## Report of the Board of Selectmen

To the Citizens of Maynard:

At this time your Board of Selectmen respectfully submit for your approval their annual report and that of each department included in your town government. This will also include reports of various committees appointed for the year 1943.

The Town Accountant's report records the various transactions of the town's business which have taken place during the year. A careful examination of this report will disclose just how the taxpayer's money is expended.

We regret very much to report at this time that Mr. Charles A. Stockbridge, the present incumbent deems it necessary to resign from the office of Accountant for the Town of Maynard, due to ill health. Down through the years, under numerous Boards of Selectmen, he has proven his fitness for this position and his resignation is a distinct loss to the town.

We are happy to report that the books of your Town Treasurer show a balance of \$191,216.08 — an increase of \$36,979.20 over the year 1942. This is the largest balance to be recorded in the history of the town.

Unemployment in the town has been at a minimum, due to the excellent industrial conditions within the town. Then too, many of our citizens are employed in various war plants and other related industries outside the town.

A post-war Readjustment Committee has already been appointed and includes the following: Mr. Oswald C. Drechsler, Mr. Guyer W. Fowler, Mr. Raymond Gandolfo, Mr. Frank S. Grieve, Mr. Ernest Johnson, Mr. Ralph Smith, Mr. Thomas Tierney and Mr. Philip Wilson.

The purchase of \$20,000 worth of War Bonds was made during the year by the Town. Having in mind the post-war readjustment period, we feel that the purchase of additional bonds would be a sound investment.

This year finds our country still engaged in a war.

It is, no doubt, the wish and hope of every citizen in every community great or small, that this war will soon be at an end and that peace with justice will reign everywhere.

To all the men and women of Maynard, in the service of their country, we owe an immeasurable debt of gratitude and when they return, let them find the townspeople respon-

sive to their needs and willing to help in every way, that they may become quickly adjusted to a normal life as honored members of our community.

An Honor Roll, dedicated to those men and women from the town in the service of their country during World War II, has been purchased and will be erected as soon as it has been completed.

We regret that the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Walter Cheslak was obliged to resign his office upon entering the military service of the country. Mr. William J. Bain was thereupon appointed to the Board to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Cheslak.

At a special town meeting held in August, money was appropriated for the purchase of two new trucks and a snow-loader for the Highway Department. The two new trucks were considered necessary to replace two which had been in the service of the department for nine years. The snow-loader was purchased to enable the department to meet the existing shortage of labor.

The Board has rented a garage to store the equipment during the winter months. This was done to protect the valuable equipment which was exposed to all weather conditions and because it is difficult to replace.

We wish to thank all Boards, Department heads and all town employees for their fine co-operation during this past year.

## Supervised Recreation for Children

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I submit a brief report on the Supervised Recreation Program which was sponsored by you.

The sum of \$1000 was appropriated last spring at the annual appropriations meeting.

Shortly thereafter, a citizens' committee was appointed consisting of Mrs. Herbert Martin, Mrs. Leo Downey, and Mrs. Peter White. This committee held several meetings and decided to have playgrounds at the high school and Crowe Park. Three pieces of permanent playground equipment were bought, and two were installed at Crowe Park, and one was installed at the high school.

Leo F. Mullin was appointed director of both playgrounds and was placed in direct charge of boys at Crowe Park. During the last week of playground activity, Albert Rogers assisted with the boys. Miss Eleanor Flaherty was in charge of girls at Crowe Park, and she was assisted by Miss Doris Seder. At the high school, Miss Anne Tucker was in charge assisted by Miss Anne White and Mrs. Arthur Morrill.

More than 200 boys and girls registered at the playgrounds during the six weeks' session, and there was a daily average attendance of 60 at Crowe Park and 85 at the high school.

The daily program consisted of opening exercises of a patriotic nature, organized play, and directed manual activity.

Each week's program was climaxed by a joint meeting on Friday afternoon of all the boys and girls of both playgrounds. Contests were held, and prizes were awarded to the winners. Some of the contests were: Vehicle Parade, Costume Contest, Pet Exhibition, and Amateur Show. A picnic was held on one Friday afternoon.

On the final day of the playground session a Field Day was held at Crowe Park. The morning's activity consisted mainly of an exhibition softball game between two selected teams of boys. In the afternoon a Grand Parade started the program and this was followed by many contests ranging from apple bobbing to sack races. One of the most interesting contests, which climaxed the program, was the pie eating contest. It was quite obvious that the contestants momentarily forgot rationing. The prizes for all contests were war savings stamps.

I firmly believe that the Supervised Recreation Project was a good one and should be continued in Maynard.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen, The Citizens' Committee, my loyal assistants, and all others who helped to make the playground a success in 1943.

## Report of Superintendent of Streets

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I herewith submit my report for the year 1943 as Superintendent of the Street Department.

### MAINTENANCE

The gutters and drainage systems were cleaned. The streets in the business section were cleaned each week, also the papers and rubbish were collected from the stores.

The new trucks that have been purchased have fulfilled the requirements of the Department.

This past year several streets have been resurfaced with a Road Mix Type of surface. This type of surface is a new development in road building and by the use of this method we can obtain a wearing surface with a guaranteed life of from eight to ten years, whereas, in comparison with a seal treatment with sand cover the life ranged from one to three years.

It is my intention to apply this type of surfacing in future years.

### DRAINAGE

Twenty-eight feet of R. C. 12-inch pipe was laid as a replacement on Walnut Street by the Finnish Congregational Church.

Two Catch Basins and eighty feet of R. C. 12-inch pipe were constructed on Summer Street by the Tower Road.

Sections of the Granoletic walks were replaced on Parker Street, DeMars Street and in front of Fire House. Also considerable patching was done to the tar walks about the town.

### SNOW

The loss of men has required completion of ploughing before sanding operations and removing of snow from business areas. Normally these operations were carried out at the same time with additional men.

This past winter was exceptionally a bad one for ice conditions. We had 15 Sleet Storms and a total accumulation of 60 inches of snow. We used 931 cubic yards of sand. The labor shortage was a serious problem. We were quite fortunate in receiving the help of High School boys for short periods of time. I must say that these boys did a remarkable job.

The snow was removed from the churches and all of the business areas.

All streets and sidewalks were plowed and sanded for travel.

The State Department of Public Works has renewed their contract for paying one-half the cost of ploughing Great Road Route 117.

The purchase of the new trucks and Snow Loader should greatly assist us in our labor for the coming winter.

We have built a Snow Dump on the site of the old paper-mill dam. This should speed up the handling of the snow.

### CHAPTER 90 MAINTENANCE

The brush was cut, shoulders and drainage cleaned on Great Road, Parker Street, Powdermill Road, Main Street, Acton Street, Haynes Street and Brown Street.

The Town Line signs and posts were relettered and painted. Also all the cable guard fences.

Main Street was resurfaced with the Road Mix Type from the Railroad crossing to Great Road area treated 8,534 square yards.

426 linear feet of new fences which consisted of a double wooden rail and reinforced concrete posts were constructed on Parker Street.

## GARAGE

In November of this year the D'Agata Garage on River Street was rented for storage of highway equipment until April 1, 1944. We have \$30,000 invested in equipment and we should have some place to house it properly. Machinery depreciates very rapidly when allowed to stay out of doors. When considering a garage the following requirements should be given consideration. Economy in initial cost and maintenance, systematic storage for rapid movement of equipment, up to date machinery necessary to keep trucks in repair, office space and adequate heating, plumbing and electrical installation.

The Town Accountant's report will show the expenditures of this department.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen and other elected and appointed officials who have assisted me during the past year. I hope that within the next year Victory shall come so that members from the Department who are in the armed forces may return to us safe and sound. Any success that we may have obtained this year is due to the Department employees.

## Report of Police Chief

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I hereby submit my annual report as Chief of Police for the year ending December 31, 1943. In performance of the duties of this office, I have had the co-operation of the officers of the department, the assistance of the Board of Selectmen and the Town Counsel.

### EQUIPMENT

During the year a rowboat has been purchased, replacing the old boat at the mill pond. With the aid of the Highway Department and the courtesy of Mr. John O'Leary, a wooden shed is being erected on Mr. O'Leary's property for the housing of this boat and the equipment.

Due to the rationing programs a new police car or other equipment cannot be purchased, even though it is economical to trade in for a new car annually.

### SAFETY

The following streets have been designated by the Board of Selectmen to be closed for coasting. These streets are: Roosevelt, Elmwood, Spring Lane, Newton Drive, Butler, Florida Road, and Lewis Street.

### TRAFFIC

Due to the shortage of material and labor only some of the traffic islands and the most regularly used cross walks were painted. During the coming year, with the aid of the State Department of Public Works, this department is planning to have traffic lines painted on the main routes and streets in Maynard.

It is recommended that an appropriation be voted for the upkeep and maintenance of the parking lots as these areas have aided considerably in relieving the traffic congestion in the business district.

## Report of the Fire Department

The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

The report of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1943, is herewith submitted.

Our Financial statement may be found in the Town Accountant's report.

### BUILDINGS

Headquarters, Nason Street, Housing Engine No. 1, Engine No. 2, Ladder No. 1, one fire alarm system and one Air alarm system, one forest fire pump, one Police boat, one G. I. Five hundred gallon trailer pump.

### APPARATUS

In service one International pumping engine, equipped with one hundred fifty gallon booster tank, two hundred fifty feet booster hose, one thousand feet of 2½ inch hose and 200 feet 1½ inch hose, 2 - 10 foot lengths hard suction hose, ladder stretcher, rubber boots, and rubber coats, salvage covers and various other equipment for extinguishing fires.

Engine No. 2 is a Dodge pumping engine equipped with booster tank and one hundred and fifty feet booster hose, and five hundred gallon Midship pump and one thousand two hundred feet 2½ inch Hose, two hundred and ten foot hard suction hose, salvage covers, ladders and various other equipment for extinguishing fires.

Ladder No. 1. Equipped with pumping engine booster tank and one-hundred and fifty feet booster hose, one 60 foot aerial ladder and two-hundred and forty feet ground ladders, one fifty foot 3 inch hose, one hundred 1½ inch hose, nine-hundred feet 2½ inch hose, two man sewer mask, gas masks, one inhalator, rubber boots and coats, and various other tools and equipment for saving lines and extinguishing fires.

### FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

There are twenty-four boxes, eight phantom boxes, seventeen miles of wire, one whistling machine with steam whistle, one house tapper, one tape register, twenty-seven battery cells, two rectifiers, one air whistle, and one air compressor.

The whistling machine was giving us some trouble. Mr.

Bills of Lexington was called and after some adjustment he guaranteed the machine to be in working order.

Every man in the department has been insured against injury or loss of life, and this was made possible through the generosity of the public of Maynard at Thanksgiving, and we wish at this time to thank all those that contributed to this fund

The weekly collections of rubbish and waste paper in the business section by the Highway Department has been a great help to reduce the many hazards that existed.

At this time we take the opportunity to thank the Superintendent, Mr. R. Sheridan and his co-workers for the splendid co-operation extended to us in reducing fire hazards.

AN ACT FURTHER REGULATING THE SETTING OF  
FIRES IN THE OPEN AIR

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Chapter forty-eight of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out section thirteen, as amended by chapter two hundred and four of the acts of nineteen hundred and thirty-eight, and inserting in place thereof the following section — Section 13. No person shall set, maintain or increase a fire in the open air at any time unless the ground is substantially covered with snow, except by written permission, covering a period not exceeding five days from the date thereof, granted by the forest warden or chief of the fire department in cities and towns, or, in cities having such an official, the fire commissioner; provided, that no such permit shall be granted to be exercised during any portion of the months of April and May except upon rainy days; and provided, further, that persons over the age of twenty-one may, without a permit, set, maintain or increase a reasonable fire for the purpose of cooking, upon sandy or gravelly land free from living or dead vegetation of upon sandy or rocky beaches bordering on tide water, if the fire is enclosed within rocks, metal, or other non-inflammable material. The forest warden, chief or fire commissioner, as the case may be, may make it a condition for granting a permit that any burning shall be done only after four o'clock (eastern standard time) in the afternoon and he may revoke a permit at any time. The forester may make rules and regulations relating to the granting and revocation of such permits binding throughout the commonwealth. Such rules and regulations shall take effect subject to section thirty-seven of chapter thirty, when approved by the governor and council. The forest wardens in towns and officials performing the duties of forest wardens in cities shall cause public notice to be given of the provisions of this section and shall enforce the same. Whoever violates any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than one month, or both.

## Report of Shade Tree and Moth Divisions

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

There was an ice storm the last week in December, 1942, which did considerable damage, and required a considerable amount of time to repair.

In mid-summer the Vercillium Blight began to appear on the Rock Maples, this blight was caused by roots damaged during the hurricane, this was most noticeable in the Southeast part of Massachusetts. Owing to the fact that this disease is incurable, we were ordered by the state to remove branches and trees affected by it and to destroy this wood, for which an additional appropriation of \$75.00 was needed.

Two trees were destroyed by gas, in which the gas company reimbursed the town.

All Elm trees have been inspected for the Dutch Elm Disease, as yet there is no sign of it. Now that the disease is known to be in this state and that there is no longer hope of its eradication, we must learn to cope with it.

Rock Maples in certain sections of the town are badly infested with the Cotton Aphis, which require a contact spray.

There were fifty Norway Maples planted last spring in various parts of the town.

The Gypsy Moth situation has been greatly improved. During the period of the moth's egg-laying we had heavy rains that forced her to lay her eggs close to the ground which accounts for their being found on tree trunks and along stone walls. All forest and fruit trees have been inspected for the Gypsy and Browntail Moth, this inspection showed that there were no Browntail Moths.

The Tent Caterpillar and the Fallweb Caterpillar were very noticeable, and there were many complaints. As these two moths appear in between regular spraying — I have asked for an additional \$100.00 for the Moth Department to combat them.

Brush was cut on Parker Street, Old Marlboro Road, Innegus Road, Taylor Road, Sherman Road, O'Moore Avenue, Espie Avenue; and part of Summer Hill Road.

I wish to acknowledge gratefully the fine co-operation of all town officials who have assisted me in my work.

## Report of Board of Public Welfare

To the Citizens of Maynard:

The Board of Public Welfare closed the year 1943 with all categories of relief at a still lower level than the previous year.

Practically all employable persons in town were taken care of in defense plants and our local mills. This increase in employment reduced our General Relief rolls to 17 cases at the close of the year. During the year there was a considerable amount of sickness which entailed an increase in medical and hospitalization expenses.

### OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

In July 1943 a revised budget on Old Age Assistance became effective and all cases had to be reviewed and re-budgeted if necessary. As a result of this 9 cases were closed and necessary adjustments were made on all other cases. There were 14 new cases opened during the year with 11 deaths and 20 cases closed for other reasons.

### AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN

At the close of 1943, we were caring for 3 Aid to Dependent Children cases, consisting of 3 adults and 7 children, a reduction of 1 case from the previous year.

The financial account of all expenditures and reimbursements will be found in the report of the Town Accountant.

## Report of the Superintendent

To the Board of Water Commissioners:

Gentlemen:

The report of the Superintendent and Registrar of the Water Department for the year ending December 31, 1943 is herewith submitted.

The Pond filled up in the spring until May 31 when the water was 40 inches below the concrete foundation of the Pumping Station, this was about 6 inches below a full Pond. December 31, 1943, the water was 74 inches below the concrete foundation.

Due to an accident to the power line the 25 H. P. motor was damaged and had to be rewound. The motors are insured against such accidents.

No leaks have been found on the force main from the Pond to the Old Pumping Station.

A hydrant connection was cut into this line at the Parki Place for the Ammunition Depot and a hydrant was placed.

The Old Pumping Station is being kept in reserve.

No work has been done at the reservoir except to cut the grass.

A four-inch connection was made from the Summer Street main at Bent Avenue to replace the small connection which supplied this street.

No extensions to the mains have been made this year.

Three hydrants have been broken, by autos, this year and one hydrant has been replaced that was leaking.

Six new services have been put in, making 1,548 now in use.

Eight services have been relaid, 20 have been repaired and 23 have been cleaned.

Four meters have been placed on new services, making the number in use 1,528. 230 meters have been repaired.

## Middlesex County Extension Service

This is a report of the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service in the town of Maynard for 1943.

Because of war conditions, the Staff of the Extension Service had to devote a great deal of time this year to overhead organization work pertaining to machinery rationing, food distribution orders, farm labor and other regulations, as issued by our Government, and establishing the number of war units on certain farms for Selective Service Boards. An attempt was made to see to it that these regulations were applied to local conditions.

Maynard poultrymen have been sent information on price ceilings, the feed situation, and other emergency policies. Also, they have been sent circular material on up-to-date production practices. They have been advised concerning keeping records, improving growing conditions, disease control and reducing wastes. Many have been visited concerning specific problems.

Cooperation was given in establishing Victory gardens. Soil samples were tested and help given on the control of garden insects and fungus troubles.

One demonstration was given on the use of native materials for making of Christmas greens.

Special Point Rationing Talks to several community organizations—Grange and Women's clubs, also two food demonstrations on "Yeast Breads" and "Meat Extenders."

Mrs. Francis May, serving as chairman of the town canning committee, was responsible for arrangements made for two canning demonstrations.

63 girls and 24 boys were enrolled in 4-H Club work carrying on activities in gardening, canning, clothing, home furnishing, poultry and pig raising.

The winter work was under the leadership of Mrs. Arthur Morrill, Mrs. Herbert Martin, Mrs. William Holly and Mrs. Leo Downey.

The garden work was headed up by Miss Nellie May, with the assistance of the Misses Alice Hekkala, Natalie Keyes, Mary Horne, Marion Ledgard, Mary Ward, Esther Kouppila.

## Report of Cemetery Commissioners

January 22, 1944.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The annual report of the Board of Cemetery Commissioners is herewith submitted.

During the past year several improvements were made on Perpetual Care lots. This work included setting markers, and corner posts, grading, seeding and filling graves.

The trees and shrubs throughout the New Cemetery have been trimmed and all shrub beds graded, fertilized and weeded.

One of the worst problems confronting cemetery work is the refilling of sunken graves. To overcome this difficulty the following rule was made to govern all future interments. This rule implies that any type of vault may be purchased from your mortician and that wood casings are no longer permitted. We feel that this will greatly improve the looks of the cemetery and that all lot owners will be much more pleased to be relieved of the dread of sunken graves.

"After September 1, 1943, all interments not made in standard concrete, natural stone or steel vaults, must be made in sectional concrete crypts of approved specifications. The use in the future of wooden interment boxes is not permitted."

In conclusion, we take this opportunity of thanking the people for their co-operation during the past year.

## Report of Superintendent of Glenwood Cemetery

To the Cemetery Commissioners:

January 22, 1944.

I herewith submit the report of the Superintendent of Glenwood Cemetery for the year 1943.

The wall at the entrance to the New Cemetery which was damaged, has been repaired.

All the brush bordering the cemetery and pond has been cut and removed.

A great many improvements were made on lots during the year and avenues which were washed out by heavy rains were graveled and graded.

The work of filling sunken graves, trimming trees, caring of shrubs, grading and seeding was accomplished.

It is very pleasing to note the spirit in which the lot owners have accepted the new ruling regarding the use of vaults. This rule was designed primarily to supplant wooden interments and allow only enduring grave structures to be used. Although it will be a few years before the use of vaults will be noticeable, it will eventually solve one of our greatest difficulties which is the continuous care of sunken graves.

In conclusion, I take this opportunity of thanking the Commissioners for their kind help during the past year.

## Assessors' Report

To the Citizens of Maynard:

The annual report of the Board of Assessors for the year ending December 31, 1943, is herewith submitted.

In accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 29, all owners of taxable property, shall each year, on or before the 31st day of January, submit to the local Assessors a list with valuation of all of their taxable property.

There were some decreases in the assessed valuation of both Real Estate and Personal property in 1943. The chief cause of the decrease in Real Estate was the takings of land and property by the U. S. Government for the construction of the Ammunition Storage Depot. The assessed valuation of Personal Property has also been decreased. The cause of this is in part the value of live stock and farming machinery taken by the U. S. Government. The other part is the loss of stock-in-trade and machinery by owners or occupants of stores who were compelled to vacate owing to poor business conditions.

## Report of the Board of Health

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Board of Health submits the following report for the year ending December 31, 1943:

The Board continued its practice of conducting its many worth-while clinics which include the Diphtheria, Vaccination, School Dental, and Dog Clinics.

The townspeople should join with us in commending the physicians and Miss Mary Ward, Public Health Nurse, for their untiring efforts to serve for the benefit of the community. Because of the wartime conditions our physicians have been called upon to assume a new and heavy burden, that of administering to neighboring communities, with the scarcity of doctors.

### WELL BABY CLINICS

For the fifth consecutive year these clinics have been conducted by Dr. S. M. Cremer and Miss Mary Ward and have proved to be helpful to mother and child. With our physicians already overtaxed with work and many mothers now employed in war work and unable to bring their children to the clinic we have temporarily stopped them until such time as a complete clinic may be conducted. Mothers are urged to consult their physician, however, in case of illness of their child for any length of time.

### VACCINATION CLINIC

There were fifty-nine children inoculated against smallpox at these protective clinics which were in charge of Dr. Raymond E. Hooper, assisted by the Public Health and School Nurses. Again it is reminded that mothers should have their children given this inoculation in their infancy.

### DIPHThERIA CLINIC

For the thirteenth consecutive year the Board has conducted these all-important clinics with sixty-nine children receiving the inoculation last spring. Of great importance also is the fact that these children have been immunized at the same time against lockjaw. In these rapidly changing times, however, we must not believe we are safe from an epidemic, and every parent owes it to his child and the community to have the child immunized as soon as possible after the age of six months. The clinic was conducted by Dr. R. E. Hooper, assisted by the School and Public Health Nurses.

## SCHOOL DENTAL CLINIC

These fine and important clinics have been conducted for the past fourteen years and were conducted by Dr. F. E. May and Dr. S. R. Garland, assisted by Miss Edith Foster, School Nurse. They have more than proved their worth in the preservation and care of the children's teeth.

## TUBERCULOSIS

The past year has shown a slight decline in tuberculosis here, although there were two deaths recorded at the sanatorium. There is a large number of discharged patients who return for weekly treatment. This disease is difficult to judge as it is very apt to vary. Status shows that tuberculosis centers are finding quite a number of cases.

In a recent, very careful study of 160 army rejectees for pulmonary tuberculosis at the Middlesex County Sanatorium, it was found that only ten of these had been previously known cases of tuberculosis, and 150 unsuspected cases. These individuals were classed IA by their local draft boards. By stage of the disease these cases were 75% minimal, 14% moderately advanced, and 11% far advanced.

The most significant fact from the public health viewpoint is that over 50% of the moderately advanced and advanced cases had positive sputum (58% advanced, 52% moderately advanced, 7% minimal). These unsuspected bacillary cases are continuously seeding our communities with tuberculosis. They must be found and segregated if tuberculosis is to be reduced to a low level.

## DOG CLINICS

For the past ten years the Board has conducted two clinics each year for the protection of dogs against rabies with two hundred forty-eight dogs receiving treatment last spring. Dr. Gerald O'Malley was in charge, assisted by Josiah Herrick, local Inspector of Animals. Although there was a large number of dog bites, not a single case of rabies was reported. All dog owners are reminded to have their dogs immunized annually for the protection of the entire community. These clinics are conducted free of charge and have proved their value.

On request of the Army authorities, when the dim-out was in effect, a water pipe and hose was purchased and placed in use because of the emergency war time measures and dim-out regulations.

The report of the Milk Inspector will be found elsewhere, and it should be noted that Mr. Arthur R. Taylor is doing a splendid piece of work in this capacity. Also doing fine work in these trying days are our other employees, Josiah Herrick, Inspector of Slaughtering; W. F. Osbeck, Inspector of Plumbing; and Henry Anderson, Collector of Garbage.

In the Town Accountant's report it will be noted that we returned a substantial amount of money. However, the budget of a Health Department is difficult to estimate and more so in these days of changing conditions.

We wish to thank the physicians, School and Public Health Nurses, dentists, the Finance Committee, and all other town departments which have been so co-operative.

## Report of Milk Inspector

January 20, 1944

The Board of Health  
Maynard, Mass.

While not as much progress has been made with local milk inspection as would have been possible in peace time, I feel that a reasonably good job has been done during the past year. Regular quality checks of all milk sold in the Maynard area have been made and with a very few exceptions the milk has been found to be of good sanitary quality.

The practice of requiring all milk dealers serving the Maynard area to file regular applications for licenses was instituted last Spring. Previously any dealer producing the necessary fee and presenting it to the Town Treasurer has

been issued a license for the coming year. It is my intention to have these applications for dealer milk licenses in the dealers' hands much earlier this year, and I feel very strongly that any applicant for a milk dealer's license in Maynard should be referred to the Health Department or the Milk Inspector.

Two licenses were temporarily held up last Spring because of unsanitary conditions on the dealer's farms. These conditions were corrected and the licenses granted.

Over all inspection of farms producing milk for Maynard dealers was left to the inspector for the State Department of Agriculture. A number of visits were made, however, to individual producers, and suggestions made for improving conditions which were in every instance carried out. Some producers have made notable improvement during the year, which certainly is greatly to their credit under existing conditions.

Maynard, along with the rest of the State experienced a serious milk shortage during November and December. While at times customers were unable to get quite as much milk as they would have liked, I do not think any one experienced any real hardship. The dealers are to be congratulated for their intelligent and fair handling of their product during the short period.

Because I believe milk inspection should be helpful and educational to dealers and producers, it is my hope that after the war we may hold educational meetings featuring leaders in dairy fields which will be open to the public, particularly handlers and producers of dairy products.

Gentlemen: I submit herewith the annual report of the Town Accountant for the year ending December 31, 1943.

At the end of the year 1943 the financial condition of the Town was very good and I give you below a few comparisons between the figures of December 31, 1942 and December 31, 1943.

## Report of the Maynard School Committee

To the Voters of the Town of Maynard:

Your School Committee herewith submits its report for the year 1943.

Like all other organizations, the school system has undergone many changes, some of which we believe are for the better, and some we admit leave us hoping for improvement with the return of normal times.

Your Committee a year ago made it a rule that pupils must complete their high school courses in order to secure a diploma. Despite this rule, which was displayed on the bulletin board at the high school and was supposed to have been explained to all pupils leaving school, there were many applications for diplomas from pupils who had enlisted, or who had taken war jobs and left months before the end of the school year. As there was some confusion about the rights of boys being exempt from military service until the close of the term, your Committee decided to give conditional diplomas to the young men who entered the service, but adhered to the rule in all other cases. The Committee cannot conceive how pupils who miss half a year of their senior term can have acquired the knowledge equal to that of pupils attending regularly. Both educators and army officials advise that it is the duty of the schools and parents to have pupils complete high school courses if possible.

With the unrest all over the world, it is hard to say that our schools have remained untouched; but either through the cooperation of the parents, the police and the schools, or through pure luck, Maynard has been singularly free from juvenile delinquency, the plague of many communities these troublesome times. We hope and trust that parents will continue to cooperate with the teachers in taking an interest in the activities of our young people, and in directing their efforts to study and useful occupation. It is only through such cooperation that our good record in this all important matter can be maintained.

Our financial report shows a sizeable balance left unspent in the hands of the treasurer. Several thousands of this would have been spent had the Committee been able to make routine repairs and to obtain supplies that are still needed. All of this year's balance cannot be lopped off of next year's budget as there is yet a pressing need for expenditures and replacements which could not be made at this time.

The school enrollment continues to shrink, but it cannot

be expected in these days of rising costs that the budget will shrink accordingly. However, we expect to function next fall with one less teacher in the high school and this saving will be reflected in the years to come. At this time the number of pupils in the grades does not break down to admit doing away with any teachers in this branch, but the consolidating of two-thirds of the lower grade pupils in one building makes a better distribution of the teaching load and tends toward better instruction of the pupils.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Maynard:

It is a privilege to submit the Annual Report of the Maynard School Department.

Although this is a report of what the personnel is doing for your children, it must, of necessity, be general and statistical in form.

## BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

The general condition of the buildings is good, because of the vigilance of past School Committees and Superintendents. With the exception of the reconstruction of the drainage system of the Roosevelt School, a condition which has existed since the building was constructed, and the grading of the yards of the Coolidge and Roosevelt Schools, there are no major repairs needed.

Through the cooperation of the Highway Department, the condition of the yard at the Roosevelt School was remedied temporarily this fall.

The painting of the walls of the corridors in the Roosevelt and Junior High Schools will be continued whenever help is available.

All classrooms of the Roosevelt School are now equipped with electric clocks which are very much appreciated by the teachers.

I hope it will be possible to finish painting all the rooms at the Roosevelt and High School buildings as well as to remedy the condition of the toilet rooms at the latter building. The fixtures are antiquated and although they cannot be replaced at this time, the walls and floors should be reconditioned. This would make the rooms cleaner in appearance, at least.

In the High School there is need of a room equipped to care for girls who are taken ill.

## ELEMENTARY GRADES

I feel that the general objectives of education are being realized in the elementary grades. The materials, as a whole, are up to date and in good condition. Teachers' manuals are furnished for the basic texts in reading. The most outstanding adoption of the year was a second grade language book with a manual containing daily lesson plans for the guidance of the teachers.

## ATTENDANCE

Regular school attendance is a problem which confronts principals and teachers.

When parents feel that a day out of school is of no consequence to the progress of the child, they are displaying a lack of foresight. There are many days in the first grade as well as in the high school when a new phase of a subject is presented. If the pupil misses that presentation, the loss is irreparable. He has not only missed the presentation by the teacher, but also the benefit of class participation.

Since it is the duty of the parent to send the child to school, he should not place the responsibility of excusing the pupil on the principal. Many times principals have been confronted by the pupil with a request for permission to be allowed to work for a few days. The pupil will inform the principal that the parent is willing that he should be absent from school, if the principal approves. Principals should not be asked to countenance the parents' ignoring of the state laws on school attendance.

No pupil can afford to be absent from school unless it is absolutely necessary. The privilege of "making up work" is not an alternative for regular attendance. Nothing can replace regular attendance.

## COURSE OF STUDY

In order to have a sound educational program, there is need to have uniformity of purposes in the subject matter taught. There are printed courses of study available, copies of which could be given to each teacher, but that would not be a democratic or practical procedure. We have in each grade in Maynard at least two experienced teachers who are capable of formulating objectives and outlining the subject matter content of their respective grades.

Regular meetings are held by the teachers of each grade or subject. At the meetings, purposes or objectives and scope of subject matter in every subject for the following month are agreed upon. At the close of the present school year we will have an outline of every subject in the curriculum from the first grade to the twelfth. The second step in the making of a course of study is to analyze the objectives from the point of view of ideals, skills, attitudes, and appreciations which we are striving to develop in the children. This will be done by further detailed planning after the time apportionment is completed.

## CHILDPOWER

In promoting the purposes of war, the principle of priority invades every aspect of life and creates a problem we must face. Not only in Maynard but all over the country do school authorities acknowledge that they have been unequal to the task of persuading those who are leaving school, to return.

The lure of high wages and an honest desire to help win the war, plus perhaps the sense of freedom that comes from no home work are sending these ill-prepared adolescents on what they think is the easy path to riches. Temporarily they are finding the rewards ample. We cannot expect the adolescents of sixteen to eighteen to realize that the very ones who are now encouraging them to work will use the fact that they have no high school diploma as the reason for eliminating them when there is no longer a manpower shortage. I have great admiration for the youth of today, but they need guidance, sympathy, and encouragement. This must be given by the home as well as by the school.

The other phase of the problem concerns the student who works afternoons and evenings. However great his will to learn, the boy who has worked half the night is not very receptive to learning the next day. The teachers see in him a perfect example of human fatigue and adolescent indifference.

The argument that the boys will soon be in the Army or Navy so they might as well go to work while they can, is not valid. The real truth is that the Army and Navy wish the boys to remain in school in order that they may have a scholastic background which will enable them to go on with the training the government has prepared for them.

I appeal to the parents of the high school pupils to show foresight in this problem for the sake of the future of the children who cannot realize or appreciate now what the future holds in store for them. We cannot expect vigorous youngsters, with unaccustomed "wealth" passing through their fingers and with an undeniable feeling of self-importance suddenly thrust upon them, to appreciate the situation with the prudent vision of maturity. They must have counsel because the tragedy of this situation is that it will mean the wrecking of the education of our boys and girls in their mid-teens. They will not go back to school when the war is over, but will find themselves disenfranchised from jobs, as millions of returning service men and women will demand and obtain re-employment.

## HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM OF STUDIES

Since Pearl Harbor, the objectives of all human activities have been narrowed. It is a pity that children cannot be made

to realize that an education is not only the weapon with which they must fight the battle of life, but also an unending source of pleasure and entertainment.

The elective system in high schools is one phase of the field of education which has been abused. In theory it is ideal, but in practice it has had the effect of lowering the standard of educational accomplishment. The majority of pupils try to find subjects on which they may put the least amount of effort and still earn a credit for graduation.

Every pupil in the Maynard High School is in need of guidance. Too often a student reaches his senior year only to find that in order to accumulate credits enough to be awarded a diploma, he must take in addition to regular senior subjects, other courses scheduled for the three lower classes. Many graduate and find they haven't credits enough to enter a school of higher learning. The first reaction is to blame the school system. Such blame is not entirely justified.

Each year the pupils are given an opportunity to confer with a teacher or the principal in regard to the choice of subjects which will give them the best preparation for the future. If the children or the parents themselves, through the children, do not make known their plans for the future, the school cannot give effective guidance.

A guidance program is a necessity in any high school, but there is a question in my mind as to the value of the present program as it is carried on. GUIDANCE is on the Program of Studies as a required subject for first year students only. The primary purpose of the text book used is to give vocational information.

I recommend a flexible home room study period guidance program carried on by home room teachers. Occupational information can be made available to all pupils according to their present or possible interests. The pupil will be assisted by the teacher in interpreting information and applying it to himself. As far as is possible and practical, the pupil will be assigned to the same teacher over the period of four years. He will be responsible for his program of studies, conferences regarding scholastic progress, choice of college and the many other forms of educational guidance.

Since you have instructed me to reduce the personnel of the high school because of the decrease in enrollment, we must of necessity reduce the number of different subjects offered and yet meet the recommendations of the State Department of Education.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Coaching of all sports has been added to the duties of the

physical education director. This fact reduces the time spent in the elementary grades.

Two periods a week of physical education have been given to the boys in the high school. Before the beginning of the course each boy was given a complete physical examination and permitted to take physical education only on the recommendation of the school physician.

Provision for physical education for the girls is a problem which should be given attention. There should be a woman instructor for girls above the sixth grade. We are constantly planning for the future of our students, therefore we should make provisions for guarding the health of the girls.

When war befell our nation we found that we needed women as well as men who had healthy bodies. Many girls who had planned a business career found themselves stirred to contribute their ability and strength to the war effort. They discovered that unless they were physically fit, they were of little or no value, regardless of how patriotic their spirit might be.

Previously, to possess a sound body was an obligation to oneself, now the obligation is two-fold: an obligation to the nation as well as to oneself.

The size of the enrollment does not warrant a full-time physical education director for girls, but we should engage one on a part-time basis.

#### PERSONNEL IN MILITARY SERVICE

Since August, 1942, five members of the personnel have entered the service of our country: Reginald Sawyer, William Reynolds, Albert Lerer, Esther Kauppila and Lawrence Lerer.

Under Chapter 419 of the Acts of 1943, towns and cities are required to raise and to pay into the Teachers' Retirement Fund the assessments due for teachers on military leave of absence. These assessments total to \$451.02 for the personnel of the Maynard School Department to December 31, 1943.

#### SALE OF WAR STAMPS AND BONDS

I take this opportunity to commend the parents who are encouraging habits of thrift in the children through the purchase of War Stamps and Bonds.

During the months when school was in session from January 1 to December 31, 1943, stamps and bonds to the amount of \$14,836.10 have been purchased.



## ADULT ALIEN EDUCATION

Classes for the adult alien population of Maynard were opened in October. An effort was made to encourage regular attendance, even to the making of tentative plans for a day-time class to meet the needs of those who were working nights, but only twenty presented themselves for enrollment in the two classes. Because of this, continuance of the classes was not warranted.

## CONCLUSION

Any progress or success which may be the outcome of my service to the town is due to the support and encouragement given me by the School Committee, town officials, teachers, and parents and I herewith publicly acknowledge it. Time and space do not permit me to mention individuals, but to all concerned I offer a sincere "thank you." I take this opportunity of pledging myself to the maintenance and advancement of the Maynard School System.

## Report of High School Principal

Miss Mary A. Doyle  
Superintendent of Schools

Dear Miss Doyle:

I hereby submit my report for Maynard High School for the year 1943:

Heeding the urgent requests of the government to adapt education to the needs of the present war, we have made some changes in the curriculum at Maynard High School.

A course called Radio Code was started in March, and several of the boys who took the course and subsequently went into the armed services have reported that this study was of value to them. However, the enrollment in this course in the present school year is so small that it is questionable whether or not this course should be continued another year.

Two courses in mathematics called Aviation Math and Pre-Induction Math were started in the spring and have been continued in the present school year. These courses were started because the Army and Navy reported that inductees were found on examination to be woefully lacking in a background in mathematics which is essential to so many assignments in the armed services. The two courses are in reality a general review of mathematics, and they give the students practice in all phases of high school mathematics. Seniors must take at least one of these courses.

A pre-nursing course was started for senior girls in March, but in September this course was made a compulsory course for sophomore girls. We feel that it is more effective as a guidance course in the sophomore year than in the senior year. This course is not designed to train girls for nursing but to stimulate their interest in nursing as a career by presenting to them a study of physiology, first-aid, dietetics, and home-nursing.

If we neglected the physical side of the student's education, we would be neglecting our duty to our country. We now have a physical education program which enables every boy in the school to have two periods a week in gym classes. All boys were examined by the school doctor before they started their physical training. The program for girls is not as extensive as that for boys, but we do have field hockey and basketball in which any girl who wishes may participate. We feel that if we had a full time physical director for girls, all the

girls in the school could take at least two gym periods a week.

Great pressure has been placed upon us to provide workers for diverse types of work. Due to the manpower shortage we have tried to cooperate with employers as far as possible without disrupting the orderly progress of education. No students are allowed to stay out of school to work unless an emergency can be proved. We are strongly against students working to such an extent that such work interferes with their school assignments or attendance. The temporary fascination of money is not worth the harm done to the students' education. The Army and Navy tell us that the best way for high school students to serve their country is to study hard and to stay in school until graduation.

I take this opportunity to thank you and the high school teachers for their sincere cooperation and help during the past year.
