiegliwośc, duma z posiadania wlasnego domu, poszanowanie dla prawa i porzadku spolecznego, oto cechy typowe prawdziwego Amerykanina polskiego pochodzenia.

l niech nikt obcy nie watpi ze choc naturalnie pilnie sledzimy wydarzenia w kraju naszych przodkow, problemy dzisiejszej Ameryki, w kraju i zagranica, leza nam tak same na sercu jak, kazdej innej grupie amerykanskiej. 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LIVING PHILOSOPHY

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Pritchard, Chapman, Pennington, Montgomery and Sloan Excerpt from talk before Sunday Evening Club, Chicago

As a child I believed that God created me. But now I understand that He not only created me as I was, but as I am and how I have developed. He created my ideals, my character, my abilities — such as they are — and my drive; and He created my property and my ability to hang onto some of it.

Now I would be an ingrate if in return for all of this I did not want to give something to my God. This is not necessarily religion. It's common courtesy; good manners, if you will. And so, in the things I do, I try to say thank you. The child says thank you with his mouth. The man says thank you with his actions; and there are degrees of action, just as there are degrees of understanding.

I did not come to this conclusion without a struggle, and I did not come to it alone. I have been helped by several people, and I have not always cooperated. My mother taught me my early faith. Years later, a great pastor raised my sights above the crowd and gave me the perspective of a greater height. My wife was not only willing but eager to put up with the sacrifice that this philosophy demands; and she had the good sense not to push me. I have been helped by a number of fine laymen with whom I have had the privilege to work, and whose standard of performance has given me something to reach for.

Nor did this philosophy develop overnight. At first, I grudgingly thought that a little work for my Church would be enough. Later, when I was making more money, I thought that I could do it with dollars. But I was dead wrong. I had forgotten a significant sentence from Christ's Sermon on the Mount: "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." And then things really started to move.

In a nut-shell, for what God has given me, I want to give something in return to Him. I want to put more into this world than I take out, and to leave it richer than I found it.

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He was very poor.

He had the chiselled features of one who denies himself:

His hands were the large hard hands of an artisan — and without a sword:

His eyes, the eyes of pity and love: His speech, the broad, slow speech of a country man.

It is this man who walked the roads of Palestine, tired and dusty and thirsty, yet seeing in the world, that He had made, unspeakable beauty, and showing to those who slowly won His own divine vision, the beauty of these things that 'men see and taste and hold: salt and rock and light and the wheat in gold: winds and wings and flowers and fruit on boughs: and candle-light in the house."

From the gentle wind of His understanding, the sun of His words, 'there was a thawing then, like the melting of frost when the winter is done.' They would remember His words of the action of yeast in the bread and know that so His love and grace would work in their souls: His words about the wind and the Breath of the Spirit that fans the smoking flax: His words about chastity, 'the splender of love, of desire, silver purified in the heart of the fire: of white linen spread for the marriage feast.' Because of Him men knew now with a 'great sighing of joy,' that the dead bough must fall from the living tree and their hearts be born again 'to a white maying and morning.'

In His Passion, it is the Christ of Pity, Who dies for men, suffering for them and with them. He is a young man who dies, to whom life is sweet; all the beauty of the world He made calls out to Him in Gethsemane to put off death and to live. Yet if He dies not, there will be no Easter morning for the men He loves. So He goes to Calvary to die.

The Christ Who is risen will not remain 'like an ikon enshrined in the rare meditative mine, but will live in the warm-living men and women of flesh and blood who lead the common life and share the burden of living. With them Christ will go into all the workshops and offices, down all the mines, work in the fields, gather into earthly barns. In this world He must walk all the streets of the cities, die on all the battlefields, dwell under the eaves of all the homes. Since this has happened, Easter is then truly the resurrection of the children of God in Christ.

All this may mean nothing if not tied in with the doctrine of grace. It is through grace that it is possible for Christ so to live in men. Especially by prayer through the Mass.

Christ is not the Christ of the ivory-crucifix. Me must be recognized, with Veronica on the Way to the Cross, in the blood and sweat and tears of the most helpless of humanity. Christ is in everyone, in our employer, our secretary, our office boy, our grocer andour plumber, the policeman, our cook and our bishop, in our friend, in our pet aversion as well as in our love. If we are not interested in these people, then we are not interested in Christ.

The self-denial entailed in the constant seeing of Christ in others will be more than repaid by the growth of the Christ-life within our own soul, by the increase in the grace that is His life.

With the mind of Christ, and the hands of Christ, the man who loves mankind with the heart of the risen Christ rebuilds the world.

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"How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts!

My soul yearns and pines for the courts of the Lord.

My heart and my flesh cry out for the living God.

Even the sparrow finds a home, and the swallow a nest in which she puts her young --

Your altars, O Lord of hosts, my king and my God! . . .

I had rather one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere;

I had rather lie at the threshold of the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked. . . . "
